AND BRING THEM TO SPEEDY EXECUTION-NEW CHANCELLOR IS PRINCE VON STARHEM-BERG, LEADER OF THE FASCISTS IN AUSTRIA.

VIENNA, July 26:-The power of Austria's Fascists, allied in ideals and friendships to the Italian Fascists, mounted to rule Austria today. Prince von Starhemberg, leader of the Fascist Heimwher, is the new chancellor, succeeding the late Chancellor Dolfuss, who was assassinated yesterday by Nazis. Some fighting occurred in the province of Styria between the Nazis and government forces. Everywhere were expressed rumors and fears for the peace of Europe.

Premier Mussolini of Italy ordered troops to the Austrian border but the situation improved today with martial law proclaimed.

From 150 to 300 Nazis have been arrested and the assassins of Chancellor Dolfuss have also been arrested and a military court set up to bring about their speedy execution.

BERLIN, July 26:-Kurt Reith, the German minister to Austria, was recalled from his post as a result of intervention in favor of the Nazis who were responsible for the death of Dolfuss.




