Declaration Made Today by King Victor Emmanuel Regarded as Official Stand of Rome on International Situation

ROME, Italy, April 28: (CP)-King Victor Emmanuel of Italy declared today that, while Italy ardently desires peace, she will increase her military strength in the conviction that it is the first guarantee of peace. The statement is accepted as an official declaration of Italian government policy in connection with disarmament discussions preparatory to the resumption of the disarmament conference at Geneva a month hence.

what to do and was merely waiting for something to turn up. Not a single specific concrete idea had been propounded by the government despite the offer of the C.C. F. members to co-operate in any measure designed to alleviate the present condition of the people. The C.C.F., Mr. Bakewell claimed, had laid down detailed plans of action in connection with such matters as the forestry situation, provincial medical service, unemployment relief, etc., but these had all fallen on deaf ears. However, he (Mr. Bakewell) was confident that the C.C.F. would be getting into power before long and then it would have the opportunity of putting its ideas into operation. Meantime, conditions, in spite of attempts to institute "synthetic booms", were going from baa to worse and no one was going to tolerate it much longer. There were but two alternatives, declared Mr. Bakewell. Either fascism would have to be accepted or the people would have to take things into their own hands and run their own business. "The C.C.F. knows exactly what to do," asserted Mr. Bakewell. The governments in Victoria and Ottawa, even if they had the brains to do something, which he doubted, would not be permitted to do anything. Importance of further organization of the C.C.F. was stressed by the speaker. During his address, Mr. Bakewell charged that the Ocean Falls and Powell River companies, after the election, penalized employees who had voted C.C.F.
