Three Indians to Do Additional Prison Terms For Jail Breaking

Three Indians, two men and a woman, who escaped last week from the Massett lock-up where they were being held pending escort to Okalla to serve prison terms for theft, were brought to Prince Rupert Monday night aboard the police boat P. M. L. 8 from Massett and will be taken on from here to Okalla to serve the original terms as well as additional ones imposed for jail breaking. Solomon Russ and Rebekah Simeon have each received sentences OF HEALTH of one year's imprisonment on the jail breaking charge and Thomas Davidson six months. Russ and Davidson had been previously sentenced to six months' imprisonment on the theft charge and the Simeon woman to three months' imprisonment. The jail breaking sentences were imposed by Stipendiary Magistrate A. R. Mallory. The trio made their getaway last Wednesday by tearing planks. off the jail stockade at Massett and escaping into the bush, being recaptured on Friday.
