GERMANY MAKES APPEAL TO NATIONS

SAN FRANCISCO AND OAKLAND TEAMSTERS WALK OUT

Powers Signatory To Treaty of Versailles Asked To Intervene

Foreign Minister Konstantin von Neurath Tells British, Japanese, Italian and French Ambassadors of Difficulties in Memel Territory of Lithuania

BERLIN, July 12: (CP)—Foreign Minister Konstantin von Neurath yesterday received the ambassadors of Great Britain, Japan, Italy and France to impress upon them the necessity of intervention in the Memel territory of Lithuania by powers signatory to the Treaty of Versailles.

Von Neurath declared that conditions in Memel territory were untenable. The situation in this Lithuanian territory detached from Germany by the Treaty of Versailles and constituted a unit largely autonomous had been increasingly difficult of late because of Lithuanian and German differences.

OGPU IS TRIMMED

Dread Secret Police of Russia Deprived of Some of Power—New Legal System

MOSCOW, July 12:—Reorganization of the dread secret police, OGPU, whereby it becomes part of the newly established Department of Internal Affairs, is announced.

One of the main results through the reorganization of the OGPU deprives OGPU officials of the right to act as judges, a legal system comparable with other nations being substituted.

NEW YORK, July 11:—Nikola Tesla, inventor, announces the discovery of force rays which can be set like a wall around a nation's borders to render it impenetrable to military attack.

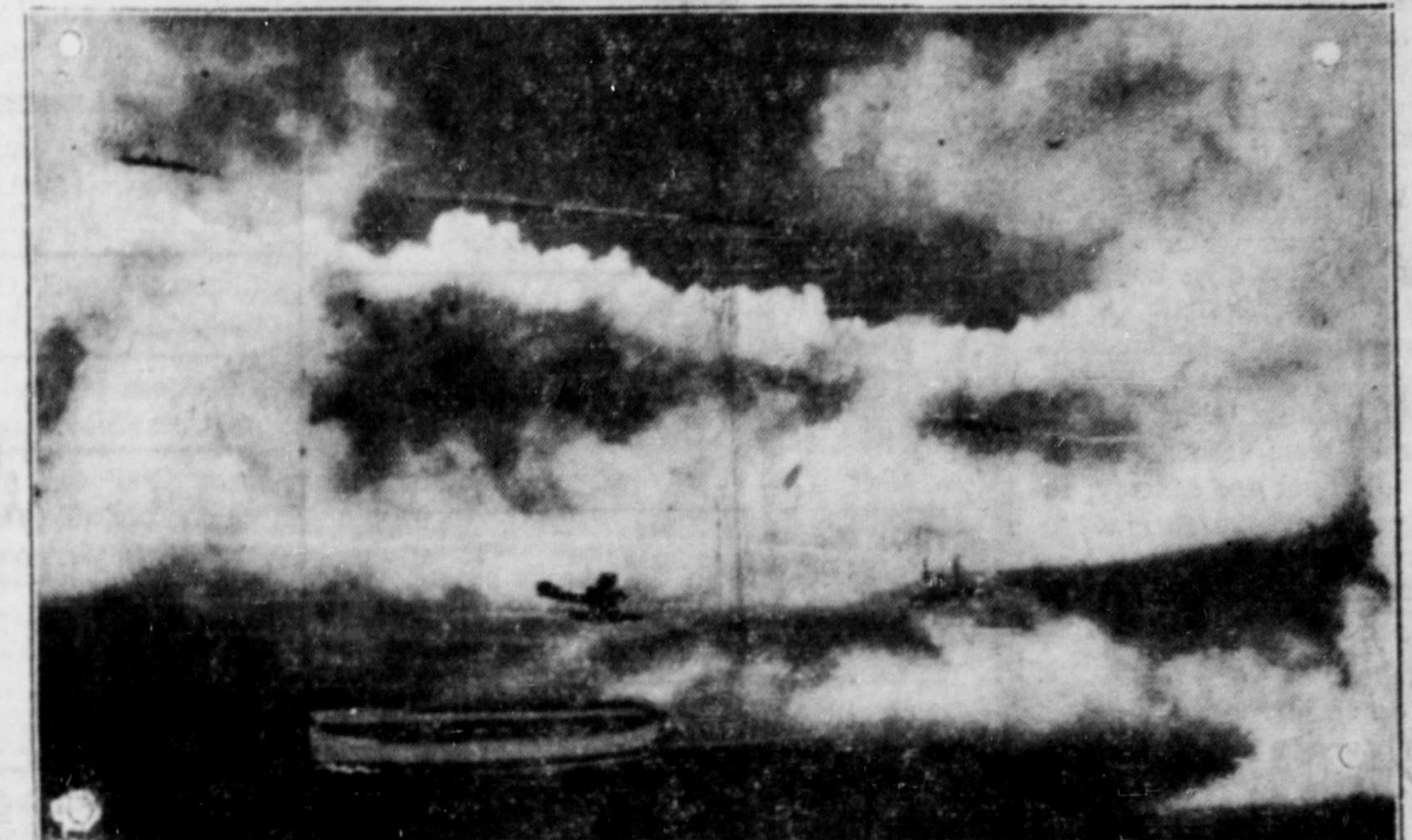
GERMAN WARCRAFT PAY ENGLAND FIRST VISIT IN OVER TWENTY YEARS

APPEALS OF INDIANS IN

Death Sentence is Being Fought—Body of Constable Carr Identified

VANCOUVER, July 12: (CP)—Appeal against the conviction at Vernon recently of Richardson, Eneas and Alex George, Canford Indians, sentenced to hang for the murder of Dominion Constable F. H. Gisbourne, was filed here yesterday by Stuart Henderson of Victoria, counsel for the condemned natives.

The body which was found Monday in the Fraser River near Chilliwack was definitely identified yesterday as being that of Provincial Constable Percy Carr, alleged to have been slain at the same time as Gisbourne.

RAILWAY SURVEY

Victoria Engineer to Assemble Information For Presentation To Ottawa

NOW WE KNOW

At last it is made clear to us why Prince Rupert did not get a share of the appropriations for public works when the big forty million pie was sliced up. It is because we did not need it. In writing to Victoria in reply to a protest made against the small allotment for that city, Premier Bennett states that action was taken to meet the situation where the necessities were greatest.

Possibly we should consider it a compliment to be left out of government distribution. We should throw out our chests and feel that we are better than these other poor cities that are on the Dominion public works dole. True, Prince Rupert affairs are in the hands of a receiver who finds it impossible to meet the obligations. But that is nothing. We are not really indigent. At any rate, we are not sufficiently needy to get any help in the way of public works. Vancouver is the real pauper. We should not have known if we had not come across Mr. Bennett's letter to Victoria.

METHOD OF ASSESSMENT

From Victoria we also learn a new wrinkle in making assessments of property values. There the assessor placed men on certain streets to count the number of people passing. Those streets that showed an increase in number of pedestrians had their assessments increased. Presumably, if there were any that decreased, the assessment rate would follow although the report did not indicate any decreases. The increases over last year ranged from twenty to thirty percent.

SOCCERITES SUSPENDED

Dickens and Murray Banished From Play For Six Weeks as Result Of Dominion Day Incident

As a result of an incident during the final of the Dominion Day football cup last week, Henry Dickens of the Merchants and Johnny Murray of the Canadian Legion each drew six weeks' suspension from the Board of Control of the Prince Rupert Football Association at a meeting last night. Dickens and Murray were charged with fighting on the field and continuing hostilities on the sidelines. Two weeks' suspension was imposed for the one incident and four weeks for the other.

In a statement following the meeting, the Board of Control let it be known that it was the intention to put down fighting between players, protesting at referee's decisions and such incidents and that the penalty imposed upon Dickens and Murray was to be considered by no means as a limit.

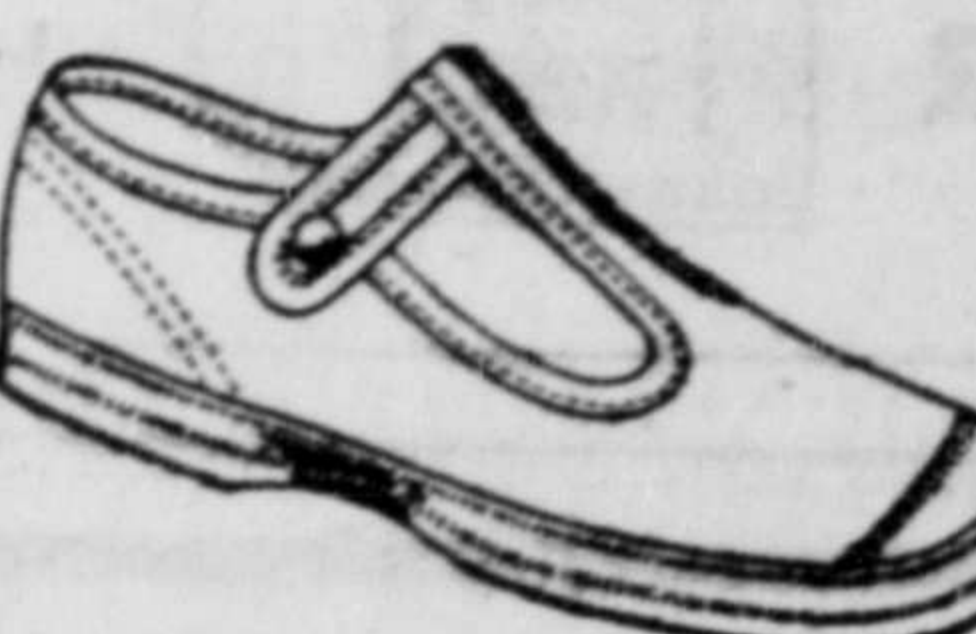

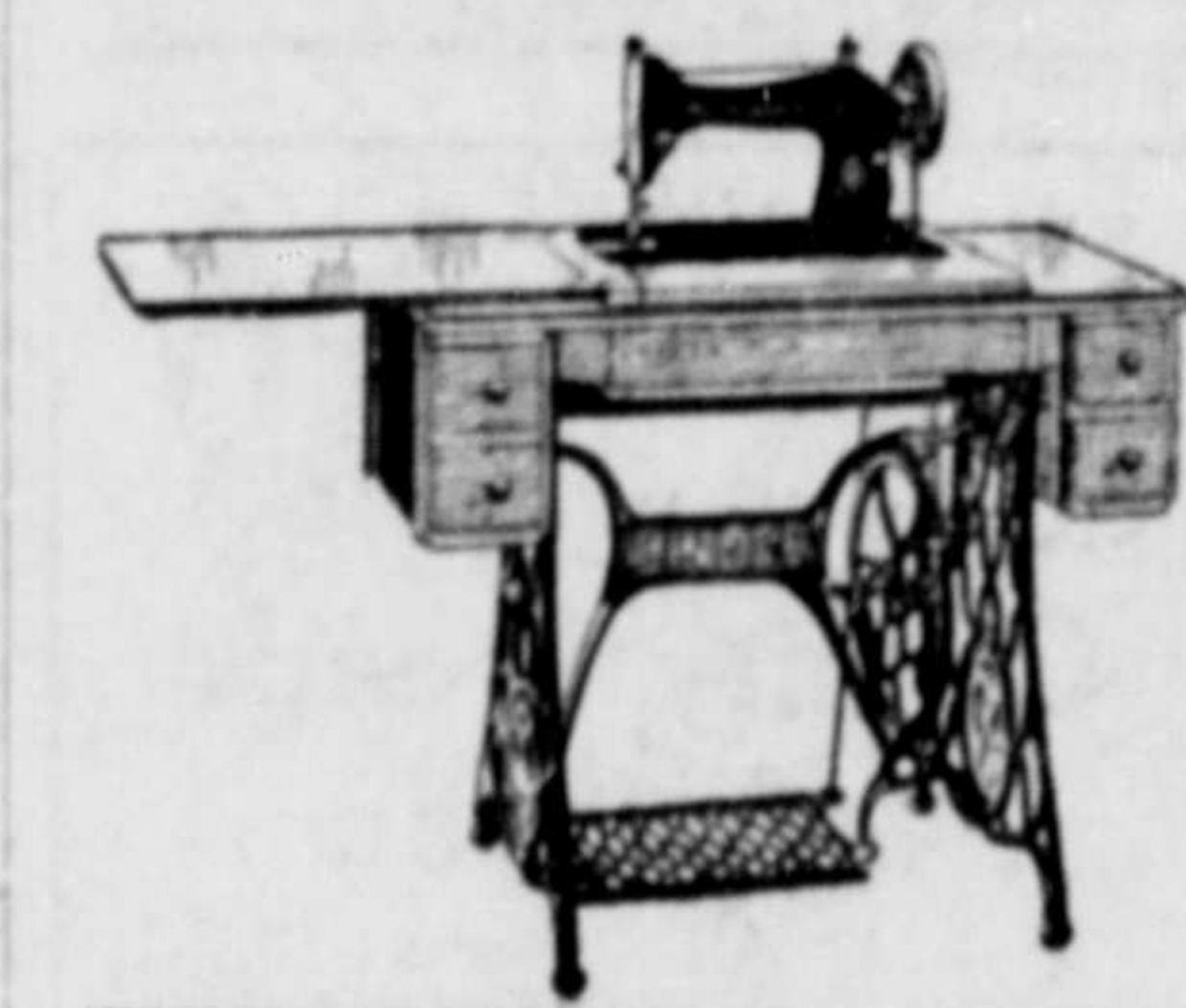
