CHAMBERLAIN BUDGET ENCOURAGING LIBERAL VICTOR IN SOUTH OXFORD WITH BIG MAJORITY

"New Spirit of Hope And Confidence" Seen By Head of Treasury

British Public Receives Gift of Six Pence Per Pound in
Income Tax Reduction—Pay Cuts Restored as Well
As Full Relief—Auto Tax Lower

LONDON, April 17: (CP)—The British public today received the gift of a six pence per pound reduction in income tax and a reduction in the case of small incomes of approximately ten pence. Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in his budget speech that one half of the pay cuts of government employees would be restored on July 1 and unemployment relief fully restored at the same date.

At the first of the year the automobile licence tax will be cut twenty-five percent from the present rate of one pound sterling per horsepower.

The Chancellor announced that, in the fiscal year just ending, the government had had a surplus of \$30,000,000. The ensuing year should show a profit of \$29,000,000.

Mr. Chamberlain said that it was impossible at the present time to contemplate a reduction of indirect taxation.

Referring to death duties during the past year, the Chancellor said that the largest payment ever received from a single estate was the \$3,000,000 from the estate of the late Sir John Ellerman, shipowner. Mr. Chamberlain said that a new "spirit of hope and confidence" had been established in the country.

MEASURE ADOPTED

Bennett Unemployment Relief Bill
Passed by House of Commons

OTTAWA, April 17: (CP)—The
government passed its unemploy-
ment relief bill through the House
of Commons last night with a ma-
jority of forty-six, the vote being
83 to 37, thus concluding a long
and acrimonious debate. The Con-
servatives and the bulk of the Pro-
gressives outvoted the Liberals.

Significant Ontario Poll Severe Reverse For Premier Bennett

Scant Grit Margin in General Election is Turned Into
Landslide For Party—Two Leaders Personally
Campaigning Seat

INGERSOLL, Ont., April 17:—Despite the desperate personal attempt of Premier Bennett and his most important cabinet ministers to stem the obviously growing tide of public opinion against the government even in staid, Conservative old Ontario, South Oxford, as had been expected by most political observers, remained in the Liberal column at yesterday's federal by-election but the tremendously increased majority over that accorded the late T. M. Cayley at the 1930 general election undoubtedly surprised even some of the most enthusiastic Liberals. At the general election Mr. Cayley had a scant fifty-five vote margin over Hon. Donald Sutherland, his Conservative opponent. Yesterday the Liberal candidate, A. S. Rennie, was accorded a majority of 1530 votes over Mr. Sutherland. The by-election was called to fill the seat following Mr. Cayley's death.

This by-election was regarded as one of the most significant from a national viewpoint, political observers agreeing that it would probably be an indication of what might happen at a general election. Party leaders from Mr. Bennett and Mr. King down had campaigned the seat hard during the past few weeks.

The vote yesterday was: Rennie, 5,693; Sutherland, 5,163. South Oxford seat has been held by the Liberals since the Meighen administration.

RESERVE ON OIL LANDS

Another Step Taken by Provincial
Government in Connection
With Plan to Assist
Prospecting

VICTORIA, April 17: (CP)—Reserve of coal and petroleum lands in the Peace River district and that portion of the Peace River land recording district which includes parts of Cassiar and the Cariboo has been proclaimed by the provincial government. Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of lands, said the reserve was intended to include all petroleum-bearing lands in the Peace River area and portions south of that area but contiguous to the line of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

It was indicated that the reserve was in support of the government's announced policy of assisting in prospecting for oil and development of oil lands in connection with unemployment relief.

Doors of Courts to Be Closed To Foreign Security Holders Who Refuse Refunding Here

VANCOUVER, April 17: (CP)—In the course of
an address yesterday before the Vancouver Board
of Trade on the subject of "Legislation of the Last
Session," Hon. Gordon Sloan, attorney general,
made the important statement in regard to British
Columbia bonds that those bondholders residing
outside of Canada who do not accept the govern-
ment's offer of conversion will not be permitted to
take their case to the courts.

Authority was given in the Revenue Act passed
at the last session of the Legislature to close the
doors of the courts to foreign bondholders who do
not accept the refunding offer of the government,
Mr. Sloan declared.

"Under this Act," Mr. Sloan stated, "to the man
with bonds we say: 'We will give you one hundred
cents on the dollar for your bond or take it back at
a lower rate of interest.' I don't say when that power
will be exercised."

Mr. Sloan said that no one wished to violate the
sanctity of contracts but it was impossible for the
province to continue its financing as it had been do-
ing.

IS DEAD ON LINE

E. K. Charles Succumbs to Dropsy On Telegraph Line—Nursed By Two Neighbors

E. K. Charles, 64-year old trapper, who had been suffering from dropsy for some time, died in his cabin at Currier Creek, fifty miles north of Sixth Cabin on the desolate Yukon Telegraph trail on April 13, according to a report received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here. He had been nursed and ministered to for three days prior to his death by two neighboring trappers, Otto Adler and Gus Hildebrand, who had been constantly with him and who, after his death, conducted the solemn act of burial.

The death was reported upon over long distance by Adler to Coroner Dr. E. V. Agnew of Smithers who satisfied himself that Charles' death had been due to natural causes. Charles was a single man.

ABOLISHING WAGE CUTS

Railway Employees Pass Resolution Asking That Ten Percent Reduction Be Restored

At its regular meeting last evening, the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, comprising clerks and other classes of employees on the Canadian National Railways, passed a resolution urging the railway management to abolish the wage reductions imposed upon these employees.

In its recital, the resolution pointed to the improved status of the railway revenues in which it was felt the employees should share as they had borne the full burden of their decline in wage cuts and layoffs. The federal government had seen fit to restore the wages of the civil service employees receiving less than \$1000 per annum and, as a large number of the railway employees were in similar category, they should receive equal treatment, it was felt.

As the welfare of the community was dependent upon the standard of living the income of its citizens provided, it was felt that the resolution would receive the support of the Chamber of Commerce and service organizations and the federal members of parliament to whom copies of the resolution are being sent.

Jap Fisherman Dies at Osland

Remains of Risaburo Sakamoto Brought Here and Burial Will Take Place Locally

The remains of Risaburo Sakamoto, a Japanese fisherman, who died suddenly at Osland, Smith Inlet, were brought to the city last night for interment from the chapel of Haynor Bros. undertakers. Sakamoto, who was fifty years of age and is survived by a widow and family, had been a resident of the Skeena River for some years.

IS LOADING ASPEN LOGS

Big Auxiliary Schooner Malahat Taking Shipment to Vancouver

To load eighteen carloads of white aspen logs which were cut at Tintagel in the Burns Lake district for delivery to China where they will be used in the manufacture of matches, the well known Vancouver auxiliary schooner Malahat arrived in port at 4:30 yesterday afternoon from Port Alberni and tied up at the lumber assembly wharf where loading of the timber commenced this morning. The Malahat will take the logs to Vancouver whence they will be re-shipped to the Orient. The shipment is being handled by the Ocean Transport Co. Ltd.

A five-masted auxiliary schooner, the Malahat is one of the best known vessels on the Pacific Coast and has had a very colorful career. For some years she was engaged in the liquor carrying trade southward from Vancouver. Built in Victoria in 1917, she is 245 feet, seven inches long with beam of 43 feet, eight inches and depth of 21 feet. Her gross tonnage is 1544 and net 1199.

Capt. R. G. Lawson is master of the vessel which carries a crew of fifteen.
