FISHERMEN MISSING ON WEST COAST

BRITISH MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS ARE BEING HELD TODAY

Captain James Lawler and Jas. Thomas Are Lost From Fish Packer

Have Not Been Seen Since Chuckwalla, Belonging to B. C. Packers, Stranded Near Ahousat, Vancouver Island; Engineer Manages to Reach Shore

AHOUSAT, Vancouver Island, Nov. 1: (CP)—Capt. Morris Lawler and James Thomas of the packer Chuckwalla, owned by the British Columbia Packers, are missing and the vessel is beached near here after having run ashore last night on a reef on the south side of Blunden Island. Carl Smith, engineer of the craft, was washed overboard with the dinghy and managed to reach shore safely.

Borough Voting Taken As Barometer Showing How Winds May Blow

LONDON, Nov. 1: (CP)—Laborites and Conservatives clashed today in nation-wide municipal elections involving more than four hundred borough councils in England and Wales. The results are expected to prove a fair barometer of the way political winds may blow in respect to the next general election. Many experienced observers believe that Labor may make further gains.

New York Stock Exchange Quiet

Another Dull Day Yesterday With Small Turnover and Narrow Price Fluctuations

NEW YORK, Nov. 1:—There was another dull session of trading on the New York Stock Exchange, yesterday when only 420,000 shares changed hands. Only narrow changes marked price fluctuations. The industrial average at closing was 93.36, up 31; rails, 34.78, off .01; utilities, 19.17, up .04, and bonds, 93.26, off .21.

Jones and Waller Spend Night at Athens and Expected to Take Off Today for London

ATHENS, Nov. 1:—Their chances of beating the existing speed record for a flight between Australia and England almost dissipated, Cathcart Jones and Ken Waller, returning to England from Melbourne after participating in the recent air derby, were grounded here last night, impatiently waiting to take off at dawn today for London.

Murray Humphreys Is In Penitentiary

One Time First Lieutenant of Al Capone Enters Leavenworth to Start Serving Term

LEAVENWORTH, Nov. 1:—Murray Humphreys, one time first lieutenant of Al Capone, Chicago gangster leader, entered Leavenworth Penitentiary yesterday to start serving a sentence of eighteen months' imprisonment for income tax evasion. The penitentiary term was imposed a few days ago in addition to a fine of \$5000.

Alberta Hears Election Talk

Early Contest Expected Despite Premier's Statement to Contrary

EDMONTON, Nov. 1: (CP)—Rumors of an early election in Alberta are revived despite the recent statement of Premier R. G. Reid that there will be no poll this year.

United States Flatly Refuses Parity to Japan

LONDON, Nov. 1:—United States flatly refused at the preliminary naval conference conversations yesterday to agree to Japan's demand for equality in strength of sea forces with United States and Great Britain. Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald has invited Japanese delegates to confer with him at the end of the week with a view to reaching, if possible, some compromise arrangement acceptable to the three powers.

Hauptmann Is Still Hopeful

Thinks He Can Convince "Jafsie" Condon That He Was Not Man Who Received Ransom

FLEMINGTON, N.J., Nov. 1:—Bruno Hauptmann, in Hunterdon County Jail here awaiting trial on charges of kidnapping and murdering Charles Augustus Lindbergh Jr., still clings to the hope that Dr. J. F. (Jafsie) Condon may yet clear him. Hauptmann expressed confidence yesterday that he could convince Condon that he (Hauptmann) was not the man to whom the \$50,000 ransom money was paid by Condon in the Bronx cemetery. Condon was reported a few days ago to have definitely identified Hauptmann as the man to whom he paid the money.

Pound Sterling and Canadian Dollar New York Exchange

NEW YORK, Nov. 1:—The British pound sterling closed at \$4.98 3/4 on the local foreign exchange market yesterday and the Canadian dollar at \$1.02 1/4.

CANADA WHEAT PRICE PEGGED

Winnipeg Grain Exchange Acts In Response to Recommendation of MacFarland

WINNIPEG, Nov. 1:—Wheat future prices on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange are pegged, effective today, at not less than 75c per bushel for December and 80c for May, the action being announced following the recommendation of John I. MacFarland, general manager of the central sales agency of the Canadian Wheat Pool, after conferences with the federal government, requesting control of the Canadian wheat price.

Mr. MacFarland said that there was evidence that the Winnipeg market was still the target of interested foreign to the wheat producers of Western Canada.

Elevator companies will be able to operate normally at these prices, it is felt.

Prices reacted to the announcement by dropping sharply both here and at Chicago yesterday, December closing at 75c, the peg price, and May at 79 1/2c. Chicago prices dropped as much as 1 1/2c.

ARCHBISHOP MULLER RESIGNS AS LEADER OF GERMAN CHURCH

BERLIN, Nov. 1:—The growing wave in favor of a free church in Germany which has gained in intensity since President Adolf Hitler dropped his plan for state domination of religious worship culminated yesterday in the resignation of Archbishop Ludwig Muller, head of the Nazi Church, which was to have been the state religious body of the Reich.

Defence Motion For Freeing Of Insull is Denied

CHICAGO, Nov. 1:—Judge James J. Wilkerson in Federal Court here yesterday refused a petition of defence for a direction of the jury to return a verdict of not guilty in the case in which Samuel Insull and sixteen co-defendants are charged with using the mails to defraud. The defence, therefore, being required to present its case, Floyd Thompson, chief defence counsel, announced Insull himself would take the stand today to tell his version of how his utilities enterprises crashed under the depression.

General Johnson Enters Hospital

Former N. R. A. Director Receiving Treatment For Infected Foot; Not Serious

NEW YORK, Nov. 1:—General Hugh S. Johnson, until recently director of the National Recovery Act, entered hospital here yesterday to receive treatment for an infected foot. His condition is not serious.

CHANCELLOR IS WINNING

Von Schuschnigg's Storm Troopers Victorious in Austrian Elections

VIENNA, Nov. 1: (CP)—Chancellor Kurt von Schuschnigg's Catholic Storm Troopers were leading last night in the returns of the Austrian elections, having already won 20 out of 49 seats with prospects of having several more by the time all results are in. The two principal opposition groups will probably break about even on the balance.

"SMITHY" TO FLY FRIDAY

Australian Ace Expects to Hop From Honolulu to Oakland Tomorrow

HONOLULU, Nov. 1:—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith has definitely set noon Friday as the time of his departure for Oakland, Cal., on the last leg of his trans-Pacific flight. By that time storms which have been blowing down out of Alaska during the past few days are expected to have passed over. If Kingsford-Smith is able to get away at noon Friday, he should reach Oakland early Saturday morning, possibly about 7 a.m.

Three Killed In Bombing of Large Store in Havana

HAVANA, Nov. 1:—Three persons were killed yesterday when a bomb was exploded in the Casa Grande, Havana's largest department store. The bombing is believed to have been the work of anti-government terrorists.

National Foreign Trade Conference Opens in Gotham

NEW YORK, Nov. 1:—Mayor Fiorella LaGuardia welcomed delegates yesterday at the opening of the National Foreign Trade Conference. Secretary of Commerce Roper was also a speaker following the mayor.

CHARGES OF FAVORITISM ARE DENIED

LONDON, Nov. 1: (CP)—Answering charges arising out of the recent United States Senate probe on armament manufacture of the nations, Sir Bolton Eyres Monsell, First Lord of the Admiralty, denied in the House of Commons yesterday that there had been favoritism in the granting of contracts by the government for building of submarines to certain shipbuilding concerns. In fact, declared Sir Bolton, expenditures had on some occasions been higher than had been estimated in order that the work might be spread around among various yards.

A full independent inquiry into letting of contracts for naval construction would be welcomed by his department, said the First Lord of the Admiralty.

World's Fair At Chicago Closed

Century of Progress Exposition Came to End Last Night After Two Year Struggle

CHICAGO, Nov. 1:—The Century of Progress Exposition came to a close last night with the attendance for this year having passed the 16,000,000 mark during the day in spite of rainy and unpleasant weather. The total attendance for the two years of the World's Fair was in excess of 40,000,000 persons.

BENNETT HAS LAST WORD FOR STEVENS

OTTAWA, Nov. 1: (CP)—Issuing a brief reply last night to the latest statement of Hon. H. H. Stevens in regard to the latter's resignation as minister of trade and commerce and chairman of the mass buying and price spreads committee, Premier R. B. Bennett expressed the opinion that no useful purpose would be served by continuing the correspondence on the subject. Mr. Bennett again pointed out that the way had been left open for Mr. Stevens to clear the matter up without resigning from the government had he cared to do so.

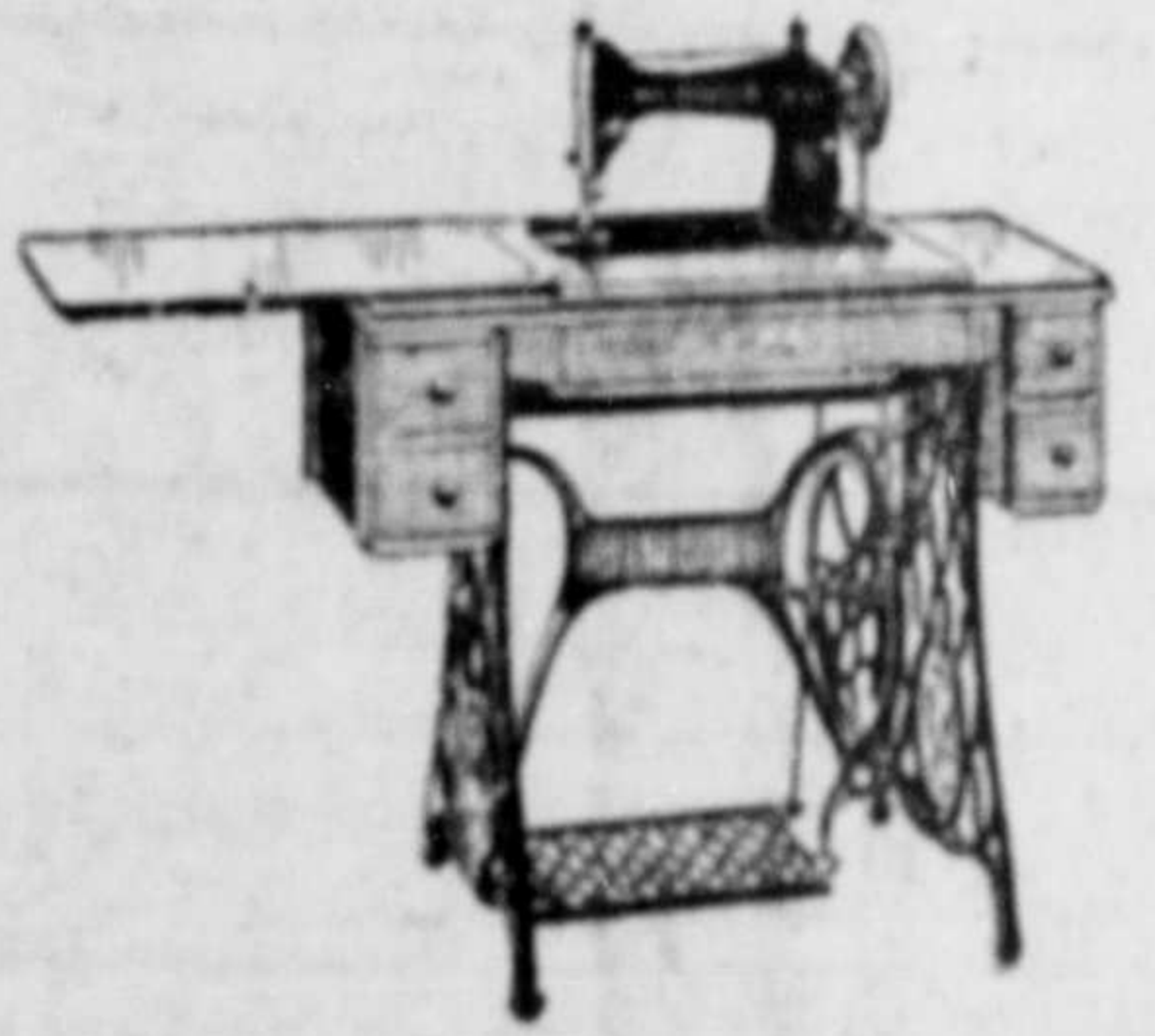
Young Hazelton Boy Has Bullet Wound in Chest
