INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 30:—The entire state of Indianapolis is threatened with darkness as a result of the prospect of a general strike of electrical workers in demand for increased wages.

Preparations Being Made For Largest Mine Blast World Has Ever Seen at Anyox Next Month

In preparation for the largest mining blast the world has ever seen the whole of the village at Hidden Creek mine near Anyox numbering about one thousand people will be evacuated toward the middle of November and the shot that will move mountains will be fired from a point two miles distant in the town of Anyox. Work in preparation for this blast has been going on for the past year. Tunnels have been driven and wiring is being carried out, miles of it, all connected with the one main cable.

Last year a big shot was fired which broke about 300,000 tons of ore. It was a tremendous blast but this one is to exceed all others either at Anyox or at any place or time in the history of mining, half a million tons of ore being the ob-

jective. To secure this 100 tons of dynamite will be exploded at one time, some of it as much as eight hundred feet below the surface, the average depth being about four hundred feet.

The blast is designed as a cheap method of cleaning up old workings of the mine at Hidden Creek from which much ore has already been taken. In order that the other parts of the mine may not be closed as a result, a new entrance tunnel has been driven, far enough away from the big blast to insure that it will not be injured.

It is estimated that by this method of mining the cost of production will be cut down very considerably. The method has been used at other places, one well known case being that in Colorado when fifty tons of dynamite was used at one time in the Climax Molybdenum.

It is quite possible that some of the buildings in the mine village will be wrecked but, as none of them are of a permanent character, the loss will be little. No living creature will, of course, be allowed within the radius of the blast when it is set off.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30:—In spite of the gratification expressed by banking and financial interests over President Roosevelt's recent enunciation of administration policy as expressed last week before the annual convention of the American Bankers' Association, stocks continued dull and irregular yesterday in narrow range in New York. The day's turnover amounted to only 430,000 shares. Industrial average at closing was 92.53, off 33; rails, 34.69, off .29; utilities, 19.13, off .06, and bonds, 93.49, off .03.

Bondholders Must Take Interest Offered Them Or Go Without, Stated

Situation is Placed Clearly Before Financial Bureau of
Vancouver Board of Trade by Hon. A. Wells Gray
In Address on Monday

VICTORIA, Oct. 30: (CP)—If bondholders of financially embarrassed British Columbia municipalities are not willing to take the rate of interest offered them they may expect no interest for five and possibly ten years, Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of municipal affairs, declared yesterday in addressing the financial bureau of the Vancouver Board of Trade. He said that in Ontario from fifty to sixty municipalities had defaulted. The British Columbia government had simply advised defaulting municipalities to make some amicable settlement with their creditors. The government's commissioners in North Vancouver and Burnaby had given their opinions that their municipalities could not pay any interest and he had urged them to try and pay one percent with revision every three years and no interest of more than four percent for twenty-five years.

Kingsford-Smith Waiting to Make Hop to California

HONOLULU, Oct. 30: (CP)—Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith's time for the flight here from Suva yesterday was officially computed at 25 hours and five minutes, the distance being 3000 miles. Sir Charles is impatiently awaiting suitable conditions for the take-off on the final 2500-mile stage of his trans-Pacific flight from here to Oakland, Cal. However, it may be several days before he is able to get away owing to gathering storms. The famous Australian flyer was resting at a local hotel last night.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 30:—Rt. Rev. Isaac O. Stringer, Anglican Bishop of Rupert's Land, collapsed on the street here this afternoon and died shortly afterwards in the office of the Synod. Physicians said death was caused by a stroke. He was a pioneer in the Yukon field.

Lake Erie Has Severe Storm And Earthquake

Shipping Disrupted by 56-Mile Gale—Man Drowns When Boat Capsizes

ERIE, Pa., Oct. 30: (CP)—Shipping on the United States side of Lake Erie was disrupted by a 56-mile gale at the week-end. One man was drowned when a boat capsized. A number of smaller craft met with mishaps.

Yesterday this city was shaken by an earthquake which was felt all along the lake. There was intense excitement but no injuries.
