CONDITIONS IN GENERAL

Evidently the unsound financial condition of municipalities is general, Hon, A. Wells Gray, minister of municipal affairs, says that between fifty and sixty municipalities have defaulted in Ontario whereas the number in F British Columbia is very small and only two are in such a] condition that they are unable to pay anything. While Prince Rupert is being administered by a commissioner, the city could carry on if the rate of interest were cut to the proposed four percent. This would still give the bond-F holders a fair return on their investment. As soon as financial conditions begin to improve, the city will be able to pay its way provided the adjustment is made and the time of payment extended. If this is not accepted by the bondholders, it is quite likely the creditors will get very little. Refusing to pay becomes a habit if allowed to continue.

So far there has been a good response to the suggestions of the commissioner that the bonds be refunded and that the rate of interest be cut to four percent. Many have accepted the proposal and, doubtless, the commissioner will refuse to pay the higher rate anyway. It would be to the advantage of the city and of the bondholders to have a sufficient number of acceptances for the commissioner to re- sunday commend to the legislature that the new refunding proposal be enacted into law.

Czecho-Slovakian divisions and one American regiment, assumed the offensive in the Trentino and along the Piave River against the Austro-Hungarians and speedily achieved one of the overwhelming victories, not only of the Great War, but of history. Three hundred and fifty thousand prisoners and five thousand guns were taken and, after a ten-day battle, the remnant of the 63 Austro-Hungarian divisions that participated in the final battle of Vittorio Veneto were nothing more than disorganized mobs fleeing for safety.

On November 4, military representatives of the falling dual monarchy signed with the Allies an armistice that amounted practically to a complete capitulation. A revolution in Austro-Hungary followed the armistice and Emperor Charles, the last of the Hapsburgs, passed into oblivion. Hence why the Italians celebrate the armistice on November 4.

With the last ally gone, Germany stood alone facing a world of determined enemies. On November Prince Maximilian of Baden, who had recently become imperial chancellor, sent President Wilson a request for an armistice which was signed on November 11.

TRAIN IS DERAILED

Tie-Up on Line of Canadian National West of Prince George Is Cause of Delay


