MARKETING ACT HAS PASSED HOUSE

ALASKA STEAMERS TO MOVE FROM PUGET SOUND TODAY

Contentious Measure Gets Third Reading By Vote of 85 to 35

Amendment by Leader of Opposition Which Would Have Put House in Committee of Whole to Consider Bill Was Rejected Earlier in Day

OTTAWA, June 8: (CP)—Climaxing weeks of bitter debate, the House of Commons last night divided 85 to 35 to give third reading to the Marketing Act. Earlier in the day the House defeated 93 to 44 a motion by Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, leader of the Opposition, that the bill be referred back to a committee of the whole House for amendments.

LONDON, June 8:—Official quarters state here that the government will not accept disarmament proposals made at Geneva by Louis Barthou, French foreign minister.

NEW HEAD OF CHURCH

Rev. J. S. Short of Barrie Ont., Succeeds Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant As Moderator

TORONTO, June 8: (CP)—Rev. J. S. Short of Barrie, Ont., was elected moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. He succeeds Rev. Dr. H. R. Grant of Fort William, formerly of Prince Rupert, who was the moderator last year.

Agreement Is Reached Between Longshoremen and Seattle Shippers

End of Pacific Coast Tie-up Appears in Sight—Joint Announcement Made by Stevedores' President and Mayor Smith

SEATTLE, June 8: (CP)—An agreement by which Alaska shipping will resume operations from this port was reached by strikers and shippers last night, President Joseph Ryan of the International Longshoremen's Association and Mayor Charles Smith announced jointly. "Alaska ships should be moving by Friday," Mr. Ryan said.

WINNERS IN SWEEPSTAKE

British Columbia Does Not Figure In Major Awards in Army & Navy Veterans Lottery

MONTREAL, June 8:—In the twenty-third drawing of the Army & Navy Veterans' Quebec Unit, No. 33, Charity Sweepstake on the Epson Derby, the total pool received was \$385,876. Sixty-five percent of this sum, amounting to \$250,819, goes out in prize money.

BUFFALO CENSURED

Infant and Maternal Mortality is High There Owing to Lax Health Department

BUFFALO, N.Y., June 8:—Dr. W. H. Walsh of Chicago—sweepingly censured Buffalo's health department yesterday, charging lax administration and political control resulting in increased infant and maternal mortality as compared with other large cities.

PARIS, June 8:—A Parliamentary commission, after three months of hearings, justified firing upon rioters in the Place de la Concorde on February 6.

PLAY SAFE ON CREDIT

Simpson's Lost Little Although Much of Business Was Done That Way

OTTAWA, June 8:—A highlight of the evidence adduced before the mass buying and price spreads committee presided over by Hon. H. H. Stevens, minister of trade and commerce, in investigating the affairs of Robert Simpson Ltd. and subsidiary companies, was that while 41.5% of the company's Toronto business was on a credit basis, loss on credit sales over a period of ten years was less than one percent.

IDENTIFIED AS KILLER

Witness and Fingerprints Point to Brooklyn Man as Trio Slayer in Alaska 18 Years Ago

BROOKLYN, N.Y., June 8: (CP)—A one-time sourdough, who munched the Yukon trails as "Kid" Allen, pointed to Thomas P. Jensen, aged 51, in homicide court here Wednesday and identified him as "Blueberry Tom" Jensen, wanted for a triple killing in Alaska in 1916. Department of Justice officials said that his fingerprints were those of "Blueberry Tom" Jensen, wanted for the slaying of "Sweet Marie" Schmidt, a dance hall girl; "Fiddler John" Holdenbird and Frank Adams and the theft of \$9000 in gold dust from them.

Curate of Church at Norwich, Eng., and Fisherman Near St. John's Struck

NORWICH, Eng., June 8:—Rev. Kenneth King, curate of St. Helen's, Lancashire, and formerly of Emmanuel College, Saskatoon, was killed here by lightning.

OFFICIALS TAKE LESS

OTTAWA, June 8: (CP)—Drastic salary cuts of Canadian National Railway executive officers were revealed yesterday by C. P. Fullerton, chairman of the board of trustees, before the railway committee of the House of Commons in answering J. A. Fraser, Conservative member for Cariboo. The number of officials receiving \$15,000 or more has dwindled from 36 to an even half dozen now and total compensation from \$677,000 in 1931 to \$117,000. Personal expenses have also dropped by a similar ratio, Mr. Fullerton said.

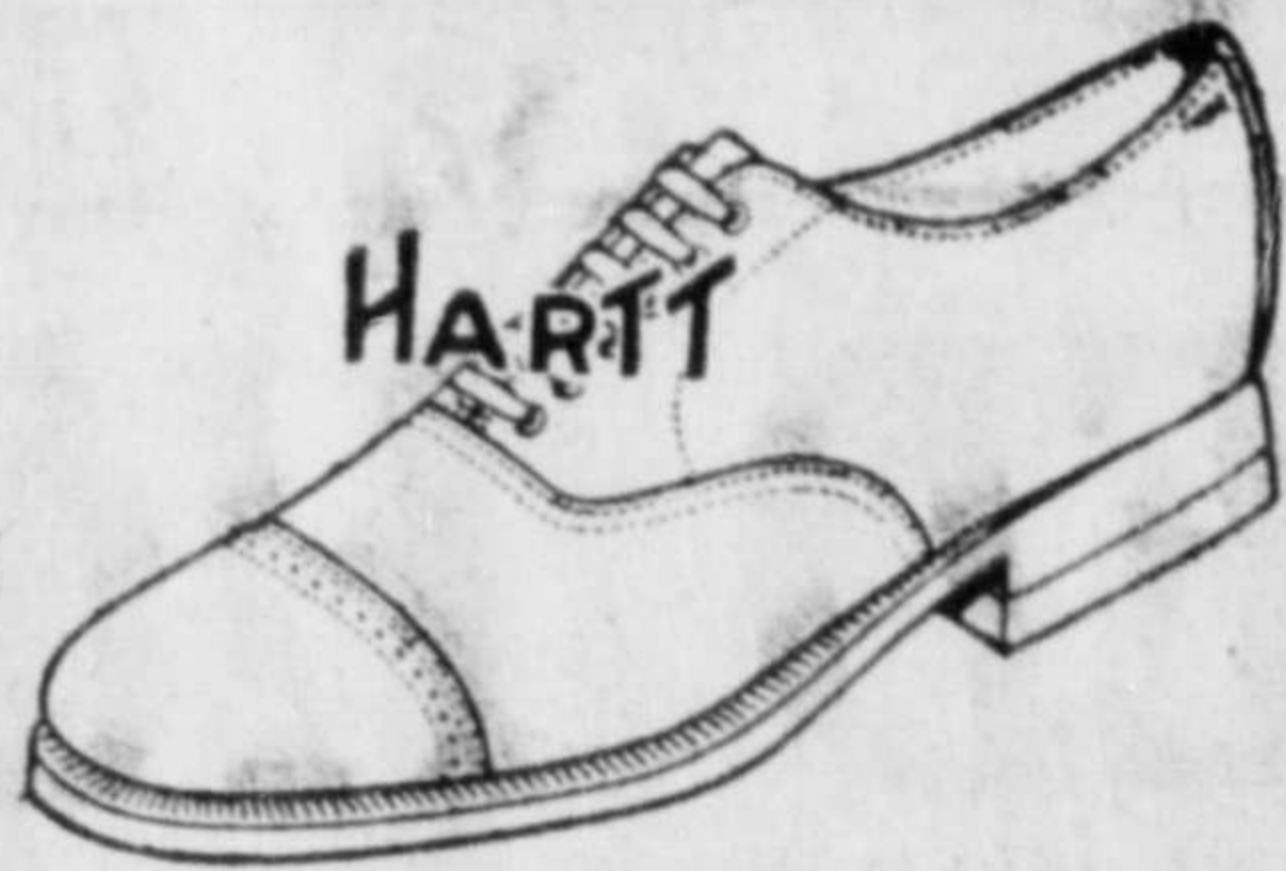
SERIOUS FIRE VISITS BUSINESS SECTION OF ALASKA CITY TODAY

REVIVAL OF INTEREST

It is rather refreshing to find considerable interest again taken in the establishment of a pulp industry at Prince Rupert. A good deal of money is being spent on organization work which would not be expended unless those doing the work felt pretty certain of success. The advantages of the city as a central point with water and rail transportation and a plentiful supply of suitable timber has a strong appeal to those who have money to invest. While we must not be too sanguine of any immediate action we can well expect that this will be one of the industries to be established here eventually and possibly in the near future.

DRAWBACK OF OFFICE

Since Prince Rupert's member has been head of the British Columbia government he has found it impossible to begin to fill all the engagements which he would like to accept. Many organizations have asked him to give addresses and others to take part in various functions. He has had to refuse practically all of these invitations because of the drain they make upon his time. There have been affairs of greater moment which needed attention.

In order to give time for attention to the business of the province, the Premier appointed an assistant who attends to much of the detail. This has been criticized but it was necessary if the best results were to be secured. What we all wish is results.

HOW TO MAKE ICED TEA

Infuse six heaping teaspoons of Salada Black Tea in a pint of fresh boiling water. After six minutes strain liquid into two-quart container. While hot, add 1 1/2 cups of granulated sugar and the juice of 2 lemons. Stir well until sugar is dissolved. Fill container with cold water. Do not allow tea to cool before adding the cold water; otherwise liquid will become cloudy. Serve with chipped ice.
