EXPORT MARKET

Since the market for Canadian grain has been restricted by the action of most European and other buying countries in placing prohibitive tariffs on imports, it is becoming necessary for Canada to produce livestock, dairy products, poultry and eggs and anything that finds a ready market.

One difficulty in connection with the raising of stock is that local freights from the prairies to the coast are much higher on grain to be consumed locally than on export grain. The result is that prices are too high in British Columbia to allow farmers and poultry raisers to import for feed purposes. We are not criticizing the railways but simply pointing out a condition that makes it difficult to dispose of prairie grain in British Columbia. If B.C. feeders could secure prairie grain at anything like export prices they could use much more than they do at present and thus help out the grain growers.




