LETHBRIDGE, Alta., Aug. 16: (CP)-Thousands of acres of crops, mostly wheat, are in ruins, having been destroved by the most devastating storm to strike Southern Alberta in years. The loss is estimated at more than \$500,-000. The storm struck late yesterday and had abated somewhat today.

W. E. Duperow, Well Known In Prince Rupert, Passes Away In Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, Aug. 16: (CP)-W. E. Duperow, aged 62, assistant to the passenger traffic manager of the Canadian National Railways and for many years general passenger agent for the old Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, passed away here Tuesday night following a long illness.

The late Mr. Duperow, who was one of the best known railwaymen in Western Canada, while identified with the old Grand Trunk Pacific Co., made frequent visits to Prince Rupert in the early days and was very popular here. The station of Perow in the Bulkley Valley was named for him.

Born in Stratford, Ont., September 4, 1872, Mr. Duperow was educated in the schools of that city and entered the service of the Grand Trunk Railway at the age of 21 years, holding various positions until he finally became chief clerk in the district passenger office in Toronto. In 1902 he left the
