British Team, Near Melbourne Today, Appear Almost Sure To Win England-Australian Flight

Fokker Plane On Way to Carcross Makes Stop Here

Dutchmen Still Holding Second Place Today With Americans Third—Col. and Mrs. James Mollison Forced to Drop Out

PORT DARWIN, Australia, Oct. 22: (CP)—Smashing all records for the flight from England to Australia, the British team of C. W. A. Scott and Campbell Black landed at Port Darwin today and, after making repairs to their engine, hopped off for Charleville, 1400 miles away. The next hop of 750 miles from Charleville would bring them to Melbourne. They were only two days and four hours out of London on arriving here.

Experiencing motor trouble between Karachi and Allahabad, India, Capt. and Mrs. James Mollison, after having held a good lead, were forced to return to Karachi twice on Sunday and, after reaching Allahabad, were forced to drop out of the race.

The Dutch team of K. D. Parmenter and J. J. Moll were still in second place late today, being enroute from Batavia to Port Darwin.

Scott Has Substantial Lead In England to Melbourne Air Race With Dutchmen in Second Place

SINGAPORE, Straits Settlements, Oct. 22: (CP)—With Capt. and Mrs. James Mollison having dropped into fourth place after their plane had developed engine trouble between Bagdad and Karachi, C. W. A. Scott and Campbell Black were some 1300 miles ahead of the Dutch commercial fliers, K. D. Parmenter and J. J. Moll, on leaving here for Port Darwin, Australia, early this morning on the fourth lap of the England to Melbourne air race.

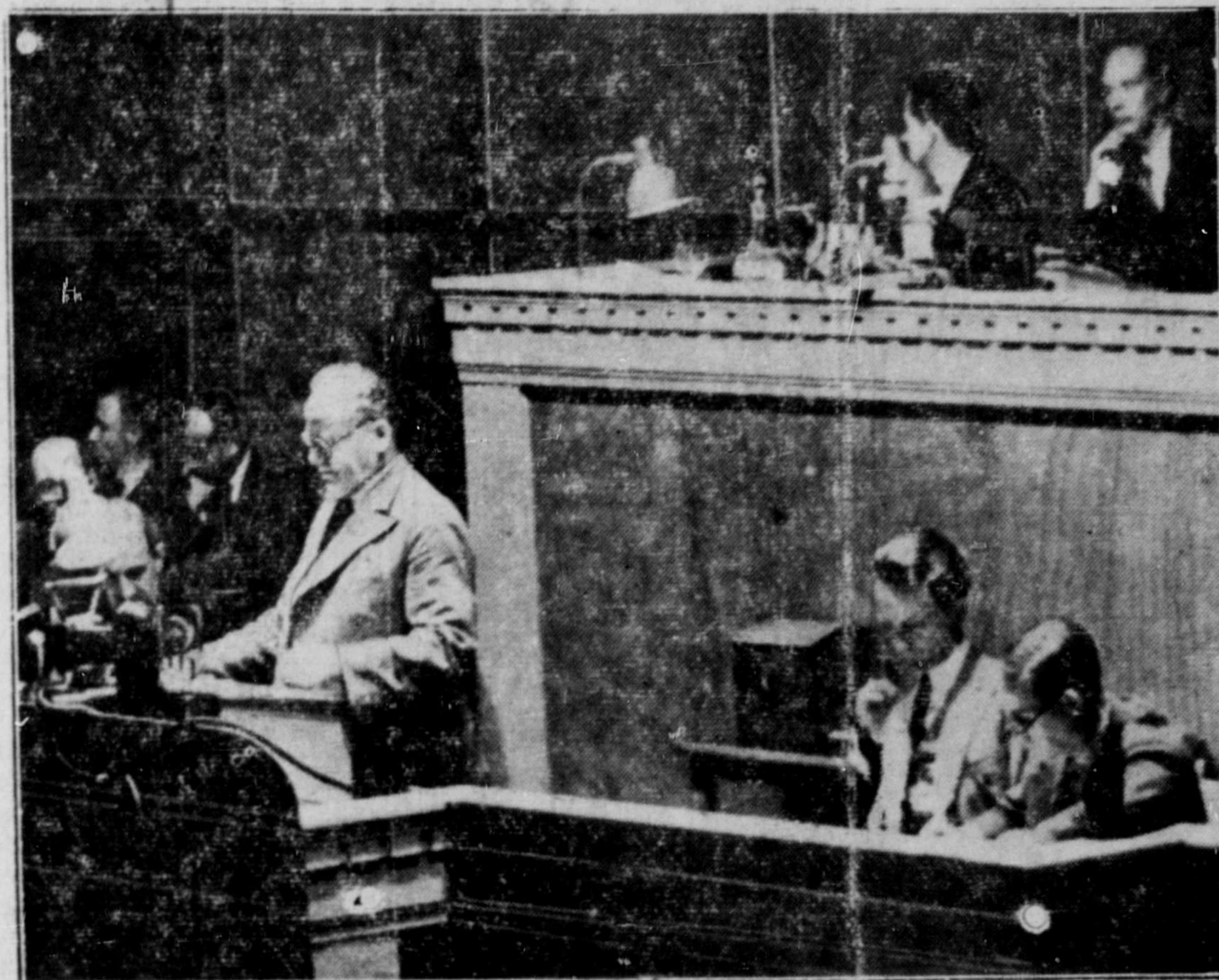
Government House Of St. Pierre And Miquelon Burned

Following the church service, interment was made in Fairview Cemetery, a long cortège following the cortege to the final resting place. Pallbearers were S. D. Macdonald, W. M. Brown, J. R. Mitchell, J. S. Irvine, George Scott and W. Vaughan Davies.

KINGSFORD-SMITH IS SAFE AT SUVA

SUVA, Fiji Islands, Oct. 22: (CP)—Having completed the 1700-mile flight from Brisbane in eleven hours and 45 minutes despite adverse winds, clouds and rain squalls, Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith landed here Sunday, narrowly escaping a crash in a grove of trees on coming down. After a brief rest, he planned on hopping off on the next leg of his trans-Pacific flight to Honolulu enroute to Oakland, Cal., but found it necessary, on account of heavy rains, to postpone the take-off until Wednesday. He will probably land at Fanning Island, 1200 miles north of here, enroute to Honolulu.

Eighty-Mile Southeaster Sweeps Northwest and Sixteen Dead Result

Brother-in-Law of British Columbia Judge is Victim While Hunting Near New Westminster—Five Drown When Puget Sound Fishing Boat Sinks

SEATTLE, Oct. 22: (CP)—At least sixteen persons were killed in the Pacific Northwest as a result of a fierce eighty-mile southeast gale which swept the lower mainland of British Columbia and the Washington and Oregon coasts on Sunday. The big liner President Madison pulled away from her dock when her mooring lines were broken in the storm. Small buildings collapsed and poles and trees were blown down in the residential section of the city.

Five men aboard the Seattle fishing boat Agnes were drowned when the craft foundered off Point Wilson. Other lives were lost in falling buildings and as a result of high tension wires dropping.

Near Portland a steamer was blown ashore, the storm being particularly severe off the Columbia River.

Telegraphic communication to Vancouver was cut off for a time. Westminister Man Drowned VANCOUVER, Oct. 22: (CP)—K. C. MacGown of New Westminister, brother-in-law of Mr. Justice W. G. McQuarrie, was believed drowned while duck hunting on Sunday during a southeast gale while reaching a velocity of fifty miles per hour.

Thousands of dollars damage was caused in Vancouver and New Westminister as a result of the storm. Windows were broken, poles and wires were blown down and there was other property damage.

Victoria Feels It VICTORIA, Oct. 22: (CP)—A 60-mile gale blew here yesterday with the barometer dropping to 28.95. Many windows were smashed and other property damage done.

Lorne Brockett, son of one of the dead men, was seriously injured.

FINE CO-OPERATION

The co-operation of the minister of trade and commerce in aiding the shipment of logs from this port is a splendid thing. It should help considerably in overcoming any handicap there may be against this port which has kept it from being used as an export outlet. While the total sum provided is not large, it is a beginning and should prove valuable in promoting the shipments.

DON'T LIKE MILITARISM

"I don't like militarism," was the expression used by a Prince Rupert man yesterday. It is one we have used editorially in these columns many times. Few like it, more especially those who have been through a campaign, but we have to face facts.

The whole world is arming. Particularly is it noticeable in our neighbors across the Pacific. One of our next door neighbors has gone arms crazy and no one knows in what direction she may strike out next. We are in a very vulnerable position and we should feel much more comfortable if the port of Prince Rupert were suitably fortified. Forts at Victoria do not help us in the least. Many Prince Rupert boys belong to the Naval Reserve but that is not sufficient. Our two tiny warships would avail little if we were attacked. We thoroughly agree with the sentiment that war is hell but we would hate to have to run and leave our homes if our coast were invaded.

THE BIG AIR RACE

The big England to Australia air race is demonstrating that aviation still is a long way from being perfected. The fact that several fliers have dropped out indicates that either they or their machines were not near enough perfect to be able to stand the strain of the long flights. It also demonstrates that there have been great advances in the science since the earlier flights over the same area.

The world is watching the event with great interest and people of each nation are hoping their own representatives will win.
