

# Action In Respect To War Debts Considered By President of U.S.

Thirteen Nations Will Have Obligations Coming Due on June 15 and Expectation is That All Will Default, Partially at Least

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 10:-President Franklin D. Roosevelt is reported to be preparing to send a message to Congress recommending that no further "token" payments on war debt payments to the United States be accepted as indication of good faith on the part of debtor nations. On June 15 next war debt payments from thirteen

and present indications are that none will meet the payments in PEACE ON full, not even Finland which has never defaulted as yet.

There is some discusion in official quarters here as to whether the making of a "token payment" removes the nation making such payment from the category of default in a technical sense. Great Britain, It is expected, will make another token payment on this oceasion as

United States Mine Sweeper on Way High To Aleutians to Put in Here Overnight

United States Consul G. C. Woodward received a wireless message British Horse today from the mine sweeper Gannett, one of the vessels of a squadron of six air and seven naval craft which is on its way from San Diego to the Aleutian Islands, announcing that she would arrive here late this afternoon and be in port until tomorrow.

The Gannett is a single screw vessel of 840 tons displacement, 174 feet in length, 35 feet five inches power. The personnel consists of five officers and 57 men. There is no indication as yet as

to whether the other vessels of the squadron will put in here.
