Are Bachelors

All Profiteers?

Are single men all profiteers? That is a question that has been discussed of late. It has been suggested that all single men are getting more than their share of the good things of life. The married man not only keeps himself, but his wife and family also. He has double, treble or quadruple the cost of upkeep that the other has, and yet he does not earn any more. In order to set things on a right and equitable basis it is argued that the bachelor or widower without children should be taxed in order to provide for the children of the married people.

A feeble argument in favor of the bachelor has been put up. It is argued that as he leads a lonely life he requires more sustenance, that he must have plenty of amusement of the kind that costs money. He spends much more for clothes, because forsooth his socks wear out and there is no one to darn them and the gray gathers on his coat front because there is no one to take it off, and he is forced to purchase new clothes. It is said that if the bachelor did not spend plenty of money, the clothing stores would go out of business, the barbers would not make as much because the boys would have to shave themselves, the fruit and candy stores would sell less, especially of the expensive varieties, etc., etc., ad nauseum. What is forgotten is that if these same young men were married and had children they would need more clothes, shoes, doctors, nurses, furniture, houses, helpers, drug supplies, toys, ice cream, chewing gum, candy on a stick, and hundreds of other things not dreamed of by the single person.

The bonusing of mothers has been seriously discussed for some time past. There is a general feeling that the young couple that bravely faces the real problems of life should not have to be handicapped because they are doing their duty to the country. Young Canadians would be of far more value to the country than immigrants and who should pay for it, say the economists, but the boys and girls who are now running around frittering away their time and caring not a straw whether there is a coming generation or not.

But "profiteers" was the subject. If the single and childless married people get more than their share of the good things of life, the family men and women are the ones who get less than their share and are therefore among the exploited.

New Docks for This Coast.

It looks as if there would be plenty of drydocks on the British Pacific before long. The despatches yesterday told of the choosing of a site by the government representatives at Esquimalt for a big graving dock to be built by the government, presumably for the naval department. Another despatch a few days ago told of the clearing of the site for a dock in Vancouver to be built, presumably, under a government guarantee. Those two docks, if they are completed, together with the dock at Prince Rupert and the dock already in use at Esquimalt, should fill all needs for many years to come. Possibly when the Vancouver people find that there is a dock really going to be built at Esquimalt they will not go ahead with theirs.

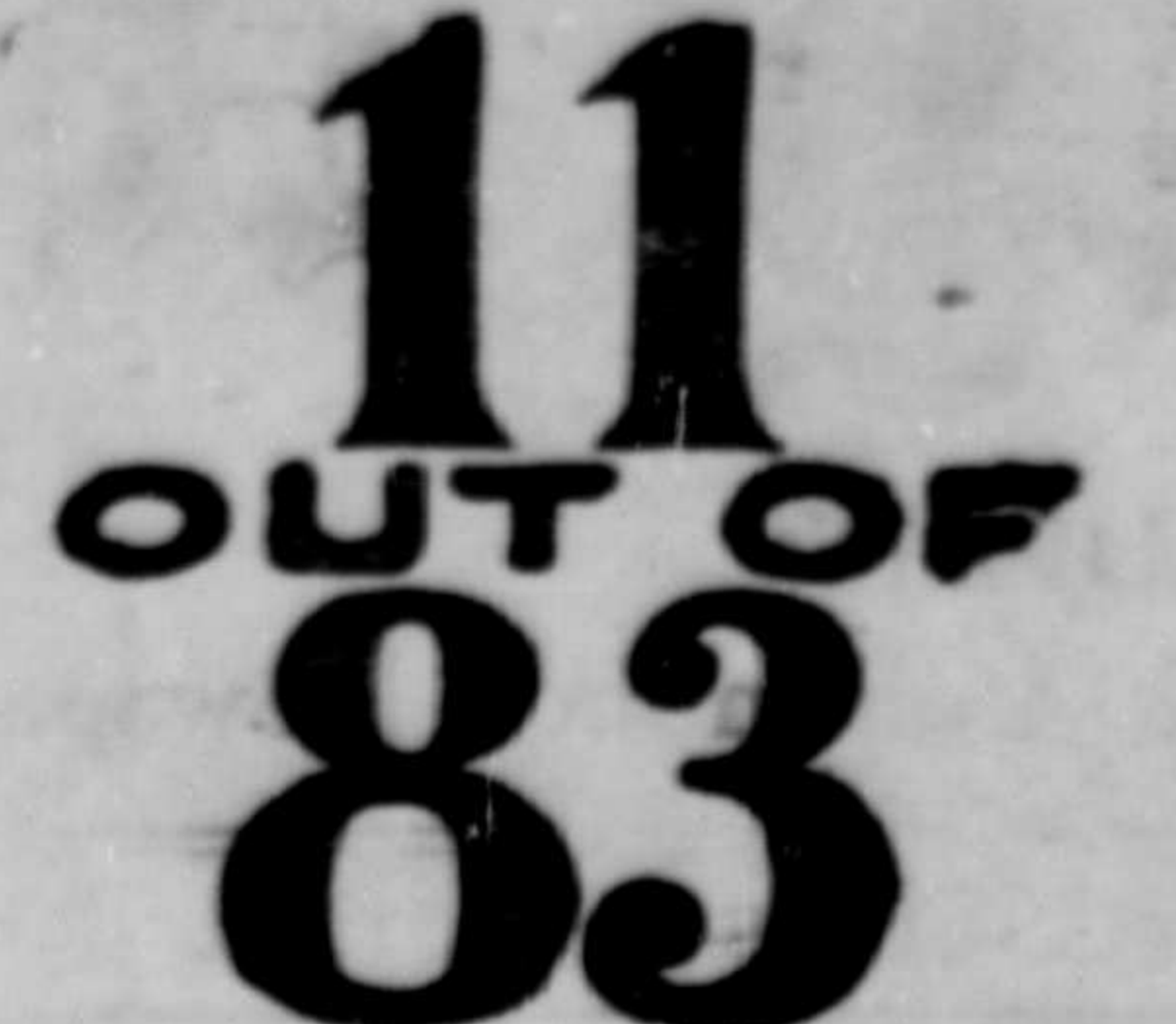

On Tuesday a forty horse train set out with all kinds of supplies for Fort Babine which is about fifty miles from Hazelton and is still a Hudson's Bay post. Soon it will be impossible to take freight in there except by dogs and the packers are kept very busy just now rushing supplies in. Each horse packs about 300 pounds and the journey is made in spells, it taking four or five days to make the trip.

Last Sunday two of the younger huntsmen of the city had a rather stirring experience across the bay. Sidney Bazzett-Jones and Alex Rix went out in the morning on the trail of the wary deer and, evidently, must have looked too long and too far. At any rate they got lost and stayed out till well into the night when they got their bearings by the moon. Sometimes people lose their bearings by moonlight, but not these huntsmen. They got no deer but they got home.

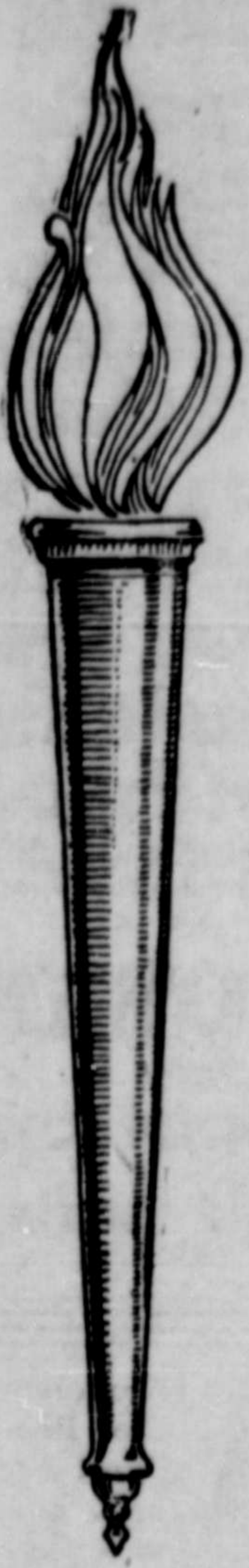
