FAIR TRADING IN PROVINCE URGED

CANNED SALMON INSPECTION FEES UNDER FIRE IN HOUSE

Tax Upon Mail Order Business Advocated By Retail Merchants

Delegation Appears Before Provincial Government at Victoria Today With Suggestions—Setting Up Of Board of Ethics is Asked

VICTORIA, March 13: (CP)—Formation of a board to enforce "fair trading practices" and establishment of a system of taxation on mail order business in British Columbia was urged upon the provincial government today by a delegation representing the provincial branch of the Retail Merchants' Association.

LIBERALS IN FAVOR

Support Eight Hour Day, Unemployment Insurance and Minimum Wage Bills

King's Statement

B. C. Members Seek Exclusion Of Fish Processors—Insurance Bill Passes

OTTAWA, March 13: (CP)—Hon. W. A. Gordon, minister of labor, announced yesterday that eight-hour day and forty-eight hour week legislation would become effective when passed by Parliament but industry would be allowed three months in which to adjust its staffs before penalties are assessed for infractions.

British Columbia members are endeavoring to have fish plants and canneries excluded from eight-hour day legislation.

Although believing each of them was beyond the competence of Parliament, Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, Leader of the Opposition, in reading a carefully prepared statement to the House of Commons yesterday said that Liberal members would vote for an employment insurance, eight-hour day and minimum wage bills. In view of the continued illness of Premier Bennett Mr. King gave assurance to the government of the help of the Liberal party in the quick passage of the government's social legislation.

With only three members opposing it on the grounds that it was entirely inadequate, the unemployment insurance bill was put through all its stages by the House last night. The dissenting members were E. J. Garland, U. F. A., Bow River, Alta.; Henri Bourassa, Independent, Labelle, and J. F. Pouliot, Liberal, Temiscanata. The vote on the third reading was 123 to three.

MUST HALIBUT CATCH OF SEASON HERE BUT NOT SOLD UP TO NOON

The local halibut boat Embala, which had been out for black cod but which failed to obtain any so took a load of 8,000 pounds of halibut, is in port today. Up to noon, the catch, the first of halibut to be brought here so far this season, had not been sold.

Senate Rejects Townsend Plan

Old Age Pension Plan Fails to Find Favor With Upper House in California

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 13:—The California State Senate yesterday by a vote of 21 to 17 rejected the resolution asking the national congress to enact the Townsend old age pension plan which had been endorsed the previous day by the House of Assembly.

Longer Mayoralty Term in Seattle Rejected Tuesday

SEATTLE, March 13:—The electors of Seattle yesterday emphatically rejected a proposal to extend the term of mayoralty office from two to four years.

Egg Production in States Down

Lowest Record in Ten Years Recorded by Department of Agriculture

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 13:—According to Department of Agriculture statistics egg production in the United States in February this year was the lowest in ten years. There were fewer hens in the country on account of high feed prices and severe weather.

Government is Taking Steps to Make Legal Impost Upon Fishing

Neill of Comox-Alberni and Duff of Antigonish-Guysboro Opposed to Charge—Dickie of Nanaimo Defends It

OTTAWA, March 13: (CP)—The House of Commons took the first step last night to legalize the tax which has been collected for the past three years as inspection fees on canned salmon. In the past the fees have been collected under authority of order-in-council. Opposition to the tax from A. W. Neill, Independent member for Comox-Alberni, and William Duff, Liberal member for Antigonish-Guysboro.

Mr. Neill claimed that the fees worked a hardship on the salmon industry. He opposed the inspection fees and defended licence fees as the government spent large sums for protecting the fishermen.

C. H. Dickie, Conservative member for Nanaimo, said that, without inspection and constant vigilance, there would be no salmon on the Pacific Coast.

"Why should a man have to pay a fee for catching fish any more than for growing potatoes or cutting down trees?" asked Mr. Duff.

GENERAL ELECTION NOT EXPECTED NOW UNTIL LATE SUMMER

OTTAWA, March 13: (CP)—Premier R. B. Bennett, whose illness continues, will likely be absent from his duties for another month and it is believed possible that the general election will come much later in the summer than had been at first anticipated.

CALGARY, March 13: (CP)—In the first game of the inter-provincial Allan Cup playdowns here last night, Kimberley Dynamiters of British Columbia defeated Edmonton Superiors by a score of three to one. The game was in three periods, the score being one-all at the end of the first. By the end of the game the ice was covered with water. The second game will be played at Edmonton Thursday night.

The youth was captured by passing citizens and the diamonds recovered.

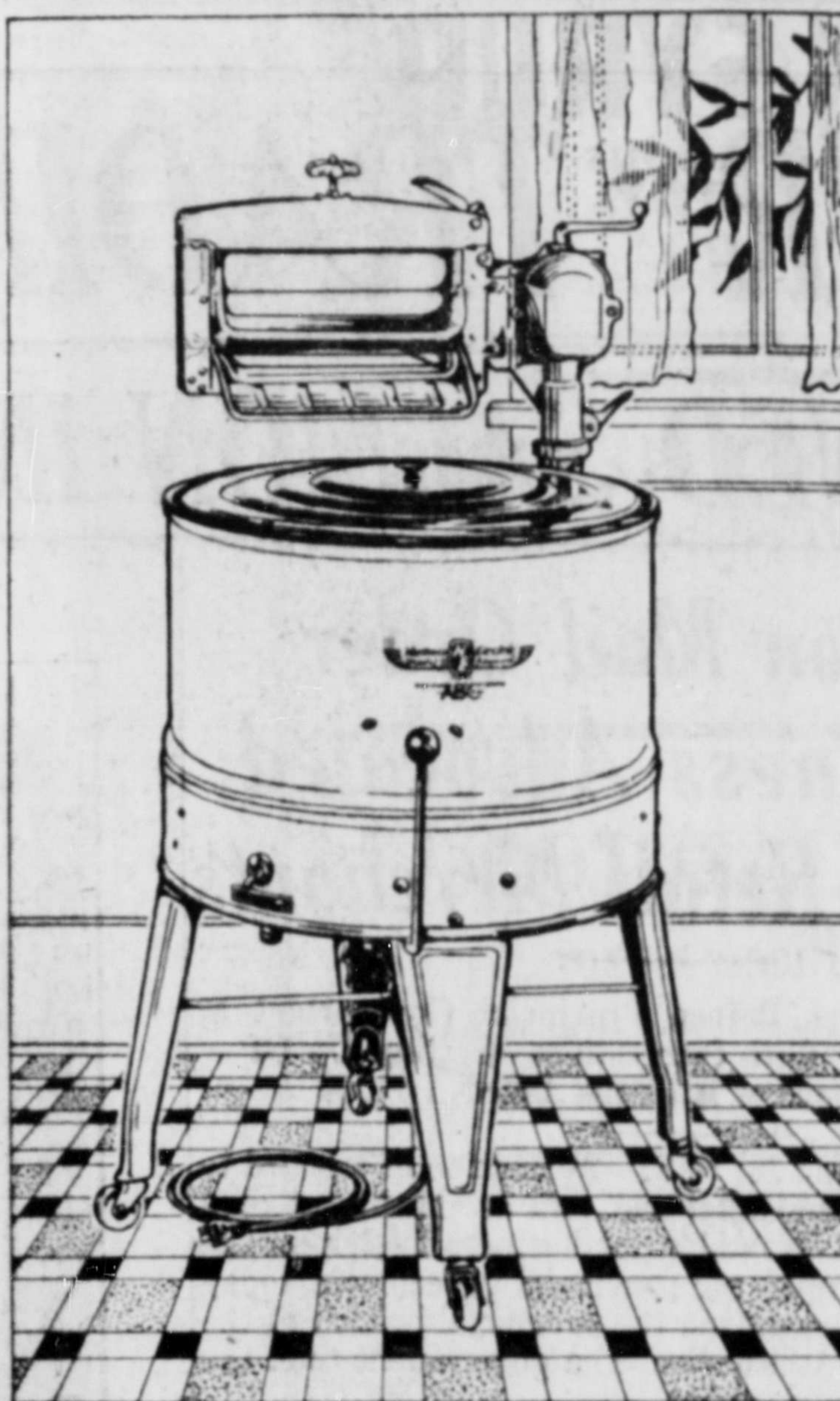

ALASKAN PANHANDLE

Editor, Daily News:—  
There has been quite a lot of talk regarding this panhandle but to my knowledge this has not at any time been taken up in the right channels direct with the United States government.

I would think this matter should be taken up by our next government with a most strenuous appeal to the United States offering to exchange the Alaskan Panhandle for some portion of British Empire of equal value.

The United States is universally regarded as the natural leader in the peace movement and it must not shirk its duty to set the example in mutual concessions. A mere ribbon, 536 miles long and from eight to 35 miles wide, which is shutting off the northern half of British Columbia and the entire Yukon Territory from free access to the Pacific. This territory has an area of 600,000 square miles. It has the same climate as Europe in the same latitude and that part of Europe contains 25,000,000 people.

The Canadian country lying beside this handle has immense resources in lumber, agriculture and mineral lands. Its wealth will necessarily be concentrated in its ports on American territory. This entire slope is drenched with rain and possesses water power. Its factories to be driven by that power will necessarily be in American territory but the reservoirs supplying that power will be on Canadian ground.

The 25,000,000 Canadians who will eventually live behind this handle will constantly be forced to contribute to the enrichment of half a dozen American cities while these cities will not contribute a cent towards Canadian taxes. What a permanent and growing source
