UTAH OIL WELL BLAST KILLS TEN

FOOD SUPPLIES RUN SHORT IN SNOWBOUND B.C. TOWNS

Premature Explosion of Nitro-Glycerine Causes Catastrophe; Derrick Blown Among Onlookers

Twelve Seriously Injured in Addition to Dead—Country-side Rocked For Five Miles—Scores Knocked Down and Trampled

ST. GEORGE, Utah, March 7: (CP)—Ten persons were killed and a dozen others seriously injured late last night when a large charge of nitro-glycerine prematurely exploded as a crowd gathered to watch the spectacular "shooting" of the first oil well in this district. The explosive charge, dropped into the unfinished well, exploded prematurely, ripped the derrick from its moorings and hurled it into the crowd which included a number of women. The terrific blast rocked the countryside for five miles. Scores were knocked down and trampled upon in the mad rush to escape from the blinding flash of flame.

RELIGIOUS RALLY HERE

Close to Five Hundred Persons Attend Witness of Christian Service in Capitol Theatre

Bishop Speaker

Delivered Inspiring Call to Spiritual Devotion—Various Protestant Ministers Take Part

With Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix D.D., Bishop of Caledonia, delivering the address and members of the clergy of various Protestant denominations in the city participating in the service, there was a great religious rally last night in the Capitol Theatre with a congregation approximating some six hundred persons in attendance. It was the opening Service of Witness in connection with a campaign of evangelism which will be conducted throughout the Lenten season in Prince Rupert churches.

Asserting that there had never been a time when men were more inclined to speak of God in connection with the solution of the world's difficulties and that leaders were tending more and more to link themselves up with God, Bishop Rix, in an inspiring message, declared that a new spiritual movement appeared to be developing and appealed for the assistance of the whole man power of Prince Rupert in the endeavor of the clergy to bring people to the service of God and the establishment of His Kingdom on earth.

Today, as in the time of Jesus, declared Bishop Rix, there were enemy elements which were shutting out Christ and preventing the establishment of the Kingdom of God. Among these elements were disbelief, glorified nationalisms, selfish materialism, pursuit of business and pleasure leaving no room for Christ, and, possibly the worst of all, an attitude of indifference which might be termed by some sophistication, by others tolerance and by still others broadmindedness.

The clergy in Prince Rupert as elsewhere, acknowledging their share of responsibility for the failure of delay of the entrance of the Kingdom of God into the world, were sore at heart with things they could see in the lives of the people and of those in charge of affairs. They believed that the remedy lay in the bringing of the Spirit of God and the Life of Jesus Christ among the people. But God wished and needed people to dedicate themselves.

Lardeau and Gerrard In Kootenay District Now in Need of Relief

Airplanes May be Pressed Into Service to Transport Much Needed Supplies Pending Re-opening of Blocked Railway Line

NELSON, March 7: (CP)—Thirty-five people in Lardeau and Gerrard, sixty miles north of Nelson in the Trout Lake district, have been cut off from the outside world since January 10. No mail has been received since then and foodstuffs are now running short, it is reported here. Huge snowdrifts and slides block the railway line from the head of Kootenay Lake. Latest reports state that feed for livestock has been exhausted. Airplanes may be used to take in supplies pending utmost efforts to open the railway line.

Herbert Anscomb and Clive Planta, Independent members for Victoria and Peace River respectively, voted with the government and Hugh Savage, Independent for Cowichan-Newcastle, and Thomas Uphill, Socialist, Fernie, with the Opposition.

ENGAGEMENT IS BROKEN

Adolf Hitler Breaks Appointment With Sir John Simon, British Foreign Secretary

LONDON, March 7:—Pleading a cold, Reichsruerer Adolf Hitler of Germany yesterday cancelled an engagement with Sir John Simon, British foreign secretary, at which it had been planned to discuss problems affecting the peace of western Europe.

Opponents of the government suggested yesterday that Hitler had no cold but had broken the engagement in view of the newly announced British army, naval and air force building program.

The foreign secretary, however, insisted that Hitler really had a cold.

LAKES GET BIG STORM

Lake Superior in Grip of Winter Tempest With Damage Estimated at \$1,000,000

DULUTH, March 7:—Lake Superior was in the grip yesterday of a wild winter storm with heavy wind and intense cold. At least \$1,000,000 damage is estimated to have been done. Throughout the northwest there has been snow.

GOING BACK TO SENATE?

Huey Long Again Changes His Mind—Not to Run For Governor After All, He Says

WASHINGTON, D.C., March 7:—Huey Long has again changed his mind in regard to his future political intentions. He announced yesterday that, instead of running for governor of Louisiana, as he had just intimated, he would run for reelection to the Senate. He still does not expect to be in the presidential field next year.

EL PASO, Texas, March 7:—Forty-five local labor unions have voted in favor of a sympathy strike with power company workers who are demanding concessions from their employers. A complete tie-up of the entire power, traction and electric light service of the city is threatened.

Service in All Soul's Church will be followed by interment in Arlington National Cemetery. There will be full military honors.

BRITISH COLUMBIA'S OPPORTUNITY

A proper outlet for the Peace River will be British Columbia's great opportunity for development. Let the new outlet be built by the best route and Northern British Columbia will flourish like the proverbial green bay tree. It matters little whether the line goes to Prince Rupert or to Stewart, the great thing is for it to be routed directly west from the Peace instead of south.

Any southerly route from the Peace will not serve British Columbia as a whole. It is claimed that it will build up Vancouver, but that city is already too big for the rest of the province. It is out of all proportion in population and size to the rural population. What is needed for British Columbia, including Vancouver, is to develop the northern part of the country and the only railway that will do it as well as serve the interests of the Peace is a line constructed westward from Peace River Pass.

As a first step toward the western outlet it has been suggested that the railway should be extended westerly along the north bank of the Peace River toward Fort St. John. We are in full agreement with that. There are hundreds of settlers already in that country waiting for the railway to come. Tonnage for the railway is already available. Let the railway be built westward into the Peace Pass and the next move will be to continue it westward through British Columbia.

THE ALTERNATIVE

The alternative to the western route is a suggested cut-off at Obed for the purpose of enabling the Alberta farmers to get a slightly more direct outlet to the coast. This would not serve British Columbia. There would be no British Columbia development result from it. For us in Northern British Columbia the only policy that would be beneficial would be a railway line passing through the vast undeveloped part of the country, giving an outlet not only for the farming people of the Peace River Block but also for the farmers in Northern Alberta.

EVANGELISM IS SUBJECT

Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook Inspiring Speaker at Luncheon Of Gyro Club Yesterday

"The Meaning of Evangelism" was the subject of Rev. Canon W. F. Rushbrook, rector of St. Peter's Anglican Church, yesterday in addressing the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club, his message being in connection with the special Lenten campaign of evangelism which is being conducted by the Protestant churches of the city. W. H. Tobey, past president of the club, was in the chair and other guests included Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, and Rev. Lawrence Jensen, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, as well as Peter Sunderland of this city and M. W. McKenzie of Vancouver.

The deeper meaning of evangelism, Canon Rushbrook declared, involved a personal experience. Evangelism was the name given to a movement to introduce Jesus and His teaching into the practical life of today. Belief in Jesus, the speaker declared, was the key to the solution of the vexed problems of the world today. There were two means by which Jesus might be seen, the historical and the experimental means. To see Jesus by the historical means, Canon Rushbrook prescribed study of the biographies of Jesus as given in the first four books of the New Testament. Then there were books apart from the Bible which might be read according to individual choice or requirements. The speaker then went on to refer to some of the work of the evangelists and preachers.

Through knowledge of and familiarity with Jesus and His teachings man would find that the only permanent worth-while values were the moral values. They who thought more of their buildings, of their worldly wealth and, even of their daily work, had not yet found Jesus. After all, man's character was the thing that really mattered.

Needs of Today In closing, Canon Rushbrook read the following quotation:

"The circumstances confronting the world can brook no delay; they require immediate action, if the world is to be saved from greater calamity and suffering. Let the first note be one of deep personal repentance. We all have sinned. We have been a part of the system which has failed, because of its underlying principle—selfishness, the very negation of the Love of God; we have sympathized too much with its ideals, and accepted its standards of life and shared in its benefits. We cannot, therefore, altogether escape responsibility for its consequences. Humbly do we turn to God and confess our sin, 'Father forgive us, we have sinned against Thee and our fellow-men.' Then with unfeigned contrition we consecrate ourselves anew to Christ and co-operate to awaken and recall all the members of the church, which is the Body of Christ, to the sense of their responsibility and privilege, that they may show the Spirit of His Life in every action of their daily lives; and to work enthusiastically to bring the careless, the indifferent, and all those who have lost the consciousness of God into His Way of Life. That is the great purpose of our evangelism."

selves to His service.

"I am not despondent, not hopeless," declared the Bishop. "There is a sign of going in the world today. There has never been a time when men have been more inclined to speak of God in connection with the every day affairs of life. Leaders are linking themselves up with God. Never before there have been seen services of public devotion, such as those recently called in Vancouver and Toronto. In England Baldwin admits the need of the Kingdom of God. There is a movement going on but there is much work to be done in the hearts of each and every one of us. Faith and hope will assure victory. Let us in our corner help to make Canada a Dominion of God, a new heaven and a new earth."

In conclusion, the Bishop appealed to all to do their share in casting out the enemies of Christ, such as disbelief, materialism or indifference. "Let us not idle on the way but put our whole lives and hearts into it," he exhorted.

Form of Service

Rev. Dr. F. W. Dafoc, pastor of First Baptist Church, was chairman of the service. In opening he referred briefly to the need of spiritual uplift in Prince Rupert. He hoped that the present campaign of evangelism would result in a different attitude.

The invocation was led by Canon W. F. Rushbrook, rector of St. Peter's Anglican Church, and there was repetition in unison of the Lord's Prayer.

Adjutant Eva Laycock of the Salvation Army read the Scripture Lesson after which the Apostles' Creed was repeated.

Prayer of intercession was offered by Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, pastor of First Presbyterian Church.

Announcements were made by Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, of a World's Day of Prayer service for women to be held Friday afternoon in First Baptist Church, a united prayer meeting of all denominations in First Baptist Church Friday evening with an overflow meeting in First Presbyterian Church if necessary, and special services in all churches on Sunday dealing with "The Aims of Evangelism." Dean Gibson expressed the appreciation of the Prince Rupert Ministerial Association to the management and staff of the Capitol Theatre, to the Junior Symphony Orchestra, the male quartet and the press for assistance in connection with this meeting. Offertory blessing was also pronounced by Dean Gibson.

The unit has also participated in several sham battles and has attained a high standard of efficiency in musketry and field training.
