Hitlerites Fall Short Ot Two-Thirds Required To Control Baltic Port

FREE CITY OF DANZIG, April 8: (CP)-The Nazis failed by seventeen thousand votes yesterday to create a dictatorship in Danzig in their drive to unite with Germany. 

Turity and Treshness

Users of tobacco in any form are always assured of purity and freshness when they buy a product of the Imperial Tobacco Company. These qualities are achieved only by the practice of eternal vigilance.
