# EUROPEAN SITUATION MUCH EASIER

## Premier Mussolini and Sir Eric Drummond Confer As Cabinet Has Special Meeting in London Today

Ethiopian Warriors Are Marching Toward Border As Precautionary Measure But General Belief is That There Will be no Military Move For At Least Fortnight

LONDON, Sept. 24: (CP)—The British cabinet met today to consider the international situation but no statement was given out. From Rome came the report that relations between Italy and Great Britain seem definitely improved as a result of a conference between Premier Benito Mussolini and Sir Eric Drummond, British ambassador. Addis Ababa reports today stated that warriors were marching toward the border as a precautionary measure against surprise Italian attack. It is generally believed, however, that no military move will be made for at least a fortnight.

### MERGING RAILWAY

Only Way to Prevent Amalgamation is to Vote Liberal, Says Mackenzie King

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., Sept. 24: (CP)—The road to amalgamation of the Canadian railways had been made easier by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett's policy but the Liberal party is pledged to maintenance of the integrity of the Canadian National Railways, Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, declared here last night.

The only sure way to defeat an amalgamation movement was to return a substantial Liberal majority, Mr. King asserted.

### INSURANCE OF HEALTH

Proposed Legislation Considered By Labor Council—\$200 Exemption Objected To

To consider proposed provincial health insurance legislation, the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council held a special meeting last night with President S. D. Macdonald in the chair and a good attendance of delegates.

The meeting indicated that it was in full accord with the principle of health insurance but there are certain features of the proposed legislation to which objection is taken. Chief among those is the proposal that those receiving salaries or wages in excess of \$200 per month should be exempted from the operation of the act. It is the feeling that, through such an exemption, an important source of revenue would be shut off, coming from persons who are in a good position to contribute.

Other features of the proposed legislation were considered.

### STORMY MEETING

Great Clamor Greeted Premier Bennett in Vancouver—Says Japan Will Not Dictate To Canada

VANCOUVER, Sept. 24, (CP)—Premier R. B. Bennett declared, addressing a public meeting here last night, that, so long as his government stood, neither Japan nor any other country would dictate the tariff policies of Canada. He charged Rt. Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King, the Liberal leader, with having taken sides in the dispute.

When Mr. Bennett started his address, his voice was all but drowned by a great clamor from the higher galleries. "These are the people who talk about free speech," he exclaimed. After half an hour, the audience quietened.

### Coal Miners' Strike Seems Quite Likely

NEW YORK, Sept. 24:—With the contending parties still as far apart as ever following collapse at the week-end of latest negotiations, it appears inevitable that the bituminous coal miners' strike, involving 500,000 men, will go into effect this week. The miners are demanding an increase from \$5 to \$5.50 in the basic wage rate and a reduction of from 35 to 30 hours in the working week. The operators so far refuse to meet the demands. The country is estimated to have enough bituminous coal on hand to take care of its requirements for a month and a half.

### HAWAII HAS EARTHQUAKE

Severe Temblor Recorded by Seismograph—Centre 4500 Miles From Honolulu

HONOLULU, Sept. 24:—The most violent earthquake ever recorded by the Hawaiian seismograph was registered late last week. The shock appeared to centre approximately 4500 miles northwest or southeast of Honolulu.

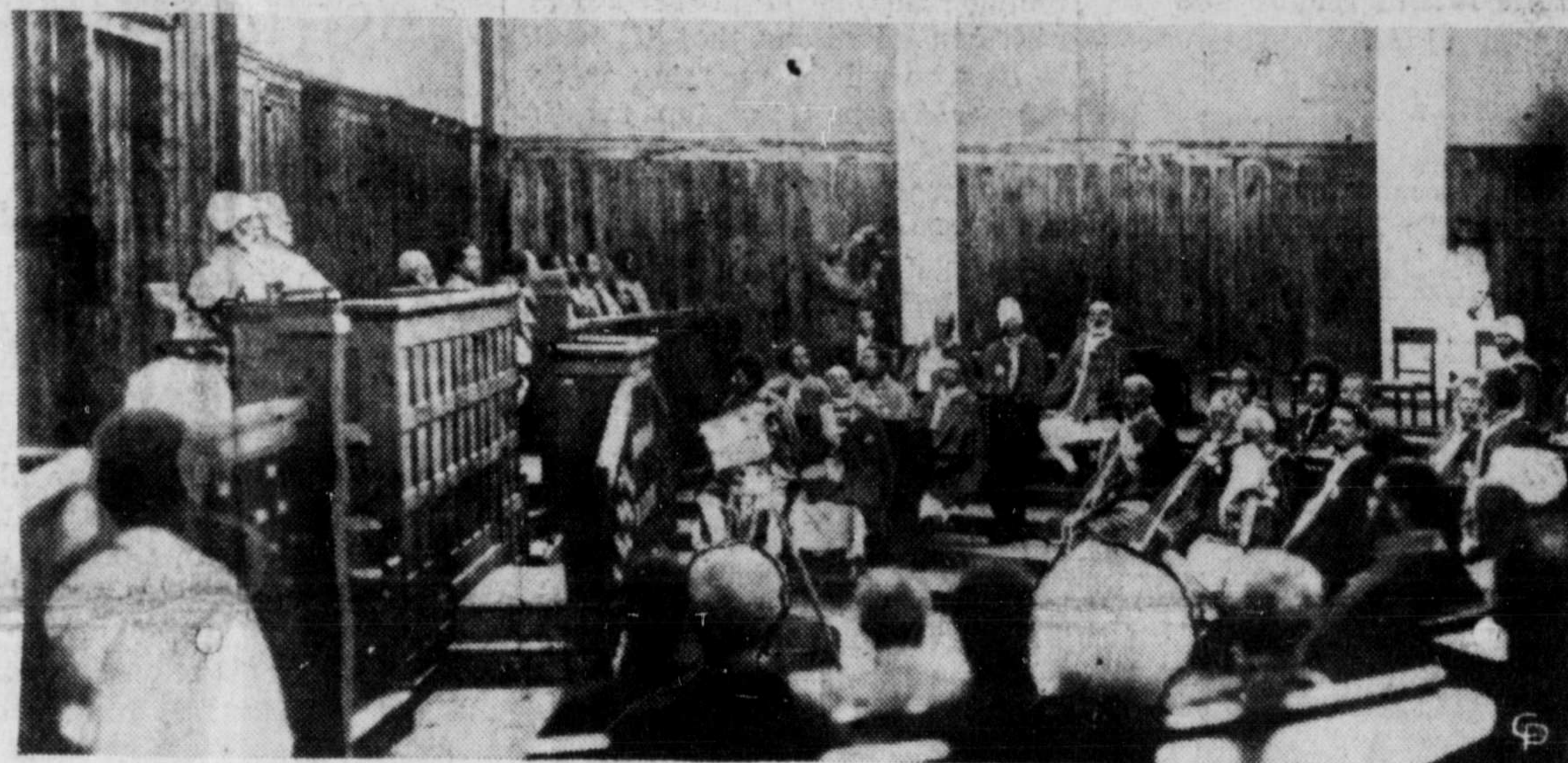
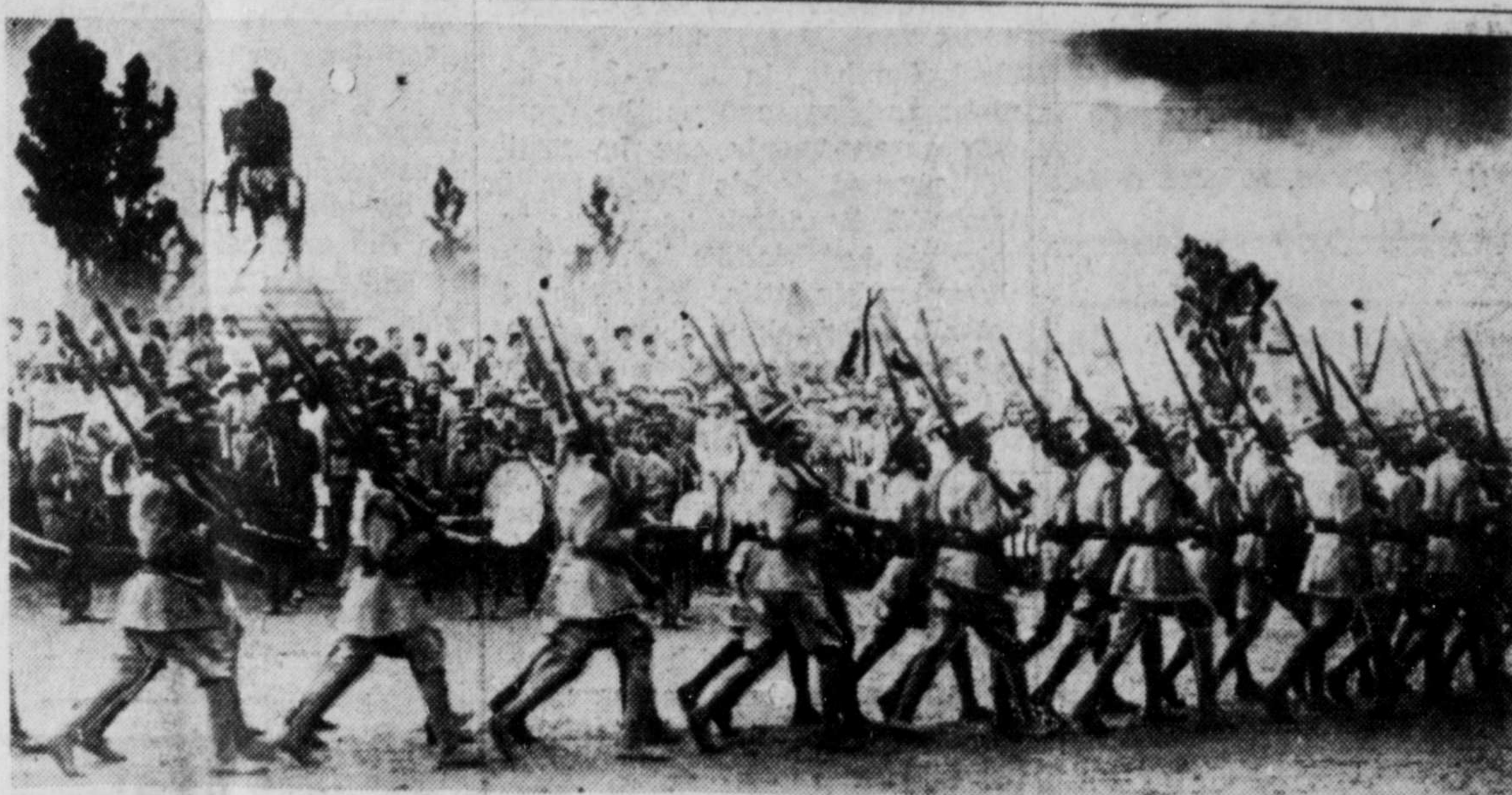
VANCOUVER, Sept. 24, (CP)—Stuart Cameron, aged 55, prominent Vancouver contractor, died yesterday.

Troops Drill For War As Parliament Faces Crisis



A crucial hour in the history of Ethiopia was dawning as these pictures were made in Addis Ababa, the capital, and the world's oldest empire stood on the verge of chaos. Of seemingly ominous import are the black clouds that scud across the sky as crack troops pass in review before Emperor Haile Selassie (top), and then leave for the "front," where they may soon be called upon to meet the might of Italy in battle. ## FIVE LOSE LIVES WHEN SHIP SINKS

Motorship Hurry On Lost Off Halifax—At One Time Ran Between Here and Vancouver

HALIFAX, Sept. 24: (CP)—Capt. A. H. Gardiner and four members of the crew of the diesel-driven motorship freighter Hurry On, former rum runner on the Pacific Coast, were drowned when the vessel foundered off Henry Island, near Halifax, last night. Seven other members of the crew were picked up from a lifeboat. Alex Wait of Victoria, 18-year old donkeyman, was among those lost.

The Hurry On was for a time several years ago under charter to Canadian National Steamships for freight service between Vancouver and Prince Rupert. Capt. Dan McKinnon, now master of the steamer Prince Charles, was in command of her at the time.

The Hurry On, registered out of Vancouver, was built in 1923 at Boltzenburg, Germany. Her length was 174 feet, beam 29 feet, four inches and depth 12 feet, seven inches, gross tonnage being 688 and registered, 334. She was owned for some time by Hobbs Bros. Ltd. of Vancouver who disposed of the vessel a few years ago.

## NEWSPAPER PUBLICITY IS SOUGHT

Fisheries Association Would Spend \$100,000 in Canadian Press—Local Men On Association Executive

MONTREAL, September 24, (CP)—A resolution urging the Dominion government to make appropriation of \$100,000 for publicity in Canadian daily newspapers to promote domestic consumption of fish was unanimously approved yesterday at the one-day convention of the Canadian Fisheries Association.

F. W. Wallace of Montreal, editor of Canadian Fisherman, was elected president of the Association and James S. Eckman of Vancouver was named a vice-president. John Dybhavn and Col. J. W. Nicholls of Prince Rupert are on the executive.

## GERMANY TO BE NEUTRAL

In Italo-Ethiopian Conflict—Hitler Non-Committal in Regard To Britain

BERLIN, Sept. 24:—Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler reiterates that, in case of war between Italy and Ethiopia, Germany intends to be neutral. He has not, however, declared himself as to what Germany's stand would be in event of war between Italy and Great Britain.

## LAND SAFE IN 'CHUTES

Black and McArthur Fail in Effort To Set Mark For London-South Africa Flight

KHARTOUM, Egypt, Sept. 24: (CP)—Thomas Campbell Black and H. McArthur, attempting to establish a record for the flight from London to South Africa and return, were forced to land by parachutes when their machine failed and crashed on the west bank of the Nile. Both fliers were uninjured.

## MAYOR McGEER HAS SOCIAL CREDITOR AS HIS OPPONENT

VANCOUVER, Sept. 24: (CP)—Social Credit made its debut in the British Columbia political field last night when W. A. Tutte, well known Vancouver newspaperman, was nominated a candidate for the federal seat of Burrard in the forthcoming federal election. Mr. Tutte makes the fifth candidate for the riding of Burrard, the others being: A. J. McDonnell, Conservative; Mayor G. G. McGeer, Liberal; Arnold Webster, C. C. F., and Dr. H. L. Turnbull, Reconstructionist.

## CONTINUING HIS FLIGHT

Lieut. Felix Waitkus Intends To Go On To Lithuania But Is Through With Ocean Flying

BALLINROBE, County Mayo, Irish Free State, Sept. 24:—Lieut. Felix Waitkus, forced down here Sunday while on a projected flight from New York to Lithuania, is awaiting repairs to his plane before continuing the flight to Lithuania. He had not made up his mind yesterday as to whether he will proceed direct from here to Lithuania or stop in England enroute. He says, however, that he has had enough of ocean flying and has no intention of ever trying to span the Atlantic Ocean again.

## JUSTICE IS DEAD

F. G. T. Lucas, Youngest Member Of Supreme Court Bench, Dies In Vancouver

VANCOUVER, Sept. 24: (CP)—Mr. Justice F. G. T. Lucas, aged 49, who was appointed to the Supreme Court of British Columbia bench last December, died here this morning following an operation. For many years he was a prominent practising barrister here.

## THE POLITICAL CORNER

"VOTE ME OUT OF OFFICE"

On July 12th, 1930, when Mr. Bennett, the Great Promiser, was seeking the support of the Dominion, immediately before the last election, speaking at Quebec City he said:

"There is no necessity for a conference on unemployment. The solution is too apparent. What you want is work, not conferences, and you are going to get work."

"Unless my promises to the people of Canada are kept if elected to office I want Quebec and other members to vote me out of office. I do not want place and power over broken promises. Let us not be deceived. Let us get to grips with our problems. Let us have action and not words. I have well-considered plans to submit to parliament."

"I have investigated this problem (unemployment). I know what this problem means. I know it must be dealt with, that the hungry may be fed and be given work and that the life of the country may continue."

And again at Moncton, N.B., on July 10th, 1930:

"Mr. King promises consideration of the problems of unemployment. I promise to end unemployment. Which plan do you like best?"

And now, Mr. Bennett, having broken your promise to give the people work instead of the dole; having broken the many other pledges you made to the people in your campaign of 1930, we are going to take you at your word. You have said you do not want place and power over broken promises and that you wished to be voted out of office if you did not keep your pledges.

Very well, Mr. Bennett, on October 14th we will do just that.

THAT "SAVAGE ATTACK"

Readers of the Daily News will be interested to learn that on Saturday last there was in this paper "a savage outburst" against Marxism. That is what we are told in an unsigned letter to the editor. The writer of the letter also states that the writer of the editorial knows nothing of Marx's economics or of political history. He also says that the editorial to which he refers was "dirt slinging."

Now, as a matter of fact Marxism and Russia were only introduced as examples of what not to do. The writer has read everything he could procure on the Russian situation and tried to do so sympathetically. The great Russian experiment is one that has excited much comment for and against. We think it promises well to succeed but it is today far from being successful. It is making progress and we wish it well. At the same time we do not wish to see Canada following the same hard road.

The difficulty with admirers of Russia is that they read chiefly those things which praise the condition there and stamp as lies the reports of conditions which Canada would not allow to exist for twenty-four hours. All other reports, many of which undoubtedly are reliable, they characterize as propaganda or "capitalist lies."

Most of the citizens of Canada have come from countries where democratic government has slowly evolved and the people have been trained to study political questions. These people know that it is wise to go slowly in making political or economic changes. That is why they are planning to vote for the Liberal party at the present election. For those who have not had that training, we have the greatest sympathy. We wish them well and feel sure when their descendants have been Canadians for a few generations they will have been educated and trained to a point where they can look at economic development in a rational manner and be willing to co-operate for the common good. They would never be educated if they lived under a dictator as in Russia or Germany or Italy where discussion of economic questions is not allowed or is so regulated that opposition to the ruling faction is stifled or wiped out by strong arm methods.

Victory Over Joe Louis Merely Incidental In His Plans For Future

Louis' Promise

Guarantees To Finish It In Two Rounds—Braddock Changes His Mind Again

NEW YORK, September 24.—In spite of what most of experts may think about it, Max Baer now has the plans for his future fistic career all doped out. He will (he says) knock out Joe Louis, Detroit's black bomber, in their bout tonight and, as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made, will proceed to do the same to James J. Braddock and thus regain his lost world's heavyweight championship title. But, that is not all. After taking a shot at the movies, Max announces that he will retire from the ring and devote his efforts to capturing the national golf championship. Thus are summarized Max's modest plans.

Mr. Louis' plans are, however, different than Mr. Baer's. The African gentleman with the wicked punch has not been saying much but he guarantees that tonight's fight will out last more than two rounds. Nor is it in accordance with his intentions that it should be he who will be reclining on the canvass to spoil the fun for the big crowd of cauliflower fans who have already coughed up \$1,000,000 for admission tickets.

James J. Braddock, the champion, who first favored Baer and then turned to Louis, has changed his mind again and now expresses the opinion that Baer will take the decision. Louis will punch at the big Californian Jew until he wears himself out, Braddock thinks. However, not everybody respects Mr. Braddock's fickle opinion for it is still thought by many that Jimmy himself was the most surprised man around the ring in which a few months ago he knocked the title laurels off Max's playful brow. There are also those who suspect that the wish may be father of the thought of Jimmy's in favoring Baer for the next title challenger.

Baer is expected to weigh in at about 210 pounds and Louis at 199. Odds are 11 to 5 on Louis.

"These little girls are beautiful babies," he assured as he told of his visit. "The fact they have developed so wonderfully in view of the disadvantages that were theirs at birth is a tribute to modern medicine."

The quintts, Dr. Atkinson said, are the greatest tourist attraction in Eastern Canada with visitors from all over the world gathering at Callander. "These five little girls should put a decided crimp in the age-old controversy of heredity versus environment. The environment supporters certainly have a powerful argument on their side in the Dionne children. All five of them are normal, enthusiastic youngsters," he said.

WHY ISLANDERS ARE LIBERAL

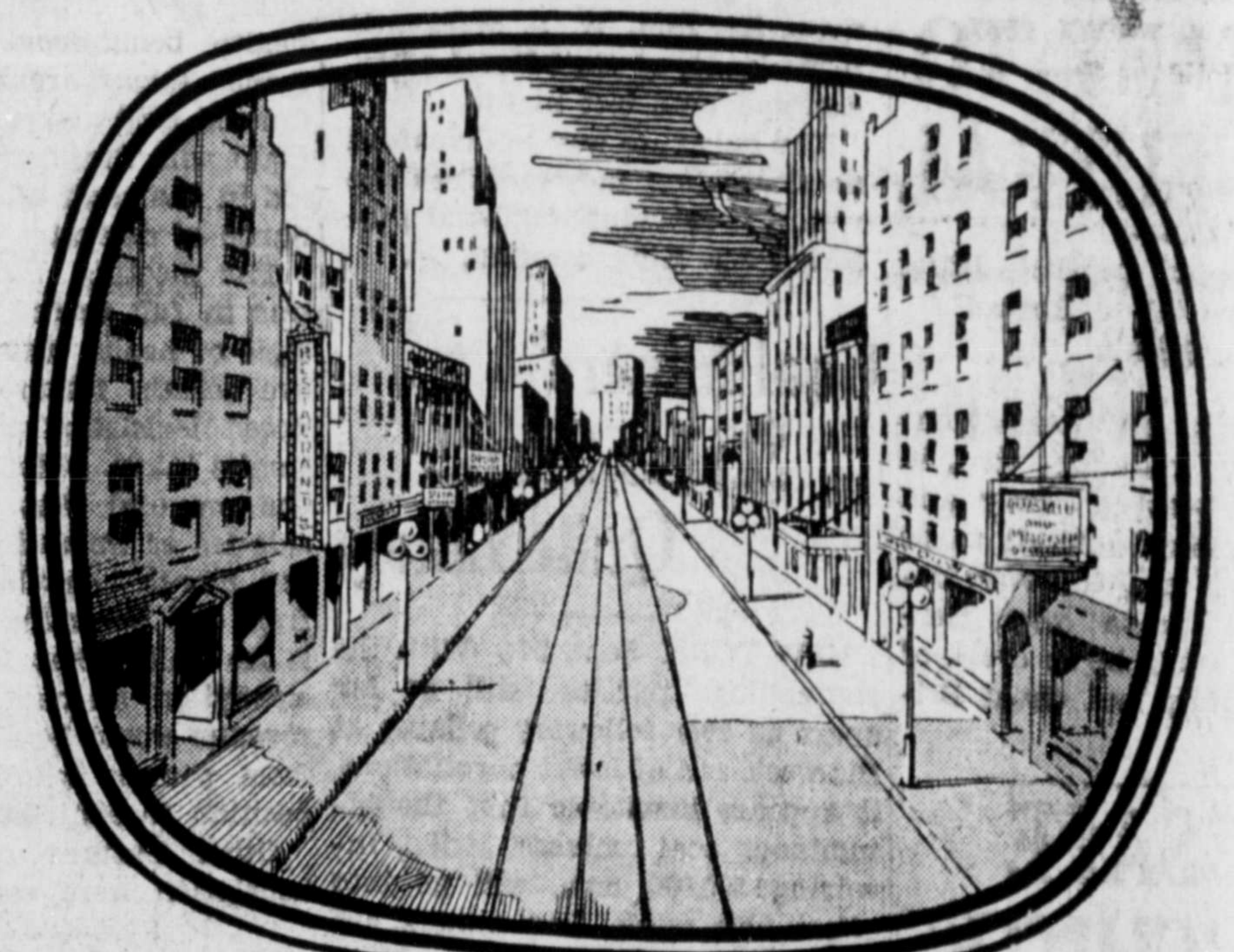
Sets Yolk Record For Laying Egg

### CAREER OF COMEDIAN

DeWolf Hopper Achieved Success After Many Vicissitudes

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 24: (AP)—As one of the great comedians of the American stage, DeWolf Hopper, who died suddenly yesterday here, achieved fame in a profession other than that for which he was intended by his parents. His father was a lawyer and was ambitious that some day his son might join him in the practice of that profession. DeWolf Hopper went through with the plan so far as his preliminary education was concerned and to the extent of spending six months in a law office. About that time he took part in an amateur performance of "Conscience" at the old Fourteenth Street Theatre, New York. After that he manifested a restlessness and distaste for law. It was not long after that DeWolf Hopper's father died and, with money received from the estate, the son organized his own theatrical company. The venture proved a failure, but Hopper emerged from it with some of his money and his unbounded confidence intact. He then financed and managed a tour through the west and south of a company playing "One Hundred Wives," the stranding of which ended his career as a manager. He then was engaged by Edward Harrigan for a part in "The Blackbird," at the conclusion of which he began training his bass voice with the idea of entering grand opera. That was interrupted when Daniel Frohman engaged him in 1884 for the Madison Square Theatre Company, for which he played in "Hazel Kirke" and "May Blossom." He resumed his vocal training until the fall of 1885, when he joined the McCaull Opera Company, with which for several seasons he shared honors with Digby Bell and Jefferson DeAngelis.

#### Famous Comedian

Called upon to play an important role on short notice, he did so well that he was immediately made the principal comedian of the company. Thereafter he continued to enhance his reputation and by 1890 was recognized as one of the brilliant stars of the comic opera stage, appearing that year as the star in "Castles in the Air." The comedian, whose full name was William DeWolf Hopper, was born in New York, March 30, 1858, the son of John and Rosalie DeWolf Hopper. His paternal grandfather was Taton Hopper, a famous Quaker philanthropist and abolitionist. While achieving fame as a comedian and comic opera star, Mr. Hopper continually attracted attracted attention by his marital experiences. He married six times and figured in five divorces. His first wife was Ella Gardiner, a cousin on his mother's side, and his second, Ida Mosher of Boston, a member of the chorus of the McCaull Opera Company. These two marriages had been contracted and dissolved by divorce before Hopper had passed his twenty-eighth year. His third union, with Edna Wallace, a noted actress, continued from 1893 to 1898, and the next year he married Nella Reardon Bergen. The fifth Mrs. Hopper was Ella Furry, whom he married in 1913 and who obtained a divorce in 1924. A year later Hopper married for the sixth time, Mrs. Lillian Glaser, a singer of Oakland, Cal. The comedian was the father of two sons, one by his second wife and one by his fifth.

### YOUTHFUL PREMIER

Youngest Minister in Canada's History, Hon. E. C. Manning, Is Real Crusader

EDMONTON, Sept. 24: (CP)—The Alberta Social Credit party's coat-of-arms, it has been suggested, might well bear the figure of youth rampant. Members of the newly-elected government hold the distinction of being the youngest in the Dominion. Ernest Charles Manning, 26-year old provincial secretary, acted as premier while his party chief visited Ottawa to negotiate a loan. Rocketed from obscurity to a cabinet suite in the provincial parliament buildings, Manning's short political career has been compared to that of William Pitt, who, at the age of 24, assumed the mantle of premier of Great Britain. Youthful experiences have fashioned the philosophy of the slim, sandy-haired crusader.

Born on a farm, near Carnduff, Sask., he has always taken a keen interest in economic problems. He believes Christianity should go hand in hand with political life. His interests are the welfare of Alberta's young people and the institution of the aggressive policies his party sponsors.

#### Aberhart's Lieutenant

Eight years ago he took a course at the Calgary Prophetic Bible Institute and was its first graduate. Later he became his principal's secretary and first lieutenant. When Aberhart became interested in the principles of Social Credit Manning became the fellow student. Three years ago they made an educational tour of the province.

An attempt was made the following year to persuade the government headed by Premier J. E. Brownlee to adopt their program. When this failed they decided to make it a political issue. The newly formed Social Credit party was voted into office at the August 24 general elections and Manning was selected by his leader for one of the chief cabinet posts.

"People who say Social Credit is merely inflation disguised are ignorant of the 'just price' feature in our system," the farm boy-economist believes. "We are not contemplating any radical changes. We will be making adjustments as we go along. We will go ahead with our aggressive ideas but we won't do anything rash."

"You must remember all of us entered into this in the spirit of a crusade. We're not politicians. When you realize there are tremendous numbers of people who need something done for them you instinctively want to do what is best." Manning has held office only a short time but already benches bulge with visitors demanding audiences.
