CALGARY SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKE

Furniture Shakes And Water Fountains Gush In Alberta City Today

Sharp Tremor Felt at Noon at Lethbridge, Spokane And Helena as Well—Local Man Was in Butte At Time of Recent Big Shock

CALGARY, Oct. 31: (CP)—A sharp earth tremor which shifted furniture and sent water spurting from fountain bowls in downtown office buildings was felt here at noon today. Lethbridge also reported the tremor as did Spokane, Wash., and Helena, Mont. It is believed to have been another of the series of disturbances which have been centering around Montana during the past couple of weeks.

CRACK-UP OF PLANE

American Passenger Machine In Forced Landing at Nelson—No One is Hurt

NELSON, Oct. 31: (CP)—A Northwest Air Lines passenger plane, enroute to Spokane from Helena, which lost its radio beam and wandered from its course, made a forced landing on a rocky field near here last night. Four passengers and three pilots were unhurt. A wing and undercarriage were damaged.

Well Known Native Of Kitkatla Passes

James A. Jackson Dies at His Fishing Camp—Burial in Village

KITKATLA, Oct. 31:—James A. Jackson, well known local native, died after a brief illness while at his fishing camp. The body was brought to the village where the services were held. Burial was in the village cemetery. Rev. H. Lawrence officiated. After the funeral the villagers met and had a dinner given by his brother, Alfred Jackson.

Young Movie Star Dies as Result Of Accident in Polo

HOLLYWOOD, Oct. 31:—Gordon Westcott, popular young moving picture star, whose skull was fractured at the base when he was thrown and rolled upon by his horse while playing polo Sunday, died from the effects of a cerebral hemorrhage in Cedars of Lebanon Hospital here yesterday, having never regained consciousness after the accident. Westcott was 31 years of age.

Chickian Salmon Packer Sinks But Two Aboard Escape

KITCHIKAN, Oct. 31: (CP)—The salmon packer Beaver sank in Southam Straits in a recent storm. Captain Einar Haugen and Nelson Green escaping in a skiff, it was learned yesterday.

QUINTUPLETS TO APPEAR IN FULL LENGTH MOVIE

TORONTO, Oct. 31:—The celebrated Dionne quintuplets will appear in moving pictures, it was announced yesterday by Hon. David Croll, minister of welfare, who revealed that a contract had been signed for the production of a full length film featuring the five world-famous sisters who are now eighteen months old. Mr. Croll did not reveal the name of the company or the terms.

Weather is exceptionally wintry in Calgary. On the Medicine Hat-Calgary highway fourteen-foot drifts of snow have blocked all traffic.

Max Heilbronner, who returned to the city yesterday from a trip to Rochester, Minn., where he went to obtain surgical treatment at Mayo Clinic, was in Butte, Mont., about 100 miles from Helena, on the night of the earthquake which wrecked Helena. While the tremor was quite perceptible at Butte, it did not do much damage there although a chimney or so were reported to have toppled over. There was a dull reverberation and the effect was quite sickening.

Mr. Heilbronner's health seems to be much improved as a result of the treatment which he received while away. He reports that, owing to the increased price of copper, the city of Butte, where the Anaconda Copper Co. has large mines, is taking on new life with properties which have been closed down for some time reopening. The place, like elsewhere in the United States, however, is not without labor troubles. Mr. Heilbronner observed that the working people of the United States seemed to be supporting President Roosevelt in his "New Deal" program. Big business interests, however, seem to be opposed to the Rooseveltian policies.

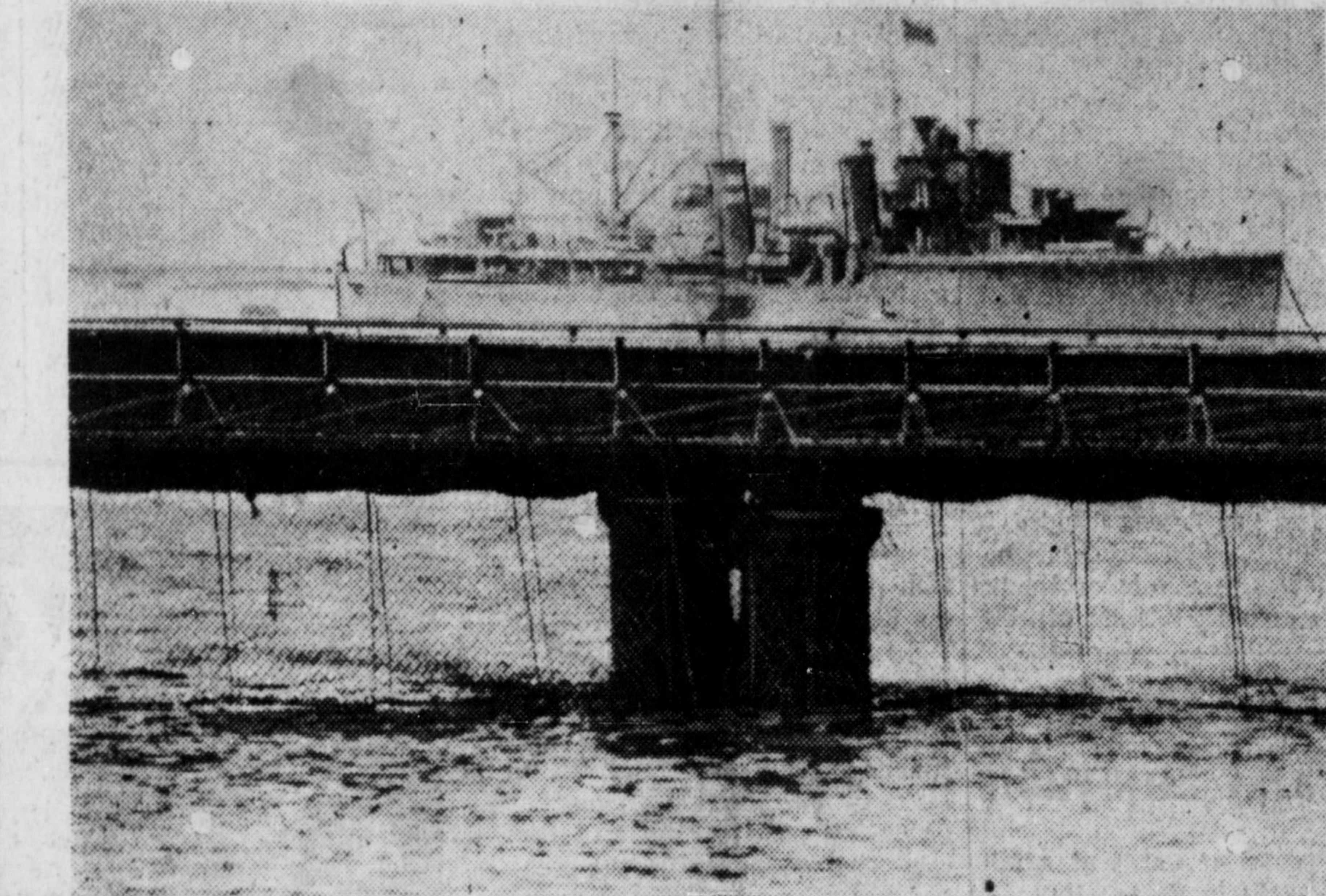

AFRICAN WAR BECOMES MORE INTENSE

BRITISH LOWER STEEL NETS TO STOP ITALIAN SUBMARINES

MANY DIE IN BLAST

Two Thousand Lose Lives When Terrific Explosion Occurs In Munitions Dump

LANCHOU, Oct. 31:—Two thousand persons were believed to be dead last night as a result of a terrific explosion which wrecked a munitions dump and much of this city which has been used as a base by the Chinese army in fighting Communist rebels. A hospital and numerous homes were wrecked.

Many Letters For Long Still Come

BATON ROUGE, La., Oct. 31:—Masses of letters, as many as five hundred a day, continue to pour into the office of the late Senator Huey Long, despite the fact that it is two months since the Kingfish was assassinated. Most of these letters seek further information as to Long's "Share the Wealth" plan. They come from all parts of the world. Some of the correspondents, apparently, have not yet learned that Long is dead.

PULP MILL PROGRESS

Construction Will Start This Fall Or Winter, it is Expected

City Commissioner W. J. Alder has received a delayed letter from F. L. Buckley indicating that good progress is being made with the pulp mill project and there is a probability of construction starting this fall or winter and being pushed ahead.

Mr. Buckley says it has been definitely decided to make it a 250-ton high grade bleached sulphite pulp mill suitable for the manufacture of rayon and other high grade products and they are rushing everything. He says he has been at the job night and day and as soon as he returns from the east he will come to Prince Rupert.

That there have been delays is admitted but Mr. Buckley says that all matters including power are pretty well straightened out. He still expects to get started on construction this fall or winter and, as soon as it does commence, it will be pushed hard.

Mr. Buckley is at present in the east.

Private Advice
A local contracting concern received word by mail yesterday from Vancouver to the effect that Mr. Buckley had stated that all negotiations had been completed and that a start on construction of the pulp mill might be expected about the first of the year.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 31:—The Oregon State House of Representatives by a vote of 36 to 24 yesterday decided to memorialize Congress at Washington urging adoption of the Townsend old age pension plan.

PEACE RIVER DOCTOR GETS YEAR'S PRISON

QUESNEL, Oct. 31: (CP)—Dr. S. W. A. Watson of Pouce Coupe, charged with manslaughter through alleged negligence in connection with the death on April 15 of Joseph C. Tennhauser who failed to recover from an operation for appendicitis, was convicted at the Supreme Court Assizes here yesterday and sentenced by Mr. Justice H. B. Robertson to one year's imprisonment with hard labor.

Grandmother Of Sally Kelly Is Victim of Thug

SEATTLE, Oct. 31:—Mrs. Edith Coolidge, grandmother of Sally Kelly, little seven-year old Seattle girl who was cruelly attacked and slain by a fiend on October 6, was struck and robbed by a thug who invaded the home of Mrs. P. E. Sands with whom she has been staying. A fur coat and \$7 in cash were taken from the house and Mrs. Coolidge was robbed of \$2. Despite a reward of \$5000 which is being offered, the slayer of Sally is still at large.

Drowned Man On Galiano Island Is One or Other

VICTORIA, Oct. 31:—Capt. J. Slattery or Jack Payne is believed to have been the victim of the drowning in the wreck of two fishing vessels on North Galiano Island on Monday of this week, as reported yesterday. The fisherman, at first reported to be unidentified, was drowned from the boat May West which, after having become disabled, was in tow of another fishing boat, Sea Ranger. Both boats smashed on the rocks in a gale. Charles E. Dominy swam ashore from the Sea Ranger. The body of the other man was later found on the shore. The United States consul here is making arrangements for Dominy to be taken on to his home in Seattle. Both boats had been in Alaska and were on their way to Puget Sound.

ESPERANZA MINE CLOSES

Work on the Esperanza mine at Alice Arm has closed down for the winter. The mine crew was here a few days ago bound for Vancouver.

SALE OF BEER AND WINES IN CAFES IN PROVINCE DENIED

VICTORIA, Oct. 31: (CP)—Refusal of the provincial government to broaden the Government Liquor Act to permit the sale of beer and light wines in hotels and restaurants was given the Moderation League of British Columbia by Premier T. D. Pattullo yesterday. A plebiscite was also denied but the whole question will be reviewed at a later date, the Premier said.

FIGHTING IS FIERCE

Conflict in Ethiopia Continues Without Let-up—Geneva To Consider Concessions

Makale Reached

But Invaders Are Repulsed By Defending Hordes—Italo-French Break

ROME, Oct. 31: (CP)—Advance detachments of the Italian army moving southward from Adigrat reached their objective at Makale today, according to advices received here, but were compelled to retreat when faced with strong enemy defences. More than 200,000 Ethiopians are reported to be massed in the Makale region preparing to stop the Italian movement towards Addis Ababa.

On the southern front the Italian army is marking time while artillery is placed for an assault on Gorrabel.

France's reported assurances to Great Britain for naval co-operation in the Mediterranean are regarded here as signaling France's abandonment of her friendship to Italy.

Students demonstrated against stores they believed to be British-owned tonight following an earlier demonstration in front of the British embassy.

Fierce Fighting

LONDON, Oct. 31: (CP)—Fierce fighting has been going on daily in an isolated section of the Eritrean front, southeast of Setit River where Ethiopians are massed in great strength, with heavy machine gun equipment.

Rome reports said yesterday that the Ethiopians had been repulsed by airplanes which dropped bombs and raked them with machine gunfire.

Forty thousand Ethiopian troops were reported last night to be on the march to the mountain region intent of dislodging the Italian invaders who are concentrated there and driving them back into Eritrea. The Italian forces there are estimated to number some 50,000.

On the northern front the Italians are now ready, it is reported, for their push towards Makale and the command expects slight resistance. The Italian objective is to cut off the railway from Addis Awawa to French Somaliland.

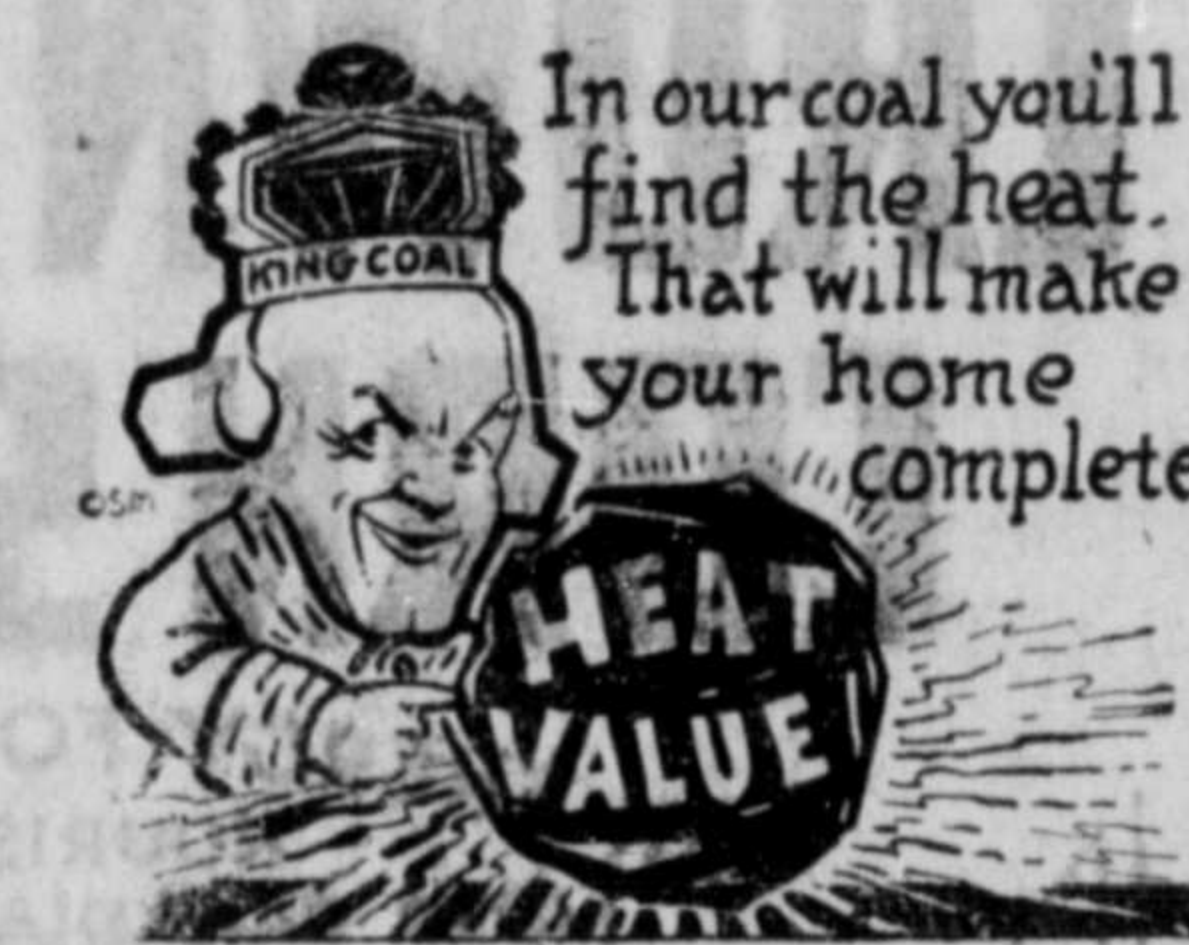

Alberta Professor Declares State Control. Great Strides Predicted In Next Ten Years

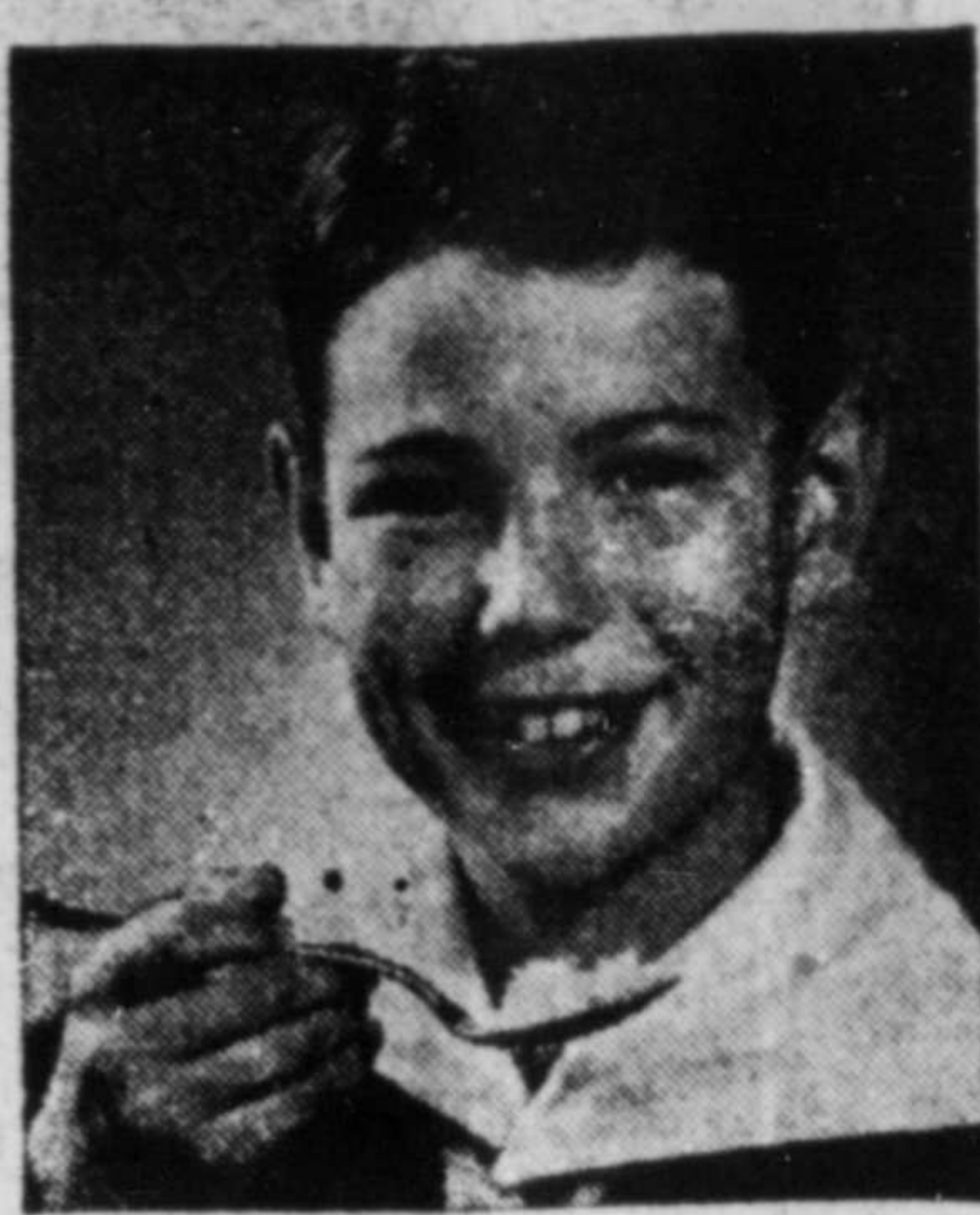
SASKATOON, Sask., Oct. 31: (CP)—Lack of government is the main drawback in state medicine proposals, but within the next ten years tremendous changes in the practice of medicine will be made, declares Dean W. S. Lindsay of the University of Saskatchewan medical school in an address here.

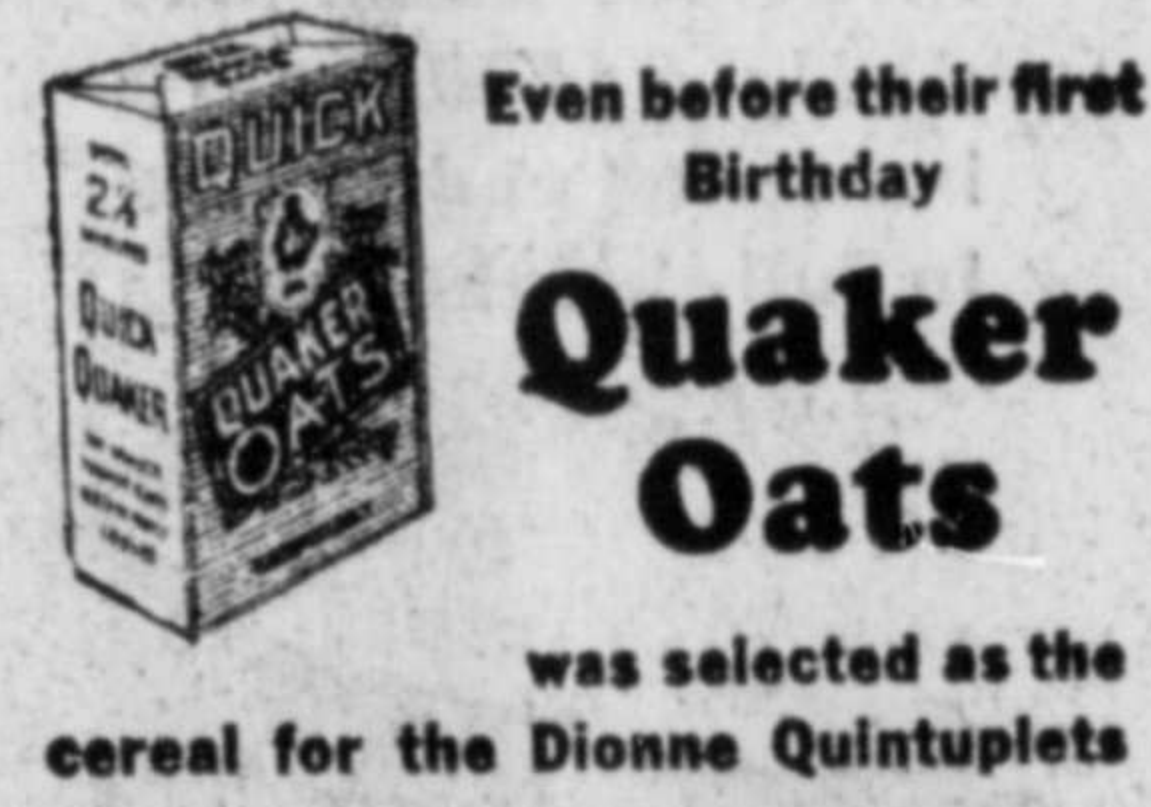

Mussolini with a view to having him end his invasion of Ethiopia will be discussed at Geneva today, high British sources report.

United States Attitude WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 31:—Backing up another appeal which had been made earlier in the day by Secretary of State Cordell Hull to arms manufacturers of the United States against supplying of guns or munitions to either of the belligerents in the Italo-Ethiopian conflict, President Franklin D. Representations to Duce LONDON, Oct. 31: (CP)—Great Britain today made new representations to Premier Benito Mussolini against continuation of attacks upon this country by the Italian press.

At the same time the government warned against extension of credit for goods purchased by Italy.

The Board of Trade estimates that more than two million pounds sterling is outstanding for goods already supplied.

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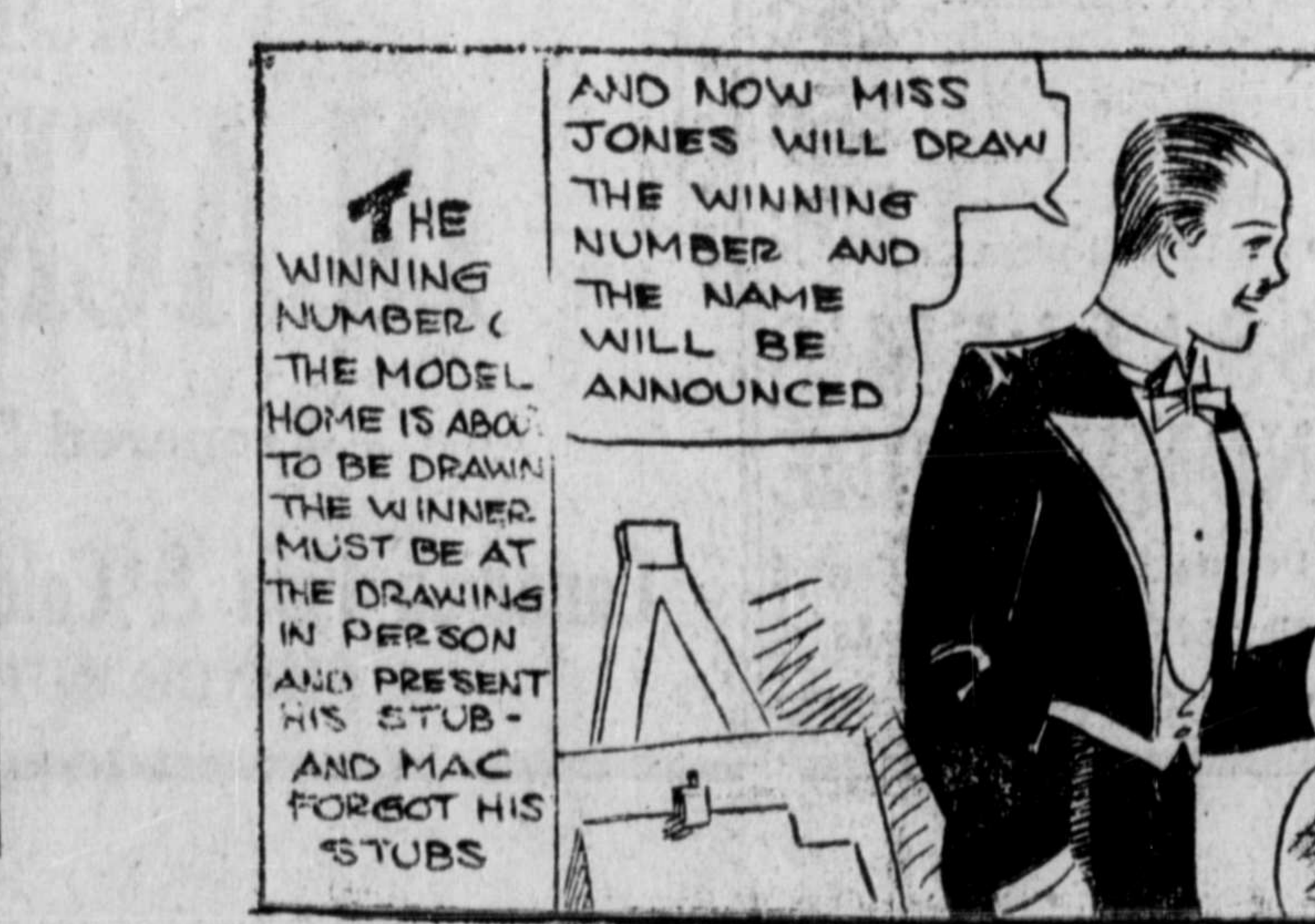
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
