The article was written by Don Mason in recognition of the coming celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the incorporation of the city. It deals with the chief industries including fishing and grain shipping. It mentions the Peace River outlet and also takes up the question of recreation. It is valuable publicity for Prince Rupert and as such deserves recognition.

BIG NEWS

Naturally newspapers of the country are extremely interested in "Big News." The difficulty is that there is a division of opinion as to what is big news. To most newspapers it is that for which the public clamor. The circulation department is a faithful indicator of what the public want in a newspaper, and the result is that the tendency is toward the featuring of that which is sensational as against that which is of real value to the community.

The Associated Press of the United States gives the outstanding news stories of last year as Hauptmann's arrest, King Alexander's assassination, Hitler's blood purge, shooting of Dillinger, death of Dolfuss, birth of the Dionne quintuplets, the Morro Castle disaster, the Democratic offyear victory, the San Francisco general strike and the Inaultrial.

Most people will not agree with the Associated Press in regard to its choice. The shooting of a bandit should not be an outstanding event although it had considerable local interest for the people of the United States. The choice was made not in regard to relative importance but buased on the reaction of the public in the matter of general interest.

Newspapermen cannot ignore the clamor of the public for news of interest to them but it is also the duty to the public to draw attention to the importance of events which the public may not at the time realize and to feature these important events in their news columns.


