In Vancouver-Burrard both Arnold Webster, C. C. F., and Mayor G. G. McGeer, Liberal claim to be elected but the count so far shows the former to be leading by ninety and the situation will likely remain unchanged until the official count on October 25. McGeer pins his hopes on the possibility of a mistake having been made in the counting. He had been at first believed elected.

The result in West York, Ont., was reversed last night when the riding tottered back into the Liberal column. The Conservative candidate, Peter L. Brown, had been previously announced as winner by a majority of twelve but J. E. L. Streight, Liberal, is now declared elected by a nice majority. In the 1930 election this seat was won by Hon. J. Earl Lawson with a majority of 9475. Mr. Lawson was elecited in this election in South York.



CRIMINAL REBATES

The amendment to the Criminal Code passed at the last geon of Vancouver, the Liberal session of Parliament now in effect provides for a fine of federal election candidate. With a thousand dollars or a month's imprisonment for any person who is a party to or privy to or assists in any transaction or sale which discriminates to his knowledge against competitors of the purchaser in regard to the allowing of any rebate or allowance more than is allowed a competitor.

The same penalty provides that a firm or person must not engage in a policy of selling goods in any area in Canada at lower prices than those exacted by such seller elsewhere in Canada for the purpose of destroying competition or eliminating a competitor.

It is also provided that no person must engage in a policy of selling goods at prices unreasonably low for the purpose of destroying competition or elimination a competitor.

While these clauses do not seem to be airtight, they indicate a trend toward curbing lawlessness in business by the suppression of business piracy.
