

VANCOUVER, Dec. 12:-V.sual evidence of the tremendous strides made toward economic recovery by New Zealand and Australia, and the benefits to Canada of Empire trade agreements, can be found in these photos showing the arrival and trans-shipment in Vancouver of a solid C. P. R. trainload of Ford automobiles, for export to New Zealand. At top is a close-up view of one of the autos being slung into the hold of the Canadian-Australasian liner "Aorangi," while below the solid train of 50 cars 300 Fords in all, is seen entering the C. P. R. yards at Coquitlam. This trainload is being followed closely by additional trainloads bringing a total of 1410 Fords to be shipped from Vancouver in December. The "Aorangi" will handle part of the first trainload, with other and larger shipments being made to New Zealand by the freighters "Loch Lomond" and "Cape York." Ford of Canada, by December 31, will export to sister Dominions in excess of 48,000 units which is far ahead of 1929 and well over 1926, the previous peak year, when 39,000 units were exported. 


