It is something that should be properly included in his record and some defence of it might be expected from him and the Conservative candidate in this constituency. But, if it should by chance be mentioned, he would soon learn what the people think of this great achievement. The time when Mr. Bennett performed this heroic act was when distress in Canada was acute and most deeply widespread. Mr. Bennett could not find time to solve the question of substituting employment for doles. But he could spare the time to give thoughtful consideration to the granting of knighthood-leading to his conviction that this was one of the country's needs.

It is rather a pity that credit is not now claimed by the Conservatives for this bright feature of the government's record.


