

The Peace River Railway Situation



Clive Planta's plan for Peace River railway development to the Pacific Coast comes into the limelight again as a result of the pronouncement of Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, minister of railways, in favor of the construction of a line from Hines Creek to Beaton River which is in line with Prince Rupert's case as the most suitable Pacific Coast outlet. The construction of this 100mile piece of line is one of the integral parts of Mr. Planta's plan as the above map shows. The ultimate object would be to have the two present north and south lines converge at or near Hudson's Hope.

Soldiers' Plots Will be Greatly Improved as Result of Government Decision

Great improvement will be made to soldiers' plots in the local cemetery as a result of the decision of the Department of National Defence to provide neat granite headstones on the graves of all ex-service men who died as a result of service in the Great War. In addition to the general public, news of the federal government's intention along this line will be received with gratification by organizations who have been interesting themselves in the care of these graves.

The headstones will measure two feet six inches in height, one foot three inches in width and three inches in thickness. They will be of grey granite mounted on concrete whom they commemorate will be inscribed on the stones.

The entire cost will be borne by the Canadian government.

FAVORS DICTATORSHIP

The Montreal Star, one of the chief backers of the Bennett government, has come out plainly for a dictatorship which would bring about a union of the two great railways of Canada. The Toronto Saturday Night takes the Star to task for its editorial utterances. Here is one of the Star's comments that the critic does not like: "How long does anyone imagine that Mussolini would put up with the railway situation in this country, would let the provinces bleed away the resources of the Dominion, would wait for death or the elections to remove incompetent ministers?

The editor of Saturday Night also deals with the Prime Minister's Toronto speech and states that little could be gathered from it except ambiguous phrases and obscure hints. One-third of the speech was devoted to the railway problem and nothing definite was said except that it mus be solved and it could not be solved when men were think ing only in terms of party. Evidently just now Mr. Ben nett is thinking in terms of party and is anxious first of all to be re-elected. After that nobody knows what he will " unit peg beats

The present House of Commons gave the Prime Minister a blank check to deal with certain matters. It is suggested! that if the Conservatives should be elected the Prime Minister would ask for full authority to deal with the railway situation and then there could be only one outcome and Prince Rupert people know what that would be. It evidently is the one big question in Mr. Bennett's mind and if he is returned to power he will deal with it.

RAILWAY IS PAYING

The Canadian National Railway is paying its running expenses at a time when a good many private businesses are not going so. The overhead charges for interest are the ones about which there is so much discussion and which are said to be ruining the nation. As the railway is much! over-capitalized it can easily be seen that the situation is

not so bad as it might seem. The Canadian National Railways was made up from several bankrupt concerns. There was the Grand Trunk! Railway, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, the Canadian Northern Railway, the Intercolonial and the Government line connecting Winnipeg with Moncton. They were joined together and welded by Sir Henry Thornton into the present railway structure. It is hardly fair then to ask the railway to bear all the burden of overhead expenditure. Had these been ordinary businesses the overhead charges would have been at least partially wiped out when they became bankrupt. As it is they are being used as an excuse for destroying the railway as a separate entity.
