

He is in more or les constant communication with people in Australia and, on this account, the differences in customs are the more noticeable.

The people of Australia do not ise canned evaporated milk as do the people of Canada. If they run short of fresh milk they use the old fashioned condensed milk. Vegetables also are used fresh or not at all. They do not dig their spinach or beets or carrots out of a can. Owing to the varieties of climates they can get fresh oranges and other citrus fruits at all seasons. There is no such thing as fresh salmon or halibut although canned salmon sed, the Horseshoe Brand being

Even in the country the Austraians get a daily delivery of mail and in the cities only the wealthy town this size would certainly have a daily mail delivery there.

Very little Oriental labor is used by white labor. Young lads are apprenticed to their trade and all get work. To join some of these the fee is very high. The speaker had to pay a fee of \$50 to join the mercantile marine.

Water was very scarce in New South Wales. Mr. Van der Sluys said he had paid as high as \$1.50 for a four-gallon can of pure water. 
