SHIP WRECK INVOLVES LOSS OF LIFE

British Steamer Total Wreck Off Phillipines; Two Passengers Perish

Captain and Seaman of Silver Hazel Are Missing—Survivors Have Harrowing Experiences Before Being Rescued by Destroyers

MANILA, Nov. 13.—The British steamer Silver Hazel, a vessel of 5300 tons, was completely wrecked on a reef near the Phillipine Islands. Members of the crew and passengers, numbering 52 in all, were taken off in life rafts before the vessel broke up and were last night reported aboard two United States destroyers on their way here.

PETITION TO SUPREME COURT IN HAUPTMANN CONVICTION IS MADE

NEWARK, N.J., Nov. 13.—Chief defence counsel Rosenkrantz yesterday filed a thirty-page petition in Supreme Court asking for a review of the conviction of Bruno Richard Hauptmann in the Lindbergh baby kidnapping case. Irregularities in the Fleming-ton trial, including bullying of the accused and witnesses, are charged. It will be December or January before the petition is dealt with, it is expected.

PACT IS OPPOSED

May Not be All Clear Sailing In U. S. For Proposed Trade Treaty With Canada

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 13. (CP)—The Florida Agricultural Tariff Association announced yesterday that it would begin legal proceedings against the constitutionality of the Reciprocal Tariff Act which gives the President power to reduce tariff rates as much as fifty percent. The Canada-United States treaty, which is now projected, comes under this Act.

At the same time reports of what may be contained in the treaty with Canada brought protest: from cattle and lumber regions.

SIGNATURE AUTHORIZED
President Franklin D. Roosevelt announced today that he had signed an authorization for the government's signature of the Canadian-American reciprocal trade treaty. He said that no time had yet been set for the signing but that Premier W. L. Mackenzie King of Canada was expected back here tomorrow.

No details as to what provisions are contained in the treaty are announced.

Kingsford-Smith Search Hopeless

Little Chance Now Of Famous Airman And Companion Being Found Alive

SINGAPORE, Nov. 13. (CP)—The sixth day since Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith and Tom Pethybridge became missing passed tonight without any trace being found despite a widespread search over the Bay of Bengal where they were last sighted, crews of the search planes stating the quest was now virtually hopeless. The search, however, will continue for a while longer on the faint chance that they may have been forced down at some isolated point where it would be impossible to get in touch with the outside world. Search fliers believe, however, that every reasonable landing place has been explored.

C. J. Melrose, British long distance flier, who was the last to sight the Kingsford-Smith plane and who has been participating actively in the search, was missing for a while himself yesterday but finally came in safely last night, several hours overdue.

Germany and Austria to Join League Nations in Declining To Supply Italy With Arms

Mussolini and Drummond Resume Conversations—Town Of Antalo in Northern Ethiopia Now in Danger Of Capture by Invaders

GENEVA, Nov. 13.—The League of Nations was heard in its sanctions campaign against Italy as being aggressor in the Italo-Ethiopian conflict yesterday with the receipt of advice from Berlin that Germany intended to declare a complete embargo by the end of this week, even before the League's sanctions go into effect, on the shipment of arms and war materials of all kinds to Italy.

At the same time word came from Vienna that the Austrian government had decided to place before the federal assembly a plan to join other nations in declaring an embargo on the shipment of arms and ammunition to Italy.

It had been feared that the League's sanctions might have been rendered more or less ineffectual through Germany using Austria as a lane for the supplying of arms and ammunition to Italy. Premier Benito Mussolini had counted upon the whole-hearted co-operation of Austria in this connection. This possibility now appears to be removed.

The League is now seriously considering the status of Italy remaining as a member of the League although having been declared an outlaw nation.

Conversations Resumed

ROME, Nov. 13.—Direct contact between Italy and Great Britain on the Mediterranean question were resumed yesterday when Premier Benito Mussolini again received Sir Eric Drummond, British ambassador. Italy has already signified its willingness to reduce its military forces in Libya but Britain, so far, has resolutely declined to remove any portion of her fleet from the Mediterranean.

Reports reaching here last night from the Italian military headquarters in Ethiopia were to the effect that Antalo, important caravan station sixteen miles south of Makale in Northern Ethiopia, was in imminent danger of capture by Italian forces as they continued their drive towards the Takazze River. Indications were still that the Ethiopians were preparing for a decisive stand against the invaders.

Double Lynching In Texas State

Two Negro Youths, Who Assaulted White Girl, Seized From Police And Strung Up

COLUMBUS, Texas, Nov. 13.—A mob of seven hundred men seized two negro youths from a police escort near here yesterday and lynched them. The pair had been convicted of assaulting a young white girl. In seizing them, the leaders of the mob declared the court had not sufficiently punished the prisoners.

QUICK ACTION

It did not take Premier King long to get action on the trade policy to which he was pledged. While the Prime Minister was getting some inside advice on the working of the new deal policy of the United States which might prove useful to Canada in framing her internal policies he and his experts discussed with President Roosevelt and his advisers a trade policy for the two countries which is said to include lumber and fish within its scope. It is to be hoped that the duty on halibut will have been removed on both sides of the line and that lumber and poles will also be on the free list. This would have a very considerable effect on northern industries and especially on the Canadian fishermen who have been severely handicapped without benefiting the American fishermen.

WHOLESOME COMPETITION

There seems to be some wholesome competition between the naval and military units in this city. If it is kept up it should be of benefit to each. Both were represented on Remembrance Day and both units were very smart and a decided credit to their respective organizations and to the city of Prince Rupert. It was a treat to see the boys from the Regiment once again on parade. Possibly by next Remembrance Day they may have two companies out. The training given the young men in both the naval and military organizations is excellent and should be a great aid in developing the young men physically and mentally.

CANADA AS TOBACCO GROWER

The growing of tobacco in Canada has developed to a point where the crop is being marketed each year at something like eight million dollars in Ontario alone and there is also considerable grown in British Columbia and marketed in the province. In Ontario 35,000,000 pounds of tobacco was taken from thirty thousand acres and the increase in selling value this year is three million dollars greater than last year. The development of this industry has been brought about largely through the co-operation of growers and manufacturers, the latter taking a keen interest in the work of the growers and owners by providing practical help such as introducing tobacco plants and instructors who knew their business.

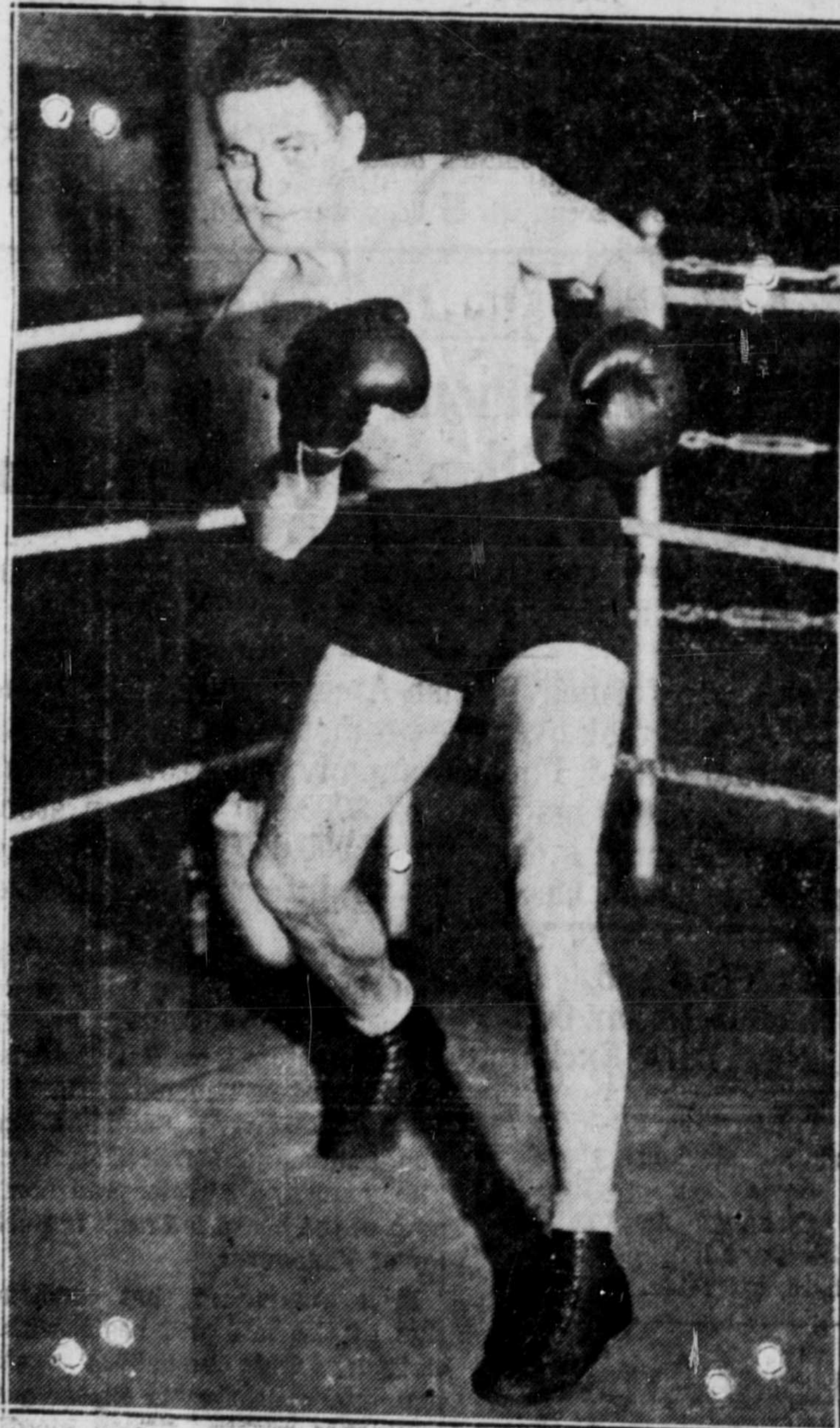

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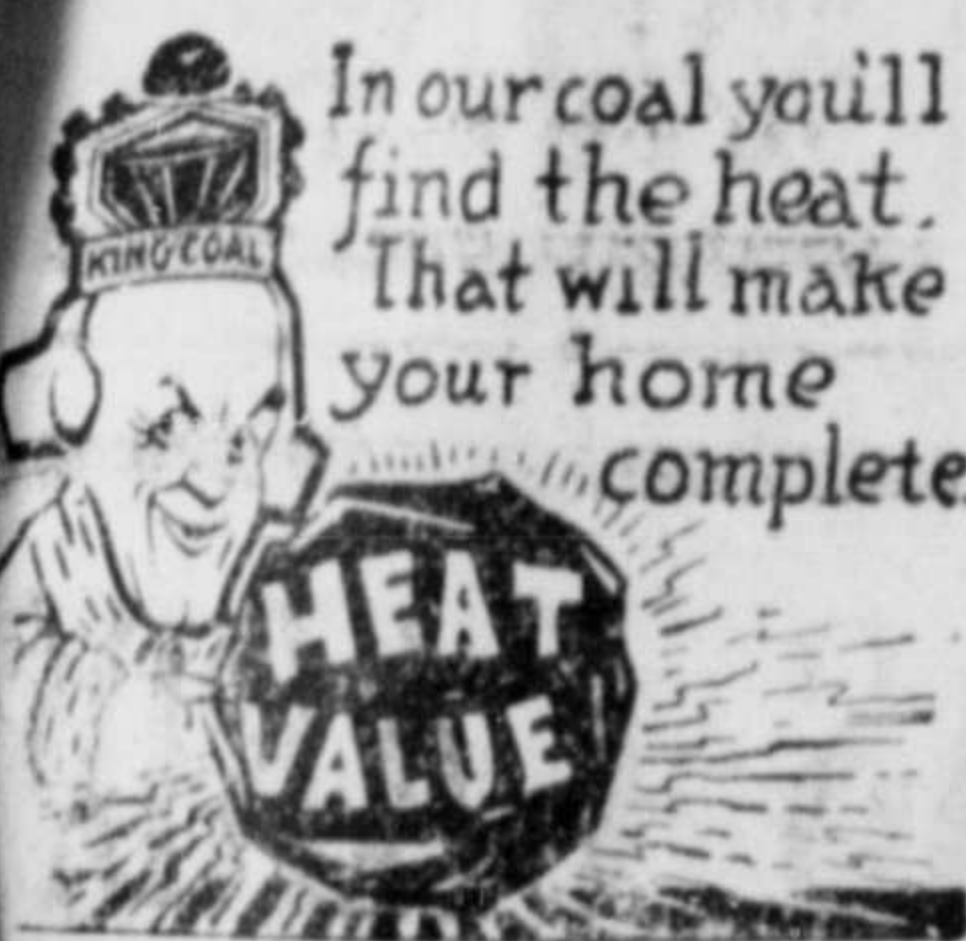

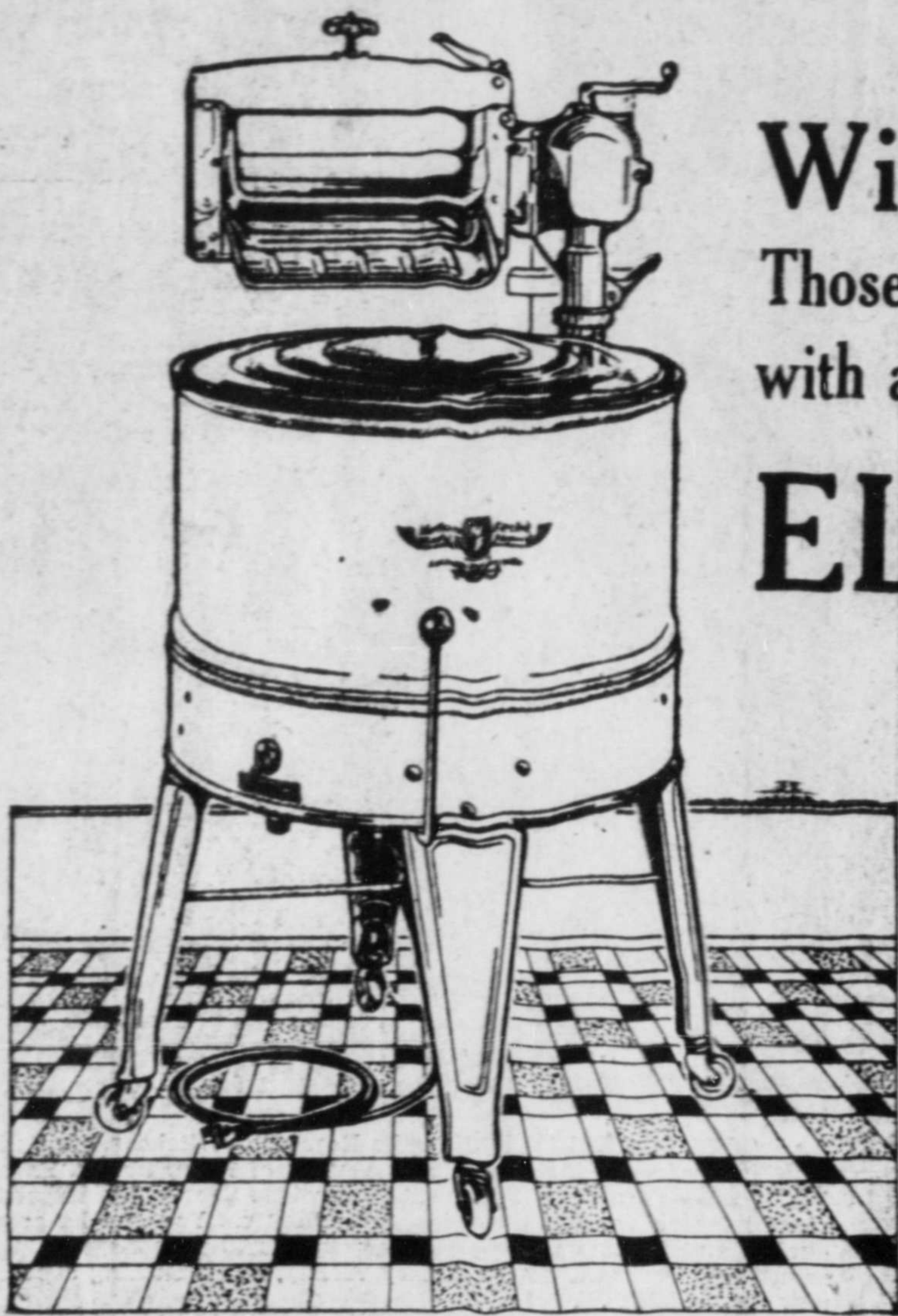

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PREACHES ON REMEMBRANCE

Inspiring Sermon Delivered By Dean Gibson at St. Andrew's Cathedral Sunday

"Honor the dead by remembering the living," urged Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral, in a Remembrance sermon at the cathedral on Sunday morning with members of the Canadian Legion and the Women's Auxiliary, who had paraded to the service, in attendance. There were many living today who still suffered as a result of the Great War—the maimed, the blind and those who lived a "living death" in the mental hospitals. There was danger, declared the Dean, in thinking only of the past—the danger of forgetting the present and the future. He referred to the indifference and selfishness which was so apparent in the world today.

It was a responsibility of the people of today to see that those who had "paid the price" of the Great War in death and in suffering had not made their sacrifice as a mere empty speculation.

"Let us purify our hearts with sorrow," exhorted the Dean whose subject was "Ye Are Bought With a Price." During the 2000 years' history of Christendom all that was good had been based on Christ. All that was bad had been due to forgetting that they had been "bought with a price." If that had been remembered the price of the Great War would never have had to be paid. If it was forgotten, there

might be even a greater price necessary.

"Are we going to live as members of the Kingdom of God and keep in remembrance the price that has been paid for us?" asked the Dean. "Look beyond the cenotaph," he counselled, "to the cross where Christ paid the price." There was a responsibility to one's own family, to one's community and as a member of the great commonwealth of nations. All those who held dear the memory of the dead and realized their responsibility to the living he asked to take a vow to act in every way like Christ as Christ had been like God.
