May Not be All Clear Sailing In U. S. For Proposed Trade Treaty With Canada

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 13: (CP)-The Florida Agricultural Tariff Association announced yesterday that it would begin legal proceedings against the constitutionality of the Reciprocal Tariff Act which gives the President power to reduce tariff rates as much as fifty percent. The Canada-United States treaty, which is now projected, comes under this Act.

At the same time reports of what may be contained in the treaty with Canada brought protests from cattle and lumber regions.

SIGNATURE AUTHORIZED President Franklin D. Roosevelt announced today that he had signed an authorization for the government's signature of the Canadian - American reciprocal trade treaty. He said that no time had vet been set for the signing back here tomorrow.


