"The description I have written would apply to life in the Soviet Union as I have known it. It also applies, in greater or less degree, to every country that has thrown over democracy for dictatorship. My own feeling, in looking back at Russia, is that, if we want to prevent western civilization from breaking down, either in the Bolshevik way or in some other, possibly milder, but still unpleasant way, there is a very strong obligation to do two things: to work for peace and to work for social justice. Russia, on the basis of its present-day record, is not a challenge to any western country. But it is a very strong warning of what might happen to any country under an irresistible double stress of war and of acute poverty and insecurity among large masses of the people."

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




