JAPAN HAVING SLEEPING SICKNESS

ABERHART EXPECTED TO ASSUME PREMIERSHIP OF ALTA.

Nearly Three Hundred Are Dead From Strange Malady; Many More Ill

Disease Is Particularly Prevalent in Osaka, Kobe and Okayama Districts With Few Cases Also Reported In City of Tokio

TOKYO, August 24 (Canadian Press)—The death toll of an epidemic of sleeping sickness in Japan has reached 275 up to today. The malady is particulary prevalent in the central provinces and is baffling medical authorities. Five fundred more cases are reported, chiefly in Osaka, Kobe and Okayama districts. There are a few cases in Tokio.



The election result seems to have been due to the energy, pertinacity and faith of one man, a school teacher, who was not a candidate but whom it is presumed will lead the new party and probably become premier of the province.

THE ALASKA HIGHWAY

Throughout the central interior of British Columbia the residents are keenly interested in the move to construct a highway from Vancouver to the Yukon Territory connecting with a section carrying the highway on to Fairbanks, Alaska. While no one seemed quite certain who should build the highway, all were for it as a means of opening up this country and of extending the goodwill movement between Canada and United States.

It is claimed by the people of the interior that the Alaska Highway would mean more to them than the Peace River western outlet or any other suggested move for development and increase of business. It seems to rank next to the Prince Rupert pulp mill in general interest among Aiyansh Winner the residents.

Of course the matter of route was bound to cause discussion. At Prince George the opinion seemed to be that it should go northerly from Summit Lake to Finlay Forks and then northwesterly from there. At places west of Vanderhoof, they were all for the Hazelton route, suggesting it go up the Kispiox River, part of which is already constructed. It is strongly urged by others that the highway go north from Kitwanga through the Kitwancool Valley. This route, it is claimed by its advocates, would be the easiest and with less new construction than any of the other advocated routes. It would tap the rich Naas Valley, the Groundhog coalfieds, and other mining, timber and farming areas which would prove of great value to the province. Further it is claimed that this route provides no insuperable difficulties such as high mountain ranges to cross, the divide between Kitwanga and the Naas being a comparatively low pass.

It seems to be the general idea that the money for construction of the road will come from the United States but on what terms or under what arrangement no one can sugest. What all seem anxious for is that the Dominion Government shall confer on the matter with the United States Government with a view to arriving at an understanding which would solve the difficult problem and insure construction of the highway.

In any case engineers would have to decide the route.




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
