CHAMBERLAIN BUDGET GRATIFYING

IMPORTANT POLICY CHANGE RECOMMENDED BY C.N. CHIEF

Tax On Lower Incomes In Great Britain Down; Pay Cut All Restored

Past Year Has Been Characterized by Substantial Advance Toward Recovery, Improvement in Trade Having Reached People's Purchasing Power

LONDON, April 15: (CP)—A cut in income tax rate in the lowest brackets and an increase in the personal exemption for married men is proposed in the budget introduced in the House of Commons today by Rt. Hon. Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, who estimated the cost of income tax changes for the year at \$48,000,000. He also announced full restoration of the ten per cent cut in civil service salaries that was effected in 1931, half of which was previously restored.

AGREEMENT COMPLETED

Stresa Conference Ends With Britain, France and Italy in Accord For Peace

STRESA, Italy, April 15: (CP)—The Stresa conference formally concluded yesterday with Great Britain, France and Italy in full accord on a seven-point European peace program.

In a final declaration on behalf of the three countries, it was said they were in complete agreement in opposing by all practical means any unilateral repudiation treaties which may endanger the peace of Europe and will act in close and cordial collaboration for this purpose.

MEXICO CITY, April 15:—President Cardenas at the week-end negotiated a truce in the general strike which has tied up business and industry in Mexico for some time only to have an electrical workers' strike break out as a result of which a number of cities were plunged into darkness.

TURN DOWN COMPROMISE

Halibut Boat Owners Insisting On One-Fifth Share of Halibut Livers

While no meeting had been held, it was announced today that a canvass of Prince Rupert halibut boat owners had shown them to be unfavorable to accepting a compromise proposal offered as a result of a meeting Saturday of the halibut fishermen's union that the boats take a one-tenth instead of a one-fifth share of the proceeds of halibut livers. The Canadian halibut boat owners are insisting on the boats getting a one-fifth share of the livers, the same as the Seattle, Vancouver and Alaska boats are receiving.

The latest proposition of the fishermen was made following their rejection of a proposal of the boat owners that the fishermen should receive the full returns of the halibut livers for the first four trips this season after which the livers would be computed with the halibut in gross stock of which the boats would receive a one-fifth share.

PROTECTION IS SOUGHT

New England Industrialists Seek Higher Tariff in Order to Compete With Japan

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 15:—As a means of meeting Japanese competition in the field of manufactured goods, representatives of New England industrialists, at a White House conference at the end of the week, asked for a protective tariff equal to the difference in the cost of American labor compared with Japanese plus ten per cent.

ROOSEVELT BELIEVES STATES SHOULD HELP IN SOCIAL SECURITY

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 15:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt broke his silence on the question of social security legislation, which is before Congress now, when he announced to newspapermen that he was opposed to the federal government taking exclusive responsibility for old age pensions and unemployment insurance. He expressed the belief that the states should assume a share of the cost.

DAWSON IS FLU SWEPT

Half of Population Down With Influenza and Measles—Public Institutions Closed

DAWSON, Y.T., April 15: (CP)—Schools, churches and theatres are closed and public gatherings are prohibited in Dawson as the city's only physician struggles almost single-handed to cope with an epidemic of measles and influenza.

The hospital is overcrowded and members of the nursing staff themselves are ill. Half the city is quarantined and the other half is attempting to carry on public services. The staffs of the Government Telegraphs, wireless, post office and all public and private offices are reduced by fifty per cent. The city's only doctor reports that he has the situation well in hand and that he hopes to have the epidemic curbed by the end of April.

Premier Bennett Goes For Drive

Prime Minister Able to Leave Hotel Apartment For First Time In Six Weeks

OTTAWA, April 15: (CP)—Premier R. B. Bennett went for a drive yesterday. It was the first time he had been out of his hotel apartment in six weeks, having been confined there on account of illness.

Hungertford Would Scrap Obsolete Equipment and Charge Profit and Loss

Is Same Plan That American Railroads Adopted During Depression—Board of Trustees is Being Asked To Give Its Approval to Proposal

OTTAWA, April 15: (CP)—Following a policy adopted by American railroads during the depression, the Canadian National Railways will put into effect on January 1 next an "extraordinary program of equipment retirements" if a recommendation by President S. J. Hungertford to the board of trustees is adopted. It will mean a charge to profit and loss of \$23,000,000 representing equipment rendered obsolete including "all wooden cars" numbering ten thousand and 570 passenger cars. Mr. Hungertford also believes that all locomotives over ten years old should be scrapped.

WELL KNOWN JUDGE DIES

Mr. Justice McEvoy Passes Away At Age of Seventy-One

TORONTO, April 15: (CP)—Mr. Justice John Millar McEvoy, aged 71, a member of the Ontario Supreme Court, died here on Saturday.

In the years of his law practice before his elevation to the bench, Mr. Justice McEvoy was recognized as one of the ablest criminal lawyers in Ontario. During his brilliant career he defended 18 persons charged with murder. Not one of the 18 defendants paid the death penalty, a remarkable record in the eyes of the profession.

John Millar McEvoy, K.C., B.A., LL.B., was born in Caradoc, Middlesex County in 1864, the son of A. M. and Sarah (Northcott) McEvoy. His father came of a family in County Down, Ireland. The future member of the Ontario Supreme Court was educated at Strathroy Collegiate, the University of Toronto and the Osgoode Hall Law School. During his student days he was recognized as a man of more than average ability and on his graduation from the university was elected a Fellow of Political Science and in that capacity taught Canadian constitutional history there.

Later he became a lecturer for one year under Prof. Mavor in the Political Science Department. In the early 90's he returned to his law practice in London, Ont., where he had since resided. A staunch Liberal, he unsuccessfully contested the East Middlesex Dominion riding in 1904, and London in 1911. In the provincial field he ran against Sir Adam Beck in 1908, but was defeated. In 1894 he married a daughter of John Anderson of East Williams, Ont. There was one son, Capt. A. M. McEvoy of Detroit, and one daughter, Mrs. Alton Neil of Stratford.

Mr. Justice McEvoy was called to the bar in 1893. He read law under Hon. Edward Blake, then of Blake, Lash and Cassels.

Three sisters, Mrs. T. E. Robson and Mrs. E. R. Dennis of London and Mrs. W. W. Kinsley of Humberstone, Ont., and two brothers, Thomas A. McEvoy who resides on the family homestead at Mount Brydges and Dr. Sanford McEvoy, of Enid, Okla., survive.

Mr. Justice McEvoy had for many years been a member of St. George's Lodge, No. 42, A. F. and A. M., Mocha Temple Shrine, the Royal Arch Masons and Royal Arcanum. He was a member of the Ontario Club, Toronto.

Graf Zeppelin Flying Again

Repairs to Damage Made Following Accident in Landing at Pernambuco

PERNAMBUCO, April 15:—The German dirigible Graf Zeppelin was able to resume her interrupted flight at the week-end following making of repairs to damage resulting from an accident on Friday when she missed the mooring mast here as she attempted to tie up in a driving rainstorm following her first Atlantic crossing of the season from Germany and crashed into the roof of a building, ripping her bag and damaging two engines. None on board were hurt.

Dollar Wheat In Kansas City Now

Duststorm Forces Prices of Grain Up—Damage Estimated At \$30,000,000

KANSAS CITY, April 15:—As a result of the recent disastrous duststorms, the price of wheat jumped to \$1 per bushel in trading here at the week-end. It was estimated that damage of \$30,000,000 had been done to Middle and Southwest farm lands as a result of the drought and dust.

May Eliminate Grade Crossings In United States

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 15:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt intimated at the end of the week that from \$100,000,000 to \$200,000,000 of his \$4,880,000,000 public works fund might be used in work to eliminate all grade railway crossings in the country.

WAR CLOUDS CLEARING

Much to the relief of all, the war clouds in Europe are clearing away again. An attitude of tolerance and understanding appears to be developing out of the distrust and fear. It was rather better than we had hoped for that Germany should decide to enter into an Eastern Europe security pact and that France should withdraw her protest to the League of Nations at Germany's re-arming. Once again Great Britain and Italy, possibly in a lesser degree, have proven the peace-makers. Undoubtedly, the possibility of Great Britain joining with the other nations against him was the actuating factor in Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler's right about face in regard to the security pact.

The present basis of understanding may not obviate an armament race but it at least seems to establish the fact that the nations which are so anxious to arm are not actuated as much by the desire to fight as by the desire to preserve peace. Evidently, they believe that the most effective means of preventing war is to be in a position where they may be able, if necessary, to fight for peace.

THE EARL OF DUNDONALD

The Earl of Dundonald will long be remembered in Canada for the stormy controversy surrounding his term as General Officer Commanding the Canadian militia from 1902 to 1904 when his plans for reorganization of the Canadian fighting forces had him continually at loggerheads with the government until he was relieved.

His stay in the Dominion, punctured by public addresses here and there, had the whole country stirred up. "What the government clearly wanted," he wrote years later, "was the dumb general who would be content to serve his time, shrug his shoulders and go. But the patriotic people of Canada were with me as was proved by the numerous comments in the press."

Dundonald said of his first meeting with Prime Minister Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "His manners were old-world and courteous. He ended his conversation with me by saying: 'You must not take the militia seriously, for though it is useful for suppressing internal disturbances it will not be required for the defence of the country, as the Monroe doctrine protects us against enemy aggression.'"

This was the start of his troubled time in Canada. Dundonald said he left the Prime Minister, "feeling much disturbed. Here was I sent out to reorganize the militia and the Prime Minister saying quite frankly that he advised me not to take the force seriously. Had I taken his hint what an easy period of command I could have had."

Lord Dundonald's tours of inspection gave him a most unfavorable impression of the general equipment of the Canadian militia and of their training. He had nothing but the warmest praise for officers and men of the Canadian militia. His grievances were against certain ministers and their subordinates.

A brand new floating fuel station to replace the one which was destroyed by fire last year is being placed on the North Island troling grounds this season by the Union Oil Co. The new scow, larger and better equipped than the old one, arrived from Vancouver early Saturday morning in tow of the company's tanker Unacana and left this morning in tow of the Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Daly, Capt. W. P. Armour, for North Island. The mooring of the station at North Island will be superintended by J. Adam, marine superintendent for the Union Oil Co., who arrived on the Catala last night from Vancouver and went out with the outfit this morning. B. Hutchinson is in charge of the station.

Thomas is operating the Viner. The fish are being brought into Prince Rupert. An early improvement in the run is anticipated.
