PRINCE RUPERT NAVAL BASE URGED SECESSION OF PROVINCE MOVEMENT GROWING--MANSON

British Columbia May Be Forced to Drop Out Of Dominion, Suggested

Cannot Wait Indefinitely For Eastern Canada to Come to Its Senses, Declares Omineca Member—Dr. Weir Defends Record of Government

VICTORIA, Feb. 23: (CP)—Speaking in the Legislature yesterday, A. M. Manson K.C., M. L. A. for Omineca, said that the movement for secession of British Columbia from Confederation was growing "in an amazing way" and, "if we are driven to it," he said, "we must face the question and we cannot and will not wait indefinitely, for Eastern Canada to come to its senses."

Hon. Dr. G. M. Weir, minister of education, defended the government's activities and reviewed the difficulties and accomplishments of his and other departments. Good progress, he said, had been made in compiling data on health insurance and he had no doubt that the pledge of the Liberal party to institute this legislation would be implemented at as early a date as possible.

YOUNG VANCOUVER WOMAN IS SHOT DEAD ON STREET

VANCOUVER, Feb. 23: (CP)—Mrs. Rosie Bova, aged 22, was shot dead on Knight Road at 10:40 last night by an unknown slayer while she was apparently returning to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vincenzo Moropito, after a visit downtown. She had been separated from her husband, James Bova, for three months.

Strong Plea on Behalf Of Pacific Fishing Industry Made by Hanson in House

OTTAWA, Feb. 23:—A strong plea on behalf of the fishing industry on the Pacific Coast was made in the House of Commons by Olof Hanson during debate of a resolution by William Duff, Nova Scotia Liberal, urging the free entry into Canada of equipment used in the fishing business. Mr. Hanson strongly supported the resolution and spoke as follows:

"I do not think that the fishing industry in Canada has received from this Parliament that consideration to which it is entitled. For quite a long time we have had only an acting minister and in the last few years we have had fishing problems never known to this country before. We have not a minister devoting his time and attention exclusively to this growing industry but only acting ministers and we cannot expect to get the best results from acting ministers. We cannot expect them to study the fishing problem as closely as it should be studied by a minister who is charged exclusively with that office. I submit that the industry is important enough to have the exclusive services of a minister. The mover of this resolution (Mr. Duff) has outlined the handicaps which the Canadian fishermen are working under and I would bring to the attention of the government an item which is very vital to the modern fishing industry. I refer to the supply of gasoline, crude oil and lubricating oil. These things are absolutely necessary if Canadian fishermen are to compete successfully with the fishermen from the United States. We are also under the handicap of a duty of two cents per pound on fresh fish and, while I am not blaming the government because of this, I do hope that now they are negotiating with the United States that duty will be one of the questions which will be taken into consideration."

Hanson Takes Up Radio in House

Minister Says Certain Amount of Improvement in Service and Reception Has Taken Place

J. O. Williamson, secretary of the Prince Rupert Radio Association has received a letter from Olof Hanson M.P. in reply to a letter written him recently in regard to radio reception and broadcasting in this part of the province.

Mr. Hanson says the minister informed him that the department is doing a certain amount of improving in the service as well as the reception and Mr. Hanson said this had his wholehearted support.

Inquiry on the floor of the House brought out the fact that the department collected \$67,715 in licences in British Columbia during the nine months ending at the last of December. TO TAKE IN NEW OUTFIT

Advance Guard of Hydraulic Operation in Omineca Passes Through City

Capt. Adams, D. C. Stevenson and G. Tallamy, mining men from Vancouver, arrived in the city from the south on the ss. Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon and proceeded by train last evening to the interior. They will fly into the Omineca district.

The party is going into the interior to ascertain the most advantageous route over which to take in a hydraulic outfit which is being brought out of the Atlin district to be placed in the neighborhood of Vital Creek where the interests which they represent contemplate extensive placer operations. The outfit is due to arrive here next Thursday afternoon aboard the Princess Norah from the north and will be transhipped over the Canadian National Railways to Vanderhoof enroute to the Omineca district.

Grote Stirling, minister of national defence, the advisability of having one of the Canadian destroyers now stationed at Esquimalt permanently based at Prince Rupert. P. for Skeena, and City Commissioner W. J. Alder. The minister is said to have been seriously impressed with the desirability of such a move.

BUSINESS MAN DIES

Mah Bon Quen, Resident of Prince Rupert For Quarter of Century, Passes Away Suddenly

Mah Bon Quen, aged 64, proprietor of the Sunrise Grocery, a resident of Prince Rupert for twenty-five years and one of the leaders of the local Chinese community, passed away suddenly at 6 o'clock this morning at his home on Fulton Street. Death was due to an asthmatic heart attack. Deceased had appeared to be in normal health on retiring last night but at 5 o'clock this morning he was seized with gasping spells. Medical assistance was immediately summoned in the person of Dr. J. P. Cade but, despite all that could be done, Mr. Mah expired within an hour.

Born in Canton, China, Mr. Mah came to Canada as a boy and had made his home in this country for almost fifty years. On coming from the Old Country, he landed at Vancouver and was located at various times at Nanaimo, Rossland, Grand Forks, Trail and Nelson before coming to Prince Rupert.

Deceased, besides his widow, is survived by eleven children—five sons and six daughters. The sons are Edward Mah Chong Kee, Earl, Alex, Albert and Frederick; the daughters, Lily, Daisy, Violet, Lucy, Phyllis and Bernice. Edward is at present in Japan in the course of a trip to China and is being called back to Prince Rupert. Earl is also on a trip to China while Lily is married and resides in Canton. All other members of the family are in Prince Rupert. All with the exception of Edward were born here. Mah Bon Jock of Prince Rupert is a brother. There are also cousins of deceased here. Deceased's mother, over ninety years of age, lives in Canton.

The late Mr. Mah belonged to Quon Min Tong and also to the Chinese Free Masons order. He was well known as a benefactor particularly to the unemployed and others in need.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers. Arrangements will not be made until the return of Edward Mah Chong Kee in about two weeks time.

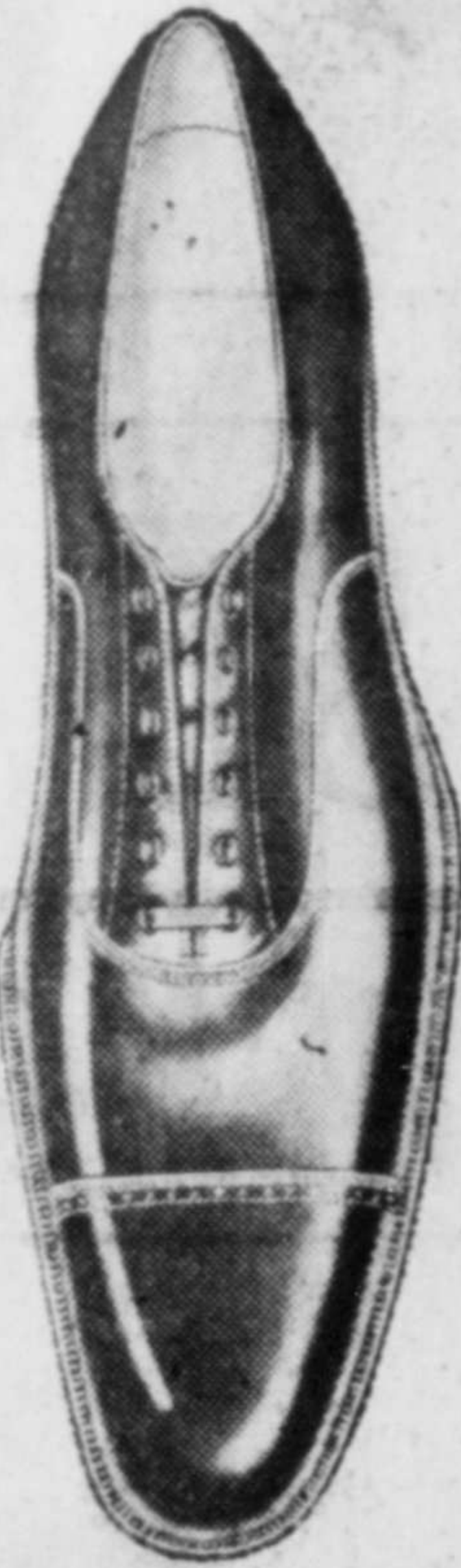

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EIGHT HOUR DAY

It seems curious that Premier Bennett should now be introducing a Dominion eight hour day bill when British Columbia has in most industries been regulated by an eight hour day law for a number of years past. It was the government of which the present Premier of British Columbia was a member that passed that bill but owing to keen competition with other provinces it was found necessary to make some exceptions, such as in the saw mills and railways.

We are all for reducing the hours of labor as long as it does not interfere with our ability to compete with other countries. The difficulty is in competing with such nations as Japan and Russia in world markets. The British Columbia lumber industry competes in the British market with the Russian lumber which is produced under conditions which would not be tolerated in this country and the employees earn just enough to buy themselves a sufficiency of food which the British Columbia logger would spurn as not being fit for a dog.

RAIN ON VANCOUVER ISLAND

At the village of Tofino on the west coast of Vancouver Island there is a Dominion Government meteorological station and it reports that the rainfall at that point in the month of January was 62.6 inches. During the same time the rainfall at Digby Isand adjoining Prince Rupert was 6.84 inches.

Prince Rupert should feel annoyed to think other points on the British Columbia coast are stealing her laurels. However, we gladly pass on the crown to Tofino and as we must be distinguished we eagerly seize on the title "City of Roses." Already we have the largest fresh halibut market in the world and the largest fish cold storage plant in the world. Now we shall also wear the title of the queen of flowers.

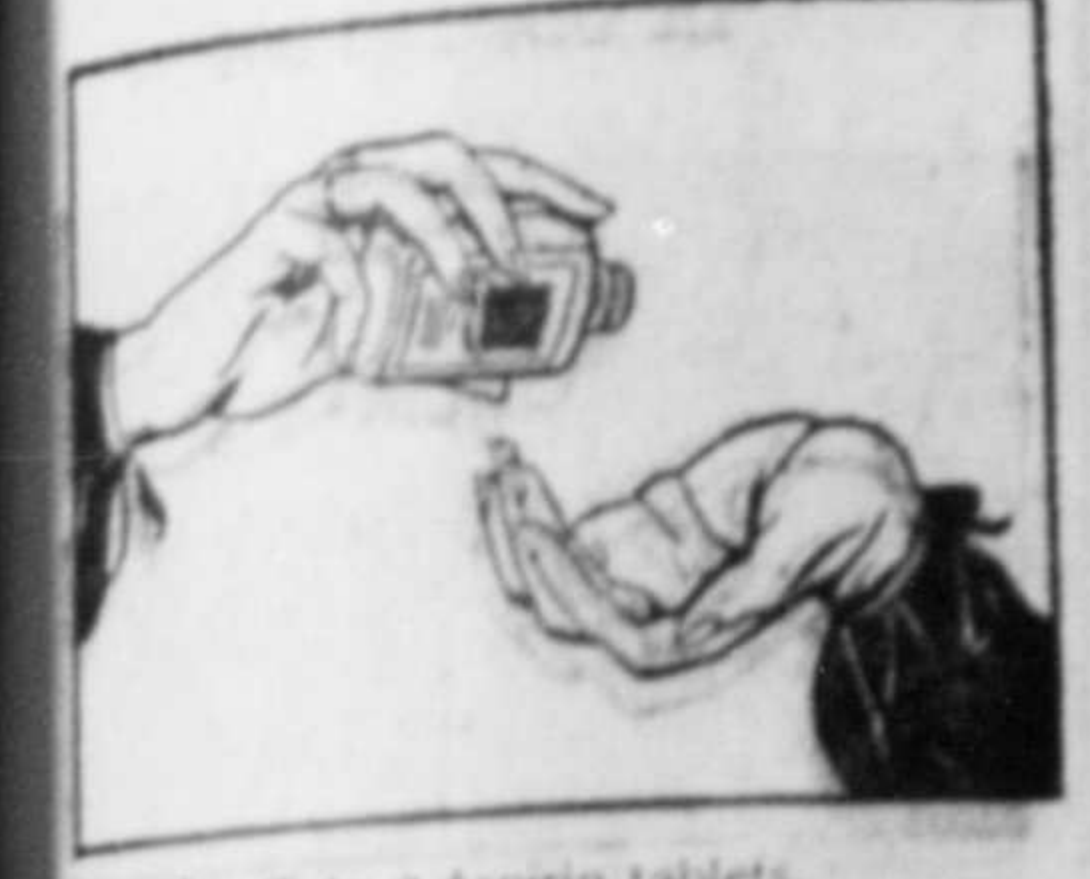

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Cow Bay Question to Fore—Frozen Halibut Situation Not Very Satisfactory—More About Mystic Rites

The Cow Bay question appears to be much to the fore again, judging from gossip to be heard along the waterfront. It is said that the provincial government and the Canadian National Railways are again negotiating for an exchange of property and that, once this is completed, considerable improvements will be made to the roadway including removal of the bluff on the west side of the road near the mouth of the bay. Talk of the filling in of the bay, long a local bone of contention, is also heard once more. There are also rumors of some of the squatters there being given notice to vacate. There is considerable difficulty in getting anything in the way of official confirmation of the reports.

The frozen halibut situation this spring, according to official figures, is anything but satisfactory and this is said to be one of the reasons why fish buyers of the coast are showing considerable diffidence in meeting with the request of the halibut boat owners and fishermen that a minimum price be set for the year. Canadian frozen stocks at February 1 this year are placed at 2,429,779 pounds as compared with 1,046,780 pounds a year ago. American stocks show a corresponding increase this year. The dealers, as per agreement, are holding out for the following wholesale prices for frozen fish: chickens, 10c; 10 to 12 pounds, 12c; 20 to 40 pounds, 11c; 40 to 60 pounds, 10c; 60 to 80 pounds, 9 1/2c; whales, 9c.

After having taken fish in the harbor for ten days with considerable success, Capt. R. Gammon was prospecting for herring outside yesterday with the Zenardi. The fish had gone down too deep in the harbor yesterday afternoon to make it possible to seine with any degree of success. The Zenardi is taking the fish for the Tucks Inlet reduction plant and was seining again in the harbor last night and this morning.

The odd spring salmon is still being picked up in the harbor by trollers. As long as the herring are in, there will also be springs.

Mitchell & Currie expect to complete by next week the contract for re-decking and other improvements at the marine department's wharf at Digby Island.

Armour Salvage Co.'s service boat Daly made a trip to Port Simpson yesterday with Ralph Parsons, fur trade commissioner for the Hudson Bay Co., and R. H. G. Bonnycastle, western Arctic manager for the company, both from Winnipeg. The party left at 6 o'clock in the morning and returned about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Messrs. Parsons and Bonnycastle sailed last night on the Princess Adelaide for Vancouver.

Dr. Carter's Ordeal

Written as it might be described a thousand years or more hence, the following account of Dr. Neal Carter's recent initiation as a member of the Ancient and Mystic Order of Sea Serpent Worshipers before an improvised altar in the catacombs of the Pacific Biological Station with appropriate burning of incense in front of a shingle laid on the carpet representing the shingle strand of far-famed Henry Island, has been prepared:

"After the complete destruction of the Usanian town of Prince Rupert by our aerial fleet in 2999 some curious relics of 'serpentians' were discovered through the work of officials representing the Interna-

must we forget the priest's part in the ceremony. He stands at the point of greatest illumination. His cadaverous face, like the white belly of a dead fish, shines dankly in the fire-light, while from his throat issue untutored howls and howlings.

"With this preliminary explanation we may now approach the deciphering of the manuscript with a sure hand. There can be no doubt that after one of these, probably annual, ceremonies the priest Nail, or Neal, felt moved to preserve in immortal verse his faith in, and kinship with, the revered serpent. While to our sophisticated minds the theme is naive, and the structure primitive, nevertheless the archaic flavor has its appeal and the curious will reflect that even in those remote times our sub-human progenitors had their moments of vision. They, too, reached for the stars. There has been heated discussion amongst the learned as to the proper classification of the medium used but with such nomenclatural subtleties we are not concerned. Suffice it to say that the consensus of opinion places it in the category of verse libre. This was a form of early poetry written by those who were unable to purchase a rhyming dictionary. Here, then, is a free translation of this ancient chant.

"The Most Glorious Hyllo Ko, P. R. J. Q., etc., has shown in Chapter 32X of his monumental work on 'The Significance of Serpent Worship in the Aboriginal North American Culture' that a tremendous impetus was given to this curious form of neo-paganism in the second decade of the 20th Century. Apparently the recrudescence of serpent worship was due largely to the energy of an obscure sect known as the Con-specific Stitological Batlion with headquarters at Manimo, or Nimeno, on the lost island of Vangouber. One of the high priests of this cult, to whom this amazing manuscript is ascribed, was known by various names. Some of those which have come down to us are Nail, or Neal, Karter or Carterdeo. It would seem that this Nail or Neal, during the period when serpent worship had reached the zenith of its popularity, performed the chief part, or at any rate assisted, in a remarkable ceremonial of serpent worship near the aboriginal village of Prince Rupert. Hyllo Ko (loc. cit) has demonstrated beyond any reasonable doubt that an actual animal, possibly a sea cow, or sea steer, was used in this ceremony which took place at night during the full moon near the sea's edge on a secluded strip of shingle. Following the ceremony, the details of which have not been recorded, parts of the dead animal were sent to all the followers of the serpent cult. No doubt this was analogous to that similar quaint custom of distributing fragments of cake following the wedding orgies of these aboriginals. But that, of course, is purely speculative. Apparently, these animal fragments were passed from hand to hand amongst the devout, who, no doubt, profited greatly. Finally the fragments were assembled at one of the main villages of Vangouber Island known as Britannica-in-exile. Philologists can, perhaps, throw light on this curious name. Here a rude presentation of the animal was constructed and, suitably illuminated, became the centre of curious midnight worship.

"This scene, under the star-powdered sky, although savage and revolting, must have had moments of impressive solemnity. I will not narrow my readers by a description of the orgiastic rites which took place but we can, at least, picture these wild creatures, and their women, swaying and staggering about the recumbent figure of their Serpent God as they are lashed to greater and greater frenzy by the abdominal retchings of the brazen saxaphones, the belching of tumtums and noises of equal harshness from still ruder instruments. Nor

Lectures For Fishermen
Disinfection of boats, changes in hold arrangements and procedure for the handling of fresh fish are subjects being discussed by Dr. R. H. Bedford of the scientific staff of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station in a specially arranged series of two lectures before halibut boat owners and fishermen and salmon trollers in the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union Hall here. There were about one hundred men present Thursday night

at the first meeting over which Ex-Mayor Cyril H. Orme presided. Speakers, besides Dr. Bedford, were Dr. Neal Carter, director of the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station, and Otto C. Young, refrigeration engineer attached to the station staff. The second meeting will be held next Thursday.

After making a speedy run north, Union steamer Venture, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, arrived in port at 5:15 yesterday afternoon from the south and sailed at 12 midnight on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. The Venture will be making one or two more trips on this run in place of the steamer Cardena which is relieving on the run of the Catala while the latter vessel takes her annual-overhaul in Vancouver.

Timely Recipes

SANDWICH FILLINGS

For home parties the hostess has to make her sandwiches hours ahead; and thousands of Canadian women pack lunch boxes every day and worry about ways of keeping sandwiches perfectly fresh. The new minute tapioca will work miracles for them. No need to get the bread limp by having the filling soak into it for hours while the sandwiches are rolled in paper or a damp cloth.

This tapioca holds the moisture in sandwich fillings and yet does not in any way interfere with the flavor of those clever appetizing combinations that everyone likes. The tapioca helps to make chicken, fish or cheese go a long way, too.

To prepare sandwich fillings, place liquid in top of double boiler and bring to a boil over direct heat. Combine minute tapioca and dry seasonings, add gradually to liquid and bring to a brisk boil, stirring constantly. Place immediately over rapidly boiling water and cook five minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from boiling water. Combine remaining ingredients in order given; add to tapioca mixture and blend. Cool, mixture thickens as it cools.
