Immediate Outbreak of War Warded Off and Hostilities May be Permanently Obviated-Peace Conference To be Held in September in Northern Italy

GENEVA, Aug. 2:-It was revealed last night that delegates of Great Britain, France and Italy had reached an agreement which will obviate the immediate outbreak of war between Italy and Abyssinia and which may result in the warding off of hostilities in Africa altogether. Premier Benito Mussolini will, it is expected, take formal action today either in acceptance

Under the agreement an arbitration commission, such as Italy has been insisting upon, is provided. Negotiations looking to a permanent settlement of the whole dispute are to be initiated by September when a conference will be held in Northern Italy between representatives of Great Britain, France, Italy and Ethiopia.





Prince Rupert Engineering District Which Covers Large

Using Local Men

Highway Extension and Improvement-Are Now In Progress In Many Parts Of Widespread North

Giving employment to fully five hundred men in this engineering district which takes in Prince Rupert, Atlin, Omineca, Skeena and part of Mackenzie ridings, the provincial government's new road work program is now well under way in Central and Northern British Columbia. In Prince Rupert district alone some one hundred men are being given work. The policy of the department is to confine the employment to local men of the districts.

Thirty men are now working from Cloyah Bay camp on the gravelling and surfacing of the Sneena River Highway this side of Cloyah and on the extension of the grading in the other direction towards Taylor Lake, R. A. Mc-Leod is foreman of the work.

Quite extensive work is being done on the Graham Island Marine Drive between Port Clements and Queen Charlotte City including the much-needed diversion of

In Skeena district work is being carried out on the continuation of highway construction between Usk and Hazelton while improvements are being made on roads around Terrace and that cection of the highway between Telkwa and Hazelton.

In Omineca district considerable work is now in progress on the main highway as well as northward from Vanderhoof towards Manson Creek.

The program in Atlin district includes improvements to the road from Stewart to the Big Missouri and elsewhere in Portland Canal. At Alice Arm the Dolly Varden mining road is being improved. Further north in Atlin district necessary work is also being carried on.


