

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

Many strolled down to the dock this morning to meet the City of Seattle from the north, in the hope that she would bring some further details of the terrible hotel fire at Juneau. But the ship's officers could only corroborate the occurrences without adding any additional details.

The City of Seattle was at Juneau wharf the day after the fire for less than an hour. It was all over then but the search for bodies was going on, an excited crowd surrounding the smouldering ruins. There was then reported to be three bodies recovered. At Wganrel the next morning they learned by wire that seven bodies had been recovreed, which is substantially what the News received by wire.


