## BRITISH SWIMMER SUCCEEDS CROSSING CHANNEL

### ADVISED THE MEN TO MARRY AMERICAN GIRLS

**Mayor Manson Makes a Novel Contribution to Mr. Clements' Anti-Reciprocity Campaign—Some Queer Advice to Prince Rupert Audience**

Four rows of empty seats confronted the Conservative platform party and the candidate, H. S. Clements, when the curtain went up at the meeting held last night in the Empress Theatre. Six or eight rows had been reserved for ladies, but only a sprinkling of the sex attended to hear Mr. Clements' time-worn expressions of gratification at seeing "so many ladies present."

Alderman Dr. Clayton presided over the meeting, and "that heaven-born orator" as Alderman Douglas calls him, made a capable chairman. In his introductory remarks he extended an invitation to Mr. Duncan Ross, Mr. J. S. Cowper or any of Mr. Ross's representatives to come on to the platform. Mr. Ross is up river, and Mr. Cowper was at Stewart so they were unable to grace the occasion.

The Mayor was there, and he made a very patriotic speech, waving the flag in correct Conservative style. He told the audience that he had picked his wife from amongst the pretty American girls, and advised the men of the audience to go and do likewise.

Mr. Clements himself spoke for quite a long time, and spoke rather fast. After touching on reciprocity for a moment he skip-

ped off to attack the present naval policy. He declared himself in favor of Canada's presenting to Great Britain a new Drednaught to be followed by others. In intended mitigation no doubt of his recent humbling through Hansard at the hands of Mr. Duncan Ross, Mr. Clements said that he could find places in Hansard where Sir Wilfrid Laurier had said reciprocity was an old policy. Maintaining that the "astute Americans" whom he loved as brothers, were only trying to get Canada's raw materials Mr. Clements concluded by telling the ladies how much the crockery of an icebreaker on the St. Lawrence had cost several years ago. The sum was over two thousand dollars and the ladies laughed all right. Mr. Clements implied that under Conservative rule the crockery would not have cost quite so much.

R. B. Young of Queen Charlotte City in a short speech closed the meeting. He declared that though himself an American by birth, he had his doubts of his countrymen's intentions regarding the reciprocity pact. Quite the best part of the meeting was the singing of God Save the King at the end. The chairman started it in too high a key, but someone saved the situation.

### NEW CITY HALL REACHES DEFINITE WORKING STAGE

**Site Settled for Fulton Street, Near Third Avenue—Excavation for \$15,000 Building to be Started at Once by Day Labor**

During the whole of the session of the council yesterday afternoon Alderman Newton was remarkably silent. Only once in the two hours was his voice heard, and then merely as a protest against the new city hall not being erected on the site that he himself, without the support of any other member of the council, had said that it should be erected.

Alderman Hilditch, chairman of the committee on public works, reported that the committee were of opinion that no time should be lost in proceeding with the erection of the city hall, and gave his reasons for suggesting such expediency. The site selected is next to the Wallace Block on Fulton street and the cost of the building is limited to \$15,000. For this price it is hoped a building can be erected that will serve all municipal purposes for the next ten years.

Alderman Hilditch said the council might build a one-story building the full size of the lot, or a two story building that would have to be much smaller. The frontage on Fulton street is sixty feet, and the alderman produced a plan of one story and two basements. The first of these would be 20 x 60 feet, the second 40 x 60 feet, and the third 100 x 60 feet. The lower rooms could be used

for jail, police courts and all purposes connected with the police and fire departments, and the floor above for the council chamber, library and some of the civic offices.

The map was carefully gone over and the opinion arrived at that the excavation could be begun at once and the details of the plans be decided upon and worked out by the architect in the meantime.

Alderman Smith moved that the excavation be done by days work and that the superintendent of public works have charge of it, and this motion carried.

Before it was put to vote, however, Alderman Newton had a few words to say. He fully realized at a former meeting of the council, he said, that he was "outclassed." He had then proposed that the site for the city hall should be at the top of Fulton street but he had not had even a seconder. After that overwhelming defeat he was not going to make any further objection; but he must still say that a mistake was being made in not building the city hall on the more elevated spot, where it would be prominent and catch the eye of the new comer to the city.

The treaty affects the regulation of fishing both in coast and inland waters.

Prompt on the stroke of two o'clock this afternoon, Deputy Returning Officer F. G. Dawson declared the nominations to be closed for the House of Commons seat in Comox-Atlin. Neither candidate was present in the Court House for the ceremony, though many of their supporters gathered for the fray. Mr. Ross was speeding on his way to Hazelton to address a meeting, while Mr. Clements was on his way to Stewart with like intent.

Clements of Vancouver, whose signature was attested to by his agent William Duncan, who handed in a list of names; that of Duncan Ross of Hazelton, C. V. Ottawa, Sept. 7.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was accorded a magnificent reception last night when he visited the town of Collingwood. Practically the whole town turned out en masse to cheer the great Liberal leader, who made a magnificent speech in exposition of the reciprocity question.

### IMPORTANT NEW BRIDGE NEAR LAKELSE VALLEY

**Mr. George Little Starts Gangs Making Trail and Bridge from Littleton to Lakelse Road—Settlers Pleased at Improvement—Provincial Government Road Work Being Stopped**

Good news for the pre-emptors and settlers in the Lakelse Valley and district is contained in the announcement that Mr. George Little, owner of the Littleton Townsite, has begun to construct at his own expense a bridge and approaches across the river just opposite Littleton to join the Lakelse Road. Work began on Monday morning. A trail is being made from the depot site at Littleton to the main channel at Skeena Ferry. From there a foot bridge will be constructed to the islands in the Slue, and thence the trail will lead by another bridge across to the Lakelse Road.

Settlers in the district are very glad to see this work begun for all Provincial Government work is now being shut down, and the men are being taken off the road course. It will be some time of course before the Little Canyon Bridge is completed and mean-

while the advantage of the bridge over to Littleton is a great one, and will be the means of encouraging the development of the district this fall. Accounts of conditions in the Lakelse Valley and district this summer are very good indeed. So far from the weather's having been rainy, reports all agree that never was better weather experienced.

In beautifully dry and sunny weather fruit has been ripening to perfection, and owing to the presence of abundant springs in the valley there has been little danger from drought. All the settlers are unanimously enthusiastic about their prospects, and Mr. C. J. Muller who has some fine farm land there with his neighbors feels sure that extensive development of this whole district as a fruit growing, mixed and dairy farming country and market gradening tract is certain.

### SWIMMER SUCCEEDS AT LAST ON CROSS-CHANNEL SWIM

**Wm. T. Burgess, on His Sixteenth Attempt, Accomplishes Great Feat—Was in Water 24 Hours and Covered Sixty Miles—His Last Attempt**

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
Deal, England, Sept. 7.—On his sixteenth attempt William T. Burgess, the famous Yorkshire long distance swimmer, yesterday succeeded in swimming the English channel.

Entering the water in the early morning, Burgess swam without stopping all day and night until early next morning when he touched land again. In the twenty-four hours he was in the water, fighting the tide and currents to cross the twenty-one mile channel, he swam altogether sixty miles.

Before entering the water, Burgess announced that if he failed this time he would never try again. On each of the fifteen previous attempts he had got within a few miles of the French coast, but could not overcome the tide on the other side.

The only other man to have succeeded in the feat was Captain

Webb who swam the channel in 1875, a few years before meeting his death at Niagara. France shares in the glory of Burgess' feat, as he recently became a naturalised Frenchman.

**EIGHTY-ONE DROWNED**

**Chilian Steamer Wrecked Off South American Coast**

## WHY CONSERVATIVES SHOULD SUPPORT RECIPROCITY

Why every Conservative should vote for reciprocity is apparent. Every follower of Sir John A. Macdonald, to be consistent, should support this reciprocity agreement for all he is worth. Coming as an admonition from the grave are these words, delivered in the last election campaign of their great leader at Toronto, February 21, 1891:

"It has been said in the opposition press that we have been rather changing our views. As Sir Charles Tupper has explained, we have been consistent with regard to all questions relating to the fiscal policy and the development of trade and the industries of Canada. We have never varied. Our policy is quite consistent with the desire to extend our trade to all nations of the earth, including our neighbors across the border.

"We have offered to the United States to negotiate like two sensible nations, desirous of getting mutual trade. And what does Mr. Blaine say? He says: 'I think we ought to have a basis to negotiate.' And Mr. Blaine went further, so anxious was he to meet our views. He said that after the 4th of March he would agree to meet the British minister and a delegation from Canada to consider the question, and that is the position in which the matter stands now."

In other words, Sir John A. Macdonald's Government in 1891, and the newspapers supporting it, looked upon a reciprocity which would exclude manufactured articles as a boon to Canada, and even pretended to be on the eve of securing it. Such a reciprocity is that which the Laurier Government has now achieved, and it is one which Conservative voters can support at the polls without being untrue to party traditions.

In this same election campaign Sir John Thompson, then minister of justice in the Macdonald cabinet, issued a manifesto stating:

"The Government, of which I am a member, is appealing to the country with a policy which we believe will be heartily endorsed by a great majority of the electors. We have made to the Government of the United States, through the Government of Great Britain, proposals for reciprocity in trade, which we have good reason to believe will result in an arrangement by which the markets of the United

States will be reopened to the products which our people desire most to send there.

"A fair measure of reciprocity is what we desire, and we have no doubt that that can be obtained without undue sacrifices."

Local Conservatives who have the slightest regard for consistency are forced at the coming election to choose between the traditional policies of Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir John Thompson, and the ephemeral "agin the Government" policy of Mr. R. L. Borden.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Riordan Paper Company of Quebec stands to gain \$90,000 per annum in trade with the United States should reciprocity carry. The manager of the company recently wrote a letter to the government stating this. The letter was read in Parliament. George H. Perley, chief Conservative whip, is a large shareholder in the company and he does not know whether to be most angry with the minister who read the letter aloud or at the manager who sent it. Facts are sometimes awkward things.

Citizens who heard Mr. Thomas Dunn's denunciation of Mr. H. S. Clements as a man whose attitude towards Prince Rupert is such that he couldn't stay in the city, and couldn't find names bad enough for it when he went down below, may find further food for thought by glancing at the imprint of a Vancouver printing house at the foot of the Clements' posters now adorning our light poles. Prince Rupert has five printing establishments—Mr. Clements didn't know that of course. To him Prince Rupert is merely a nick in the backwoods compared with his beloved Vancouver.

## PRESS DEGENERATION

"Bruce" Tells to What Base Uses One Has Come

Vancouver's morning paper is a newspaper run to seed. It is no news efficiency; its front-page make-up is like the arrangement of the epitaph on a tombstone, and its editorial page is about as colorful as a rainy day. This part of the paper is a smudge of gray and has as much of the personal equation as a rubber stamp. Just now it is repeating with the mechanical whine of a phonograph the ready-to-wear arguments against reciprocity and screaming "annexation" like a parrot. It sprinkles its pages with "canned" news about the progress of the campaign.

Formerly a well-conducted newspaper, a tribune of the people, with news free from undue bias, it has degenerated. It no longer can claim as an asset the common respect of all; it no longer sets the fashions in thought for any considerable number of people. At

the beginning of this political campaign I expected it would be afflicted with a delirium of patriotism and that its annexation howl would rise to the clouds, and it has lived up to my expectations. But its power and value as a newspaper and a party organ has gone. It is not a newspaper of the intellectual class.—Saturday Sunset.

## Another Editor Candidate

Mr. W. A. Buchanan, formerly of the St. Thomas' Journal, now editor of the Lethbridge Herald, has resigned his seat in the Local Legislature of Alberta, and is to be the Liberal candidate against Mr. McGrath.

The two ordinances recently voted upon came before the council yesterday afternoon, when formal steps were taken for obtaining provincial approval of the same. At the same time Mayor Marson appended his official signature to the map which accompanies the agreement with the railway company.

## LAURIER AT COBOURG

Bourassa Tries to Speak at Hull Amid Disorder

(Canadian Press Despatch) Ottawa, Sept. 7.—At Cobourg Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke to an enthusiastic audience of five thousand. Reciprocity, he said, was of particular benefit to the farmers and thereby through them the whole country would benefit.

R. L. Borden speaking at St. John, N. B., claimed the Coast cities would lose their trade by a diversion of the trade south through reciprocity.

Bourassa addressed a meeting at Hull, which was marked by much disturbance and disorder.

Clifford Sifton addressed a big meeting in this city.

## A Traitor to Canada

Sir Richard Cartwright, who is a master of English, said this in the Canadian Parliament some years ago:

"I hold any man in this country, be his place or position what it may, who chooses to foster that foolish and silly prejudice which exists in the minds of some portion of our people against our kinsmen in the United States, is in the highest degree a traitor—a traitor to Canada, a traitor to the British Empire, and a traitor to the British race."

LATEST NEWS OF JUNEAU FIRE

Passengers on City of Seattle This Morning Believed Number of Dead in Hotel Ruins May Reach Eighteen.

Many strolled down to the dock this morning to meet the City of Seattle from the north, in the hope that she would bring some further details of the terrible hotel fire at Juneau.

The City of Seattle was at Juneau wharf the day after the fire for less than an hour. It was all over then but the search for bodies was going on, an excited crowd surrounding the smouldering ruins.

Among the few passengers going through from Juneau only descriptions of the horrors of the calamity were obtained, with no additional names of those lost.

"What was the cause of the fire?" remarked an old pioneer from Douglas Island, "the people have got to find out. They were too busy sifting the ruins for dead when we left."

Twelve injured are said to be in the Juneau hospital, the lives of nearly one-half of whom are despaired of.

SKEENA PACK IS BIG ONE

Northern Fisheries are Bigger Than Ever Says Inspector Williams.

Mr. John T. Williams, the Dominion Inspector of Fisheries, is in port today with the cruiser Falcon, on his way to investigate some reported seizures on the Naas.

Asked by a News reporter if the fears that the salmon pack would be light this year were warranted, Mr. Williams said that the pack for the Skeena and Naas districts were bigger than ever.

"I cannot speak of the south districts, but only of my own. Last year the Skeena river pack was 222,000 cases; this year it is approximately 245,000 cases. On the Naas the growth is even larger. Last year the Naas pack was 40,000 cases; this year it is already 81,500 and still operating. The Government is doing everything possible by protecting the spawning grounds and by fishing regulations to protect the salmon and ensure large packs in the north," said Inspector Williams.

TAX RATE TO BE TWELVE MILLS

Owing to Provincial Government Dilatory Dealing with G. T. P. Assessment City Assessor is Hindered.

At the meeting of the council yesterday afternoon Mayor Manson brought forward the report of the finance committee, which is an estimate of the receipts and expenditures for the coming year. The expenditures amount to \$196,465 and the receipts to \$107,406. He said that owing to the delay in the matter of the railway assessment the assessor would be late in getting to work and it was therefore necessary to consider this report as soon as possible in order to pass upon the rate of assessment.

The report was laid on the table for the time but before the adjournment Alderman Kirkpatrick introduced a bylaw for the levying of a tax of twelve mills upon all lands in the city, for ordinary municipal expenditures including board of health and school purposes, the amount stated being \$100,130.70. Of the tax nine mills is for general purposes, one mill for board of health and hospital purposes and two mills for school purposes.

The bylaw was read a second time and will be brought up for final passage at the adjourned meeting on Friday evening.
