Young Chauffeur is Sentenced to Death; Mercy Recommended

Plea of Insanity is Disregarded—Woman is Freed on Two Indictments in Connection With Sensational Bournemouth Killing

LONDON, May 31: (CP)—George Percy Stoner was found guilty by a jury of ten men and two women at Old Bailey today of murdering Francis Rattenbury, former deliberated for fifty minutes and, with its verdict of British Columbia architect and land speculator. The jury guilty, brought in a recommendation for mercy. The presiding judge immediately sentenced the young chauffeur to death but stated that he would bring the plea for mercy before the proper authorities. The jury disregarded the plea on behalf of Stoner that he was insane with drugs and jealousy at the time.

TEACHERS ASK MORE

Ten Percent Increase in Salaries Effective September This Year Requested of Commissioner

The Prince Rupert Teachers' Association has passed a resolution requesting City Commissioner W. J. Alder for an increase of ten percent in present salaries effective September 1 this year.

In support of the request, the association points out that restoration of salary cuts and annual increments has been in progress in other places for some time, that the cost of living is steadily increasing, that the provincial and federal services have been restoring salary cuts and that the financial standing of the city is now much improved.

MEN VOTE AGAINST RETURN TO CAMPS; MARCH TO OTTAWA

VANCOUVER, May 31:—The result of the secret ballot of relief camp strikers on the question of returning to the camps was announced yesterday afternoon, showing the men to be opposed to returning to the camps by a vote of 600 to 200. Instead, a mass march to Ottawa is now planned, tentative arrangements being for it to commence on Monday.

MINISTRY DEFEATED

Flandin Resigns With His Cabinet in France—Fernand Bouisson New Premier

PARIS, May 31: (CP)—Following the resignation of Premier Pierre Flandin's cabinet early this morning after being defeated in the Chamber of Deputies on its demand for sweeping measures to deal with speculation and the outflow of gold from the country, Fernand Bouisson, 60-year old president of the Chamber of Deputies, accepted the Premiership of France today and the task of waging the financial battle on behalf of France.

During a hectic all-night session of the Chamber, the minister of finance resigned after which Premier Flandin, who collapsed during the debate, tendered the resignation of the cabinet.

Many Other Thousands Injured While Numbers of Homeless Reach Huge Proportions—Entire Communities Wiped Out and Property Damage Enormous—Airmen and Officials Among Dead

KARACHI, India, May 31: (CP)—In one of the most terrific catastrophes of modern times, twenty thousand persons were killed early this morning by an earthquake centering on the native city of Quetta in northwestern India, according to reports received here today. First advices were of a meagre nature, indicating thirty thousand dead, but more details are beginning to gradually come in, describing a frightful holocaust which, in addition to the enormous mortal toll, left other thousands injured and hundreds of thousands homeless while property loss is enormous, complete communities being entirely wiped out. It is probable that later advices may increase the number of fatalities.

FORMING CABINET

Premier MacDonald's Resignation In Hands of King, 'Tis Sair; Acceptance Deferred

LONDON, May 31:—It is reported that the resignation of Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald is already in the hands of the King but will not be formally accepted until such time as Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin has formed his new cabinet which may take a few days.

In well informed quarters it is intimated that Mr. MacDonald will take over the post of Lord President of the Council now held by Mr. Baldwin and that Sir John Simon, contrary reports notwithstanding, will continue as foreign minister.

Caledonia Synod Sessions to Be Held Next Week

Annual meetings of the synod of the Anglican diocese of Caledonia will open here next Wednesday with clergy from all parts of the diocese in attendance and the bishop, Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix D.D., presiding. Rev. F. H. Wilkinson, rector of Christ Church Cathedral, Vancouver, will preach at the opening service on Wednesday morning. The synod will continue in session for a couple of days.

Normandie Due Sunday Night At New York

LE HAVRE, France, May 31:—The giant new French liner Normandie, which sailed from here at 6:28 Wednesday evening for New York with 1070 passengers on board, should reach New York in a few hours more than four days. The present trans-Atlantic speed record is held by the Italian liner Rex.

NEW YORK, May 31:—Six persons were killed and some twenty injured in a mysterious explosion which virtually destroyed a large brick building at the corner of Twenty-First Street, and Third Avenue.

Assistant Commissioner T. W. S. Parsons, provincial police, returned to the city on the Prince Rupert last evening after having made the round trip north from Victoria to Anyox and Stewart. From here he will proceed on the Princess Alice tomorrow morning to Atlin and Telegraph Creek districts on an official tour.

VERY FEW PLACES BETTER

A resident of Prince Rupert who often gets outside and sees what is going on in other parts of the world recently remarked that he knew of few places where life was as pleasant as in this city. He stated that the last place he would like to reside would be in one of the big cities. Prince Rupert had most of the city advantages and, at the same time, was sufficiently rural to satisfy his tastes. Enumerating some of the advantages of life here, it was mentioned that there were no snakes or other reptiles, no bad flies, no annoying insects such as cockroaches, no droughts, no duststorms, no floods, no earthquakes, no intense heat, no intense cold, in fact nothing to make life unpleasant except at times rather more dull or rainy days than might be considered conducive to enjoyment.

WHERE THEY BELONG

The proposal of the relief camp men to move to Ottawa with a view to influencing the government there to provide for them would be a good move. Ottawa is where they belong. If the problem became sufficiently pressing at the nation's capital it is probable that the Bennett government might be moved to take steps to ameliorate the condition which exists. To say that nothing can be done is to admit incompetency.

Suppose the local business men, bankers, doctors, lawyers, newspapermen and artisans found themselves without occupation and without salary or dividends, it is quite sure they would not wait for years until something turned up. They would turn them up or suffer in the attempt. It is to be hoped the camp men will take their requests to the foot of the throne at Ottawa and demand action.

At Ottawa the inhabitants are being kept by the taxpayers of other parts of the country and share few of the problems of the provinces. It would be a great thing for them to know at first hand what the unemployment problem means. They might take notice.

GYPSY LIFE IS PROBLEM

Lieut. Col. S. D. Johnston Gives Interesting Account of Recent Tour Through States

Before the Rotary Club luncheon yesterday, Lieut. Col. S. D. Johnston gave a very interesting and racy account of a recent trip to California in which he and his companions travelled 6,300 miles including a visit to Mexico and Nevada. Southward they took the interior route, returning by the coast. Among the things mentioned was the ease with which gardening was carried on in the south. Evidently all that was necessary there was to throw a few seeds on the ground and nature did the rest. He found gardening in Prince Rupert much more complicated and interesting. In many of the stores nearly all the goods offered for sale were of Japanese manufacture. In Mexico the country was flooded with European goods, English woollens and other materials being in great demand by United States visitors, the import duty into Mexico being much lower than in the States. The gypsy life that is developing, Col. Johnston said, was creating a problem in the United States. A race of drifters was being developed and around the cities were huge jungles and each inhabitant had a car. Sometimes the side of the car was one of the walls of the temporary abode.

In Mexico the roads were bad and recent rains made driving dangerous. They took in the usual sights in that country. Boulder Dam proved an interesting place to visit. Many of the workmen at that place rode to work in two-decker buses carrying from 150 to 200 men. The work of the C. C. C. in which young men 18 to 26 years of age were employed in forestry and other work at a monthly salary of \$30 with food and clothes was also mentioned.

A touch of the wild west was seen in Las Vegas, Nevada, some of the characters being typical westerners of which he had read but up to that time had never seen. At the conclusion, President J. J. Little thanked Mr. Johnston for his address.

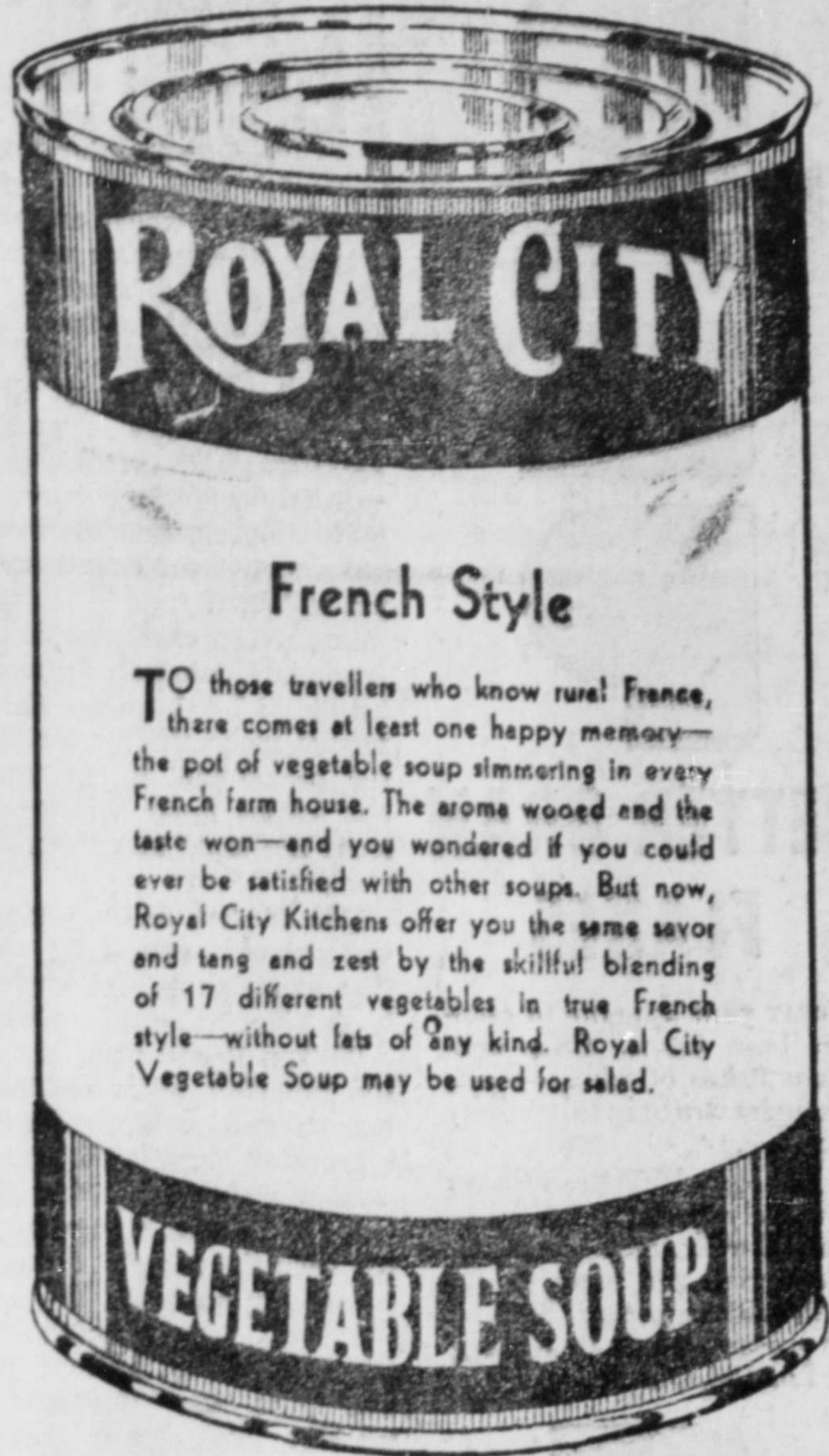

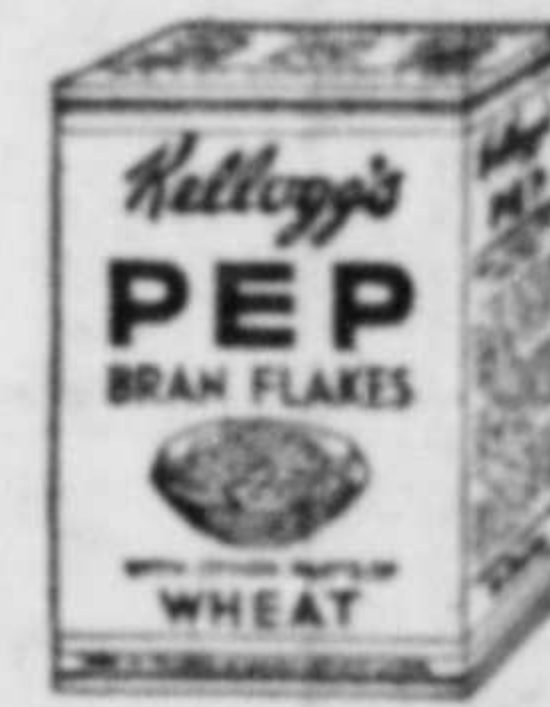

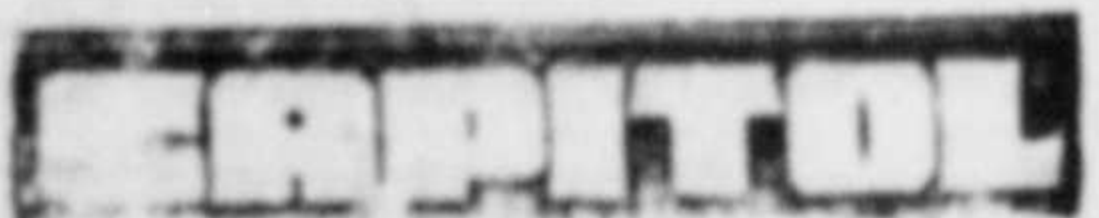
