ITALIAN PUGILISTIC BEHEMOTH FINALLY MEETS WATERLOO

Italian Premier Still Determined to Handle Ethiopia in Own Way

Capt. Anthony Eden Fails to Make Impression Upon II Duce and is Given Cool Send-Off in Leaving Rome-League May Have to Countenance War

ROME, June 26: (CP)—Official circles intimated today as Capt. Anthony Eden departed on his return to London that the British diplomat's conversations with Premier Benito Mussolini had not changed Il Duce's determination to make a "complete solution" to the Italo-Ethiopian problem. Eden's farewell, if anything, was cooler than the cool welcome he

received upon arrival.

Fight Stopped in Sixth Round to Save Former Champion From Further Slaughter-Had Been Down Six Times—Severely Battered All the Way

YANKEE STADIUM, June 26: (CP)-Joe Louis, 196 pounds, Detroit negro, scored a technical knockout over Primo Carnera, 2601 pounds, after two minutes and 32 seconds of the sixth round in their fifteen-round battle here last night before a crowd of fifty-seven thousand ersons which paid gross receipts of \$328,655.

Some people have inquired what is meant by the lawsuit settled finally by the Privy Council in England this week between the C. N. R. and the C. P. R. When the two big railways decided to purchase jointly the Northern Alberta Railways it was decided to share all export freight business going to competitive ports. The C. N. R. interpreted this to mean that they would get a half share of ! all grain going to Fort William and also all going to Vancouver. The C. P. R. argued that Prince Rupert and Victoria were competitive points with Vancouver and so all grain hauled by the C. N. R. to Prince Rupert should count as part of the share of the national line. The Railway Board supported the C. N. R. but this decision was reversed by the Supreme Court of Canada and from now on any grain shipped through Prince Rupert or Victoria CANUCKS will count as part of the half share of the National Railways in the output of the Peace River country over their railways.

In team prizes, the Canadians regained the Kolapore Cup from the Mother Country and they regained the Mackinnon Challenge Cup from Scotland. These are the two greatest of team shoots for marksmen.


