VATICAN CITY, April 1: (CP)-Pope Pius told a consistory of twenty Cardinals today that war is "impossible" because it "would be so enormous a crime, such a foolish manifestation of fury. We cannot persuade ourselves that those who should have at heart the prosperity and wellbeing of the people wish to push to suicide, ruin and extermination not only their own nation
