VICTORIA, Feb 20: (CP)-E. Kenney, Liberal M. L. A. for Skeena, in the Legislature yesterday, urgently appealed for portable mills in districts where large bodies of ore are proven, drawing attention to recommendations of the mining committee last year which were given unanimous endorsation by the House. He urged the Department of Mines to procure at least one portable mill and try it out along the line of the Canadian National Railway in the central interior. Mr. Kenney also urged sympathetic but not financial support to the proposed Alaska highway, advocating a right-of-way of eighty feet width through the province. He dubbed as ridiculous the suggestion that construction of such a highway would be offensive to Japan or end in an alliance with the United States. He asserted that the road would open up a territory capable of sustaining three million people and advised that the government get behind the project without delay.

SEATTLE, Feb. 20:-A telegram was received here yesterday stating that a delegation headed by J. J. Underwood representing the Seattle Chamber of Commerce had met with favorable response from President Franklin D. Roosevelt and other executives at Washington, D.C., in connection with the proposal for a huge five-year public works program for the state of Washington. Projects included in the program suggested by the Champer of Commerce include the Grand Coulee dam, flood control undertakings, breakwaters at Gray's Harbor and a bridge across the narrows of Puget Sound at Point Defiance near Tacoma.






