POLICE BOAT KILLED RUM RUNNER

HALIBUT FLEET GETTING BACK TO NORMAL OPERATION

Failure of Nova Scotia Craft to Stop On Being Ordered Tragedy Cause

William Tanner, Aged 30, Victim of Machine Gun Fire—Engineer Unhurt and Arrested—130 Cases of Unbonded Liquor is Seized

LUNENBURG, N.S., May 3: (CP)—Machine gun fire from the Royal Canadian Mounted Police cutter Acadia instantly killed William Tanner, aged 30, aboard his allegedly rum-running motorboat today outside this harbor. Tanner, it was said, failed to stop when challenged. After a shot had been fired across the bows of his vessel and he still kept going, a machine gun blast was turned loose on the pilot house.

PREJUDICE IS CLAIMED

Defence Attorneys Contend This At Opening Yesterday of Hauptmann Appeal Proceedings

TRENTON, N.J., May 3:—At the opening of appeal proceedings here yesterday on behalf of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, under sentence of death for the kidnap-murder of Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr., defence attorneys attempted to show that the jury which recently convicted Hauptmann was prejudiced.

Need For Change In Relief Method

Vancouver's May Day Demonstration Ample Proof of Necessity For New Plan—McGeer

VANCOUVER, May 3: (CP)—"Vancouver's" May Day demonstration offered ample proof of the need for a complete change in the present policy of relief and the existing method of financing public works and social services," declared Mayor G. G. McGeer yesterday.

BRIEF FOR TARIFF BD.

Premier Pattullo Orders Presentation of British Columbia's Case At Meeting on May 10

VICTORIA, May 3: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo has instructed Dr. W. A. Carrothers, chairman of the economic council, to prepare a brief for presentation to the Canadian tariff board purporting to show that British Columbia suffers under a tariff load on manufactured products while forced to sell goods at world market prices. The board is scheduled to sit in Vancouver on May 10 to deal especially with automobiles.

Conscription Call Issued by Germany

Potential Reich Soldiers Summoned To Go Into Military Training On October 1

BERLIN, May 3:—Germany's first conscription call since the Treaty of Versailles was issued yesterday. Those called out will go into training on October 1.

SILVER MARKETS BOTH IN LONDON AND NEW YORK HAVE BIG BREAK

NEW YORK, May 3: (CP)—Bar silver closed at 75c per ounce on the local metal market Wednesday and broke a further four cents yesterday to close at 71c. In London the market cracked wide open in active dealings in which China was a heavy seller. Support from North America and Indian speculators prevented a further slide. At the close a loss of 4 1/4c was recorded. There was renewed strength both in New York and London today, the local price advancing 1 1/4c to 72 1/2c and the London price one penny to 33 1/2 pence.

INTERIOR TROUBLE

Twenty-Five Men Near Prince George Endeavor to Interfere With Highway Work

When the provincial department of public works at 8 o'clock this morning with tractors and trucks endeavored to start work on a road at South Fort George, twenty-five men mounted the trucks and refused to permit them to be moved. Police were called and the men left the trucks without further difficulty.

According to word received at divisional headquarters of the provincial police here today, the situation is well in hand and precautions are being taken against the possibility of further trouble.

TAKE IN HALIBUT

Southern Trollers Proceeding With Plans to Market Their Own Fisheries Products

SEATTLE, May 3: (CP)—The Fishermen's Co-operative Association group of salmon trollers who want to market their own fish have decided to include halibut fishermen in their plans to make themselves independent of the dealers.

Wood Freeman, manager of the Trolling Vessel Owners' Association, said that a new association, through its article of incorporation is given wide powers and may engage in any phase of the fishing industry.

CIVIL WARFARE RAGING IN PHILIPPINE ISLANDS

MANILA, May 3:—Civil war was raging last night in many parts of the Philippine Islands. Communication lines in many parts of the country were cut and insurgents were reported to be moving towards naval bases. Several casualties were reported. In Manila police were rounding up all known rebels in the endeavor to prevent outbreaks in the city itself.

KITKATLA, May 3:—Perry Howard Mason, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert V. Roberts, who passed away recently, was laid at rest last Friday under the auspices of the Kitkatla Excelsior Club. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. M. H. Lawrence and members of the Young Men's Christian Association acted as pallbearers. The Kitkatla Concert Band also took part in the rites. The boat Florence G. was used to take the funeral party to Cemetery Island. Many floral tributes were sent by friends.

Short Divorce Residence For Florida Passes

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., May 3:—The Florida State Legislature has passed a bill whereby in future only ninety days' residence will be required in order to institute divorce proceedings in the State of Florida.

BOURNEMOUTH, Eng., May 3: (CP)—Committed for trial here on charges of murdering Francis W. Rattenbury, former British Columbia architect and land speculator, Mrs. Alma Rattenbury, the widow, and George P. Stoner, her chauffeur, will take trial at Old Bailey in London shortly.

Irish Free State Raises \$7000 to Purchase Silver Jubilee Gift For Monarch

DUBLIN, May 3: (CP)—After a secret appeal, conducted by word of mouth only, Loyalists in the Irish Free State, Catholic as well as Protestant, have contributed \$7000 to purchase a Silver Jubilee gift for Their Majesties, the King and Queen.

Organizers divided the whole country into districts for collection purposes, the majority of the collectors being women.

In view of the high political feeling aroused by the economic war between the Irish Free State and Great Britain, it was deemed unwise to make public any details.

Death of Logger At Goat Harbor Was Accidental

Provincial Constables Harold Raybone and W. Robertson are back with the P. M. L. 8 from a trip to Goat Harbor near Butedale where they conducted an investigation into a fatality last Sunday at Reite's logging camp in which Langlow Odd, 25 year old Norwegian logger, lost his life. Circumstances of Odd's death were found to be accidental and burial was made at Goat Harbor.

Odd was struck by a logging cable and his head so badly injured that it is believed death was instantaneous. His body was knocked over a cliff.

Odd had been in Canada for five years.

Union Fishermen Are Going Back On Boats; Strike is Abandoned

Only Condition Asked is That There Should be no Discrimination Against Leaders in Tie-up—Decision is Made on Two to One Vote

With the union fishermen rejoining the boats and the various boat owners, who had been doubling up to man a portion of the fleet while the fishermen were remaining ashore during the dispute over the proceeds of halibut livers, returning to their own craft, the Prince Rupert halibut fishing fleet is preparing today to get back to normal operation. This followed a meeting of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union yesterday when the fishermen decided by a two to one vote to go back to work under the existing fishing agreement which gives the boats a one-fifth share of gross stock, the boats also being allowed to share in the proceeds of the livers. The only proviso asked by the fishermen is that there should be no discrimination against those fishermen who have been active in the strike.

AWAITING BREAK-UP

Ice on Yukon River Expected to Go Out Late This Year—\$2000 For Winner in Pool

DAWSON, May 3: (CP)—Residents of the Klondyke are awaiting with keen interest the breaking up of the ice on the Yukon River following the close of the annual pool as to the time the ice "goes out." There will be approximately \$2000 for the winner.

The ice is unusually heavy and substantial wagers on the probability of a late opening are offered by sourdoughs.

ROOSEVELT IS LIABLE TO MEET WATERLOO ON EXTENSION OF N. R. A.

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 3:—The Senate finance committee, over the protest of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who desired a two year extension, has decided to recommend the extension of the National Recovery Act for one year only. A major reverse for the administration in Congress on this issue is possible. The committee vote was 13 to four.

Youthful Thieves Before Magistrate

Four Young Lads, in Real Gang Fashion, Entered Library and Pilfered Cash Drawer

Pilfering from the cash drawer of the Prince Rupert Public Library, which has been going on for the past couple of weeks until an estimated total of about \$6 had been taken, culminated yesterday in the appearance in city police court before Magistrate McClymont yesterday afternoon of four boys between the ages of nine and fourteen and their parents. The lads confessed to having entered the library and taken the money. The magistrate lectured them, prohibiting them from going to picture shows for two months, ordering that they should not further associate with each other and that they should strictly observe curfew requirements. Further punishment was left in the hands of the parents.

GEN. NANTON PASSES AWAY

VICTORIA, May 3: (CP)—Brigadier General Herbert Colbourne Nanton, aged 72, under whom mining operations at Vimy Ridge were carried out during the Great War, died here Wednesday.

JOE CELONA GETS BAIL OF \$40,000 PENDING CONVICTION APPEAL

VICTORIA, May 3: (CP)—Joe Celona, convicted Vancouver white slaver, who is under sentence to an aggregate of twenty-two years' imprisonment at New Westminster Penitentiary, was granted total bail of \$40,000 on several sureties yesterday by Mr. Justice MacDonald pending hearing of his appeal.

WIN BY SACRIFICE

At the labor meeting this week there was a large attendance and the collection amounted to \$19.80, probably less than enough to pay the expenses of the meeting. Supporters of the cause are evidently not very enthusiastic.

In Russia, the land to which most socialists point as a shining example, the workers make tremendous sacrifices. They have given up fine clothes, refuse to accept high wages, live on coarse food and little of that. In fact, they forego most of the good things of life in the hope of eventually making their country prosperous. The sacrifices they make are such as to evoke the greatest admiration. Although they abjure the Christian religion, their sacrifices in many cases indicate the highest type of Christianity.

No cause can expect to succeed unless those supporting it are ready to make sacrifices. Prince Rupert's third party is evidently not yet in the same class with the Russian reformers. But there is hope for them yet.

FISHERMEN BACK TO WORK

After a considerable delay caused by a dispute over the division of the proceeds of the halibut livers, the fishermen are again going back to work and the fishing will from now on, it is presumed, be carried on in a normal manner. The delay has caused considerable loss to fishermen and owners, although the fishermen have been the chief losers. Everyone is glad the dispute is settled.

MEETING THE MENACE

The British Prime Minister announces that he is meeting the menace of a re-armed Germany. He means that he will increase the British armaments, a very proper thing to do, it would seem, under the circumstances.

Still the increase in armaments does not meet the war menace, for war under any circumstances is a menace. To both winners and losers it is a terrible thing. The picture shown at the theatre last night was a terrible indictment of war. It showed just one or two of the horrors. All the honor and glory are gone. There is no glamor left. War is hideous and none know it so well as those who took part in the late war.

EDUCATION EXTENSION

Dr. Warren of University of British Columbia Gives Interesting Address to Rotarians

What other places are doing in the way of university extension and other educational work was the theme of the address of Dr. Harry V. Warren yesterday afternoon at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club. He mentioned particularly the Chilliwack Economics Forum. This is based on the text book, Cole's "Intelligent Man's Guide Through World Chaos," which every member is expected to read. He highly recommended this book to all people who were interested in such studies.

One feature of the course was a weekly symposium of a few minutes on current events of the day. Subjects down for discussion included "The Present Crisis," "Money and Credit," "Unemployment," "Trade and Tariffs," "Public Finance and Taxation," "The Stock Market," "Alternatives to Capitalism," "The Outlook."

Throughout the province there were 161 branches of the Women's Institutes with a total membership of 4,500, many in the remote parts of the province. Short courses in home economics, home nursing, handicrafts, interior decorating and cultural study groups feature the gatherings of these organizations. The speaker also mentioned the excellent work done by Parent Teachers. He told too of the work of the University in providing speakers and radio addresses. During the past year 328 addresses were given by members with a total estimated attendance of over forty thousand.

The Vancouver Institute was organized to provide facilities for those wishing to study and the Kerrisdale Mutual Service Association did excellent work. Musical and dramatic festivals were mentioned as possible means of expression. Dr. Warren strongly urged that Prince Rupert undertake work along some of these lines. The university would co-operate but the initiative must come from Prince Rupert and the people must be prepared to do their part.

J. J. Little, who presided, thanked the speaker for his very interesting address.

Business sessions of the annual meeting of the Caledonia Diocesan Board of the Woman's Auxiliary of the Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada were concluded yesterday afternoon when officers for the coming year were elected and encouraging reports from diocesan officers and parochial officers covering the work of the past year were read.

Mrs. J. B. Gibson, diocesan president, was in the chair and Mrs. W. H. Belson of Sidney, Vancouver Island, vice-president for Western Canada, was a speaker. Mentioning that the Woman's Auxiliary had been formed in Canada fifty years ago, Mrs. Belson urged the members to remember the joy, greatness and urgency of the work.

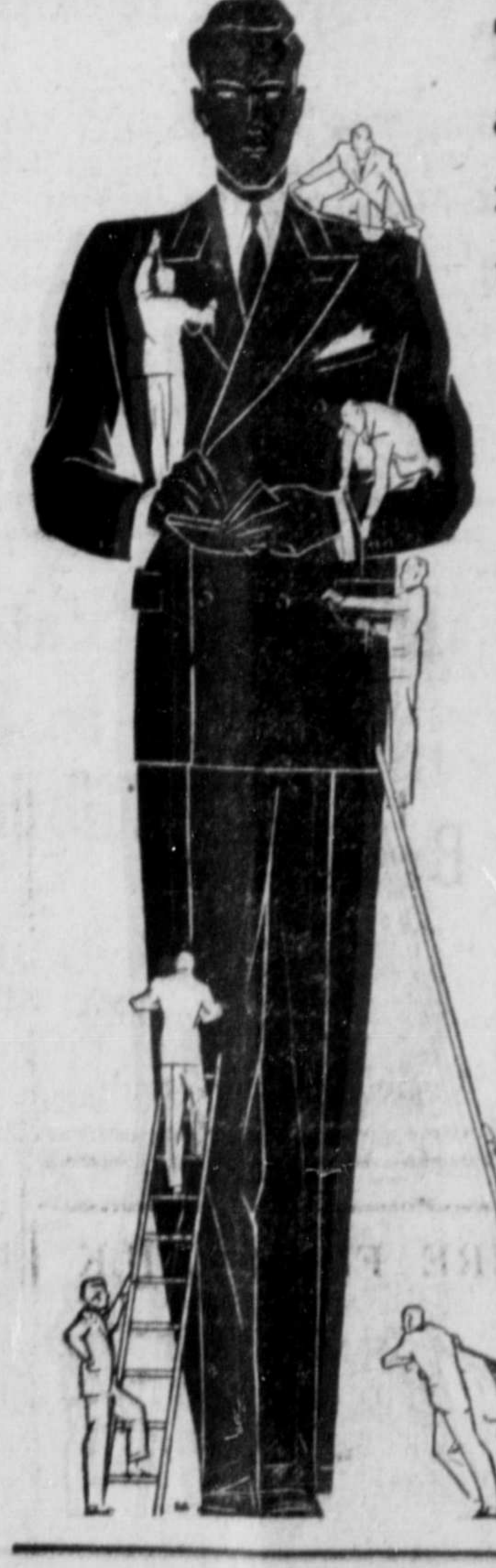

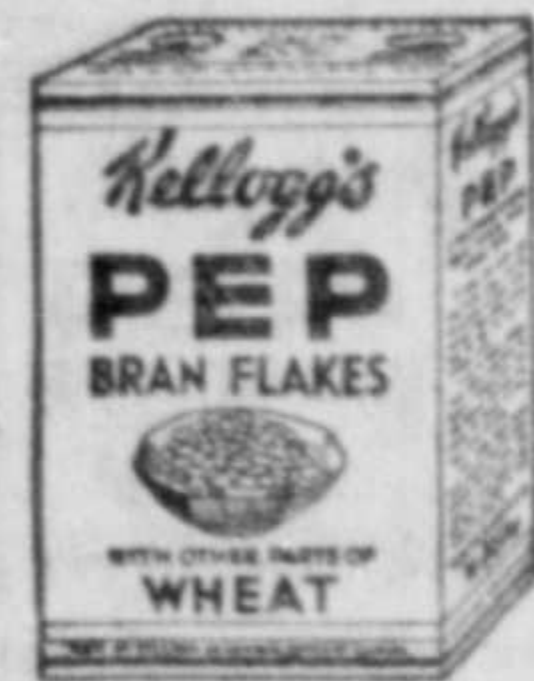

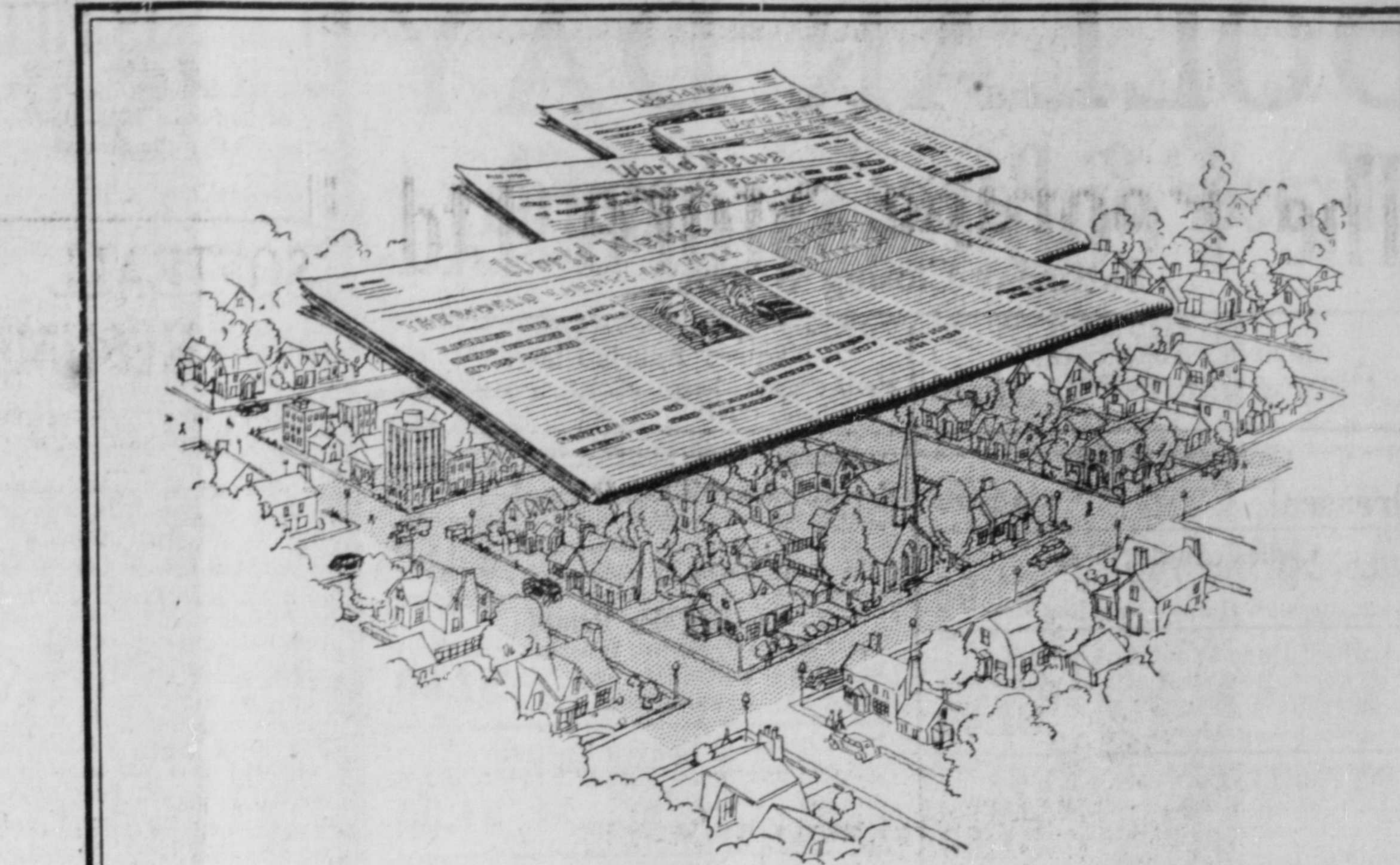
