With the union fishermen rejoining the boats and the various boat owners, who had been doubling up to man a portion of the fleet while the fishermen were remaining ashore during the dispute over the proceeds of halibut livers, returning to their own craft, the Prince Rupert halibut fishing fleet is preparing today to get back to normal operation. This followed a

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
