### STAKANOFF MOVEMENT

What is known in Russia as the Stakanoff Movement is a scheme introduced in the land of the Soviets by a man named Stakanoff to counteract the natural tendency under communism or socialism to slacken off work.

The newspapers of Russia have orders to feature and favor the movement and in most of the factories and in large public works it may be found in operation. Theoretically Stakanovists are those who, in connection with their work, invent or adopt methods which speed up production. In practice it usually means that the Stakanovists work faster and earn bonuses by producing more through greater activity than their fellows.

Naturally exception is taken to the movement by many Russian workers. They have no assurance that the "norm" or normal production of each worker will not be raised through it which will eventually lead to a lower rate of pay for the same amount of work. However, the Stalin Government is very keen on it and ruthless in its application. The worker who does not fall in with the increased speed does not get much consideration. Executives are not allowed to criticize the movement but in some districts there have been riots and fierce attacks made on the Stakanovists and several people killed. The murdered men are regarded as martyrs to the cause and the system of speeding up and driving toward increased production is being encouraged and enforced by the Kremlin. Thus a class of superworkers is being developed with a view to strengthening the Soviet financially and industrially.

### WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Peter Leighton's seineboat Dicky Boy, which went adrift from Metlakatla in the storm early Sunday morning, was picked up off Tree Point yesterday by the American halibut schooner North and taken to Ketchikan according to word received here last night. The vessel had not been ashore and was undamaged. There has been no sign reported as yet of Wallace Leighton's gillnetter which went adrift at the same time and a look-out is still being kept for it. Arrangements will be made to bring the Dicky Boy back to Metlakatla, Tree Point, where she was picked up, is in Dixon's Entrance about 60 miles from here. The North is owned and commanded by Capt. Nels Rovik.

Motorship Bellingham arrived at port at 8:30 this morning from Ketchikan with two carloads of frozen halibut and four cars of mild-cured salmon in tierces for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways. After discharging, the Bellingham returned this afternoon to Ketchikan.

Making an exceptionally speedy trip and early return here, Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, was back in port at 7:45 this morning from Stewart, Anyox and other northern points and sailed at 1:30 this afternoon for Vancouver and waypoints.

District headquarters of the provincial police here were advised this morning that the gasboat Wynnochee, having on board William Putvin and family, arrived safely at Ketchikan last night. There had been some anxiety as to the safety of the boat which was on its way from Seattle to Ketchikan and which had not reported since November 29 when it was at Alert Bay. It had been delayed by storms during the trip up the coast and had put in for shelter at various points.
