PARLIAMENT MAKES GOOD PROGRESS

PEIPING FEARS JAPAN'S WAR MACHINE IS PREPARING

Interest of Ottawa House is Centering On Reform Program

Main Estimates, Now on Table, Expected to Take Up Minimum of Time—Prospects Are For Early Prorogation Despite Important Business Coming Up

OTTAWA, Jan. 25.—With the debate in reply to the speech from the Throne out of the way in record time and the main estimates, which include maintenance and other routine appropriations for the year, already before the House, apparently Parliament at this its last session before a general election is to waste no time on the routine preliminaries.

### FEDERAL ELECTION

Doubtless Premier Bennett is anxious to let the electors know that he means business in connection with his reform program. He is planning, evidently, to ask Parliament to implement in legislation a number of his proposals and should any large section of the House object he will appeal to the country. In the meantime, he will rally his forces for the election which will take place at such time as he sees fit.

We welcome the idea of having the laws passed at this session as long as they are sufficiently far-reaching to constitute real reform. It is doubtless Mr. Bennett's idea that a session of activity will serve to make the electors forget the four years of inactivity.

The good of the country is more important than that of any party, no matter how powerful. If Mr. Bennett can provide work and wages, as he has been strongly urged to by the British Columbia premier, he will secure the support of a great many workers who want nothing better than to earn for themselves once more. These men are just as much citizens of the country as are the people with money and influence. Their votes count the same. They are not concerned with academic matters. What counts with them is remunerative employment. So far they have been unable to secure it and there is still a feeling of doubt as to the real conversion of the Prime Minister.

### CLEANING UP VANCOUVER

The new chief of police of Vancouver is authority for the statement that Vancouver had become a centre for organized vice and he has already taken action along the line of the McGeer policy to clean up the city.

The mayor and chief of police are deserving of credit for their courage in tackling the problem in the way they have done. There are always strong influences at work to prevent the clean-up that the electors desire.

Nor should we forget, in planning our own vacations, that there are beauties to discover and friendships to be made in our neighbouring provinces. We live in one of the world's most glorious playgrounds—let us learn to know better the rich variety of its travel attractions.

A premier, Bennett by name, For his radio speeches gained fame. What he wouldn't do Wasn't worth trying to— The same old election refrain.

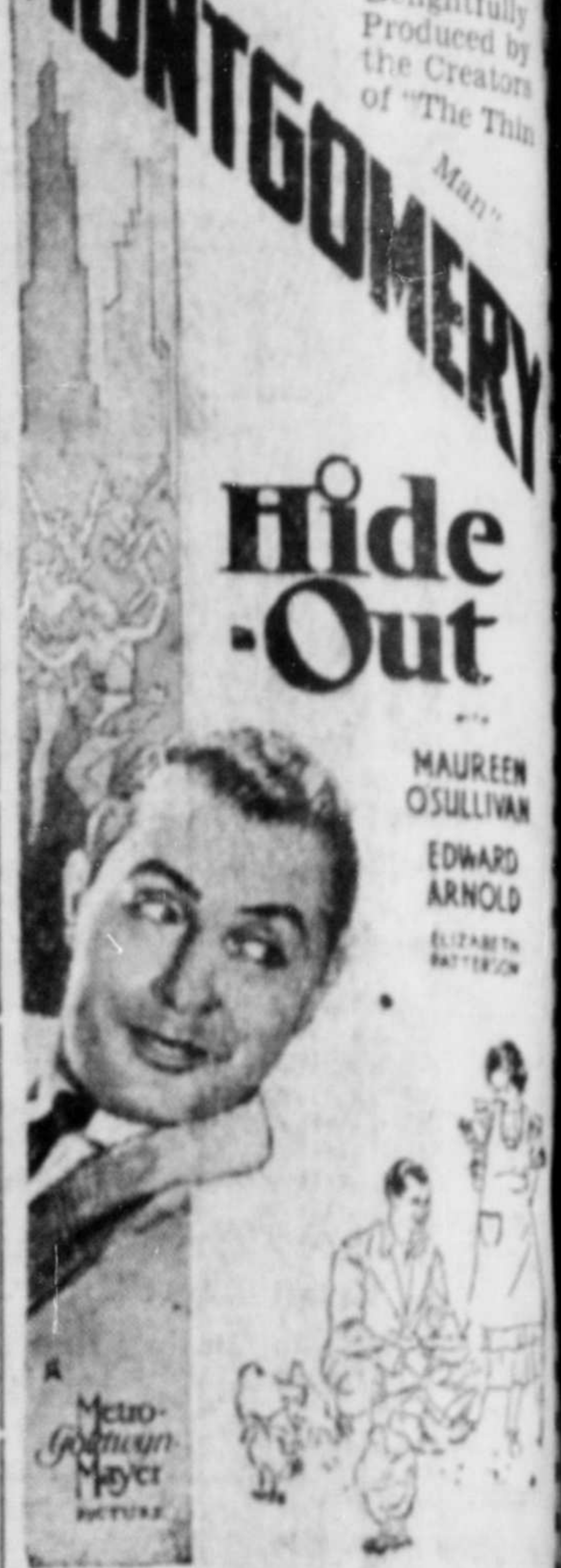
