



RHAPSODY IN RHUBARB

Canadian forced rhubarb which now available on the market may be used in various ways in the household. For the purpose of cooking and canning, the fresh young stalks, particularly the first cutting, have better flavor and color, and are more tender and juicy than the older ones. As the rhubarb grows older, the stems become more acid and may be used principally for juice. Each stalk should be washed carefully and the ends trimmed but the skin should not be removed. It gives the beautiful color to the cooked rhubarb and belps to hold the shape of each piece.


