CANADA'S REVENUE SHOWS ENORMOUS INCREASES

IS OUT CAMPAIGNING AT THE CITY'S EXPENSE

The Mayor Deserts The City's Business To Go Away On a Campaign Trip up the Skeena with the Conservative Candidate.

Mayor Manson has once again obtained a leave of absence from his civic duties and Alderman Smith has been appointed Acting Mayor during his absence. This time it is on no pretense of serving the city but only to serve the interests of the dominant political party of the council. He leaves on the train today with the Conservative candidate for a campaign trip up the river as it is felt that Mr. Clements, never having visited the Skeena or any part of our immediate

interior will be greatly in need of someone to introduce him to the voters. Mr. Clements is to speak at Kitsumkalum tonight and go on as far as Hazelton. A great deal of comment is being aroused at the Mayor's act as a civic official in going away campaigning. Reciprocity would extend the markets for the farmers and develop Canadian trade.

HAYS CREEKITES HATE CIRCLING THE CIRCLE

Petition Presented to Persuade the City Council to Carry Sixth Avenue Right Across Hays Cove Circle

One of the sites specially planned and reserved for a "beauty spot" of the city is already objected to on utilitarian grounds, the residents around Hays Cove Circle seeing no reason why they should walk around instead of across a circle. A petition signed by E. J. Hicks and nine others to the above effect was read at the council meeting last night. The petitioners ask that a four-foot sidewalk be built in Hays Cove Circle from the intersection of Fourth and Fifth avenues across to Sixth avenue and say: "This being the only portion of Hays Cove Circle that is not already provided with plank sidewalks." They further say: "The construction of this walk would be of benefit and value to every person in the city going from the business district to any point beyond Hays Cove." These progressive petitioners object to walking round a circle "because as matters now stand we are compelled to travel two full blocks extra distance in going around the south of the circle." This problem of squaring the circle to meet the desires of the petitioners was duly referred to the committee on public works.

TATLOW ST. PUZZLE

Assessor in a Quandary Over Taxation

The report of the board of works recommending the construction of a sixteen-foot plank road along Tatlow street from Sixth to Ninth avenue, made to the council last night, raised some perplexing questions as to the matter of assessment. Tatlow is a winding street specially planned so by the skillful architects who platted the townsite to break the monotony of too many straight lines. In this it is peculiar when it comes to the matter of assessment for the proposed improvement, the puzzle being the number of property owners directly benefitted and therefore to be assessed. Both the city engineer and the city solicitor gave their views upon the point, and in the end it was deemed advisable to return the recommendation to the board of works for further consideration and to decide upon a fair and equitable investment.

The argument that hard times will be put on the free list and the Canadian people will pay their good money and import some, is one of the signs of obstructionist desperation.

WHOLESALE THIEVING

C. P. R. Cars Plundered to Extent of \$1500. Daring Work

(Canadian Press Despatch) Winnipeg, Sept. 9.—Another big plot to steal goods from cars on the Canadian Pacific Railway has been unearthed by the C. P. R. secret service. The amount involved exceeds fifteen hundred dollars. Two machinists helpers named Moss and Wright, have been arrested. One of the arrested men built a house from stolen lumber and even used in its construction steam pipes stolen from cars in the yard at Souris.

PLACE FOR POUND

"Put It on Sniff Wharf," Say Ald. Clayton

Alderman Clayton does not like to have his sleep broken by a whole horde of dogs baying the midnight moon. He expressed himself to this effect at the council last night, when the recommendation of the board of works was read that a pound be established at the corporation yard on McBride street.

The alderman strenuously objected that it would destroy the peace of the whole neighborhood; that the residents would be unable to sleep nights. He had had one such experience in Nelson and was opposed to a second dose of the sleep-dispeller. He would recommend as an amendment that the pound be built on the sniff wharf.

Alderman Smith seconded the amendment and it carried although Alderman Hilditch solemnly warned the council that such a course was altogether wrong because the city had simply permission from the G. T. P. to use the waterfront as a landing for the sniff yacht with the understanding that it was to be merely a temporary arrangement. It was likely to be very temporary at that.

Upon this objection the City Clerk was instructed to apply for permission to have the pound on the sniff wharf.

That Loyalty Bosh

The loyalty of the Canadian people was not called in question when the reciprocity treaty was completed in 1854. It was not called in question when Sir John A. Macdonald attempted to revive it in 1865, or again in 1869, or again in 1871, or again in 1888, or again in 1891. The question was not raised in 1897. It was not raised when Mr. Paterson and Mr. Fielding started on their mission in 1910. The loyalty of the Canadian people was never called in question until Mr. Fielding and Mr. Paterson effected a satisfactory agreement.

NEW DIOCESE IN FAR JAPAN

Canadian Anglican Church to Extend her Borders in Missionary Enterprise in Maikdo's Land. Needs of Indians.

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, Ont., Sept. 9.—Formal decision to establish a Diocese of Canadian Anglican Church in Japan was arrived at today. It is hoped that the new missionary Bishop for this latest Diocese of the Canadian Church will be selected at the present sitting of the General Synod.

Missionaries at the Synod pointed out that the extension of railways through the north country is slowly driving the Indians out his present sphere of life and that unless something can be done in order that the Indians might be made use of in their developing districts the problem would become a serious one. The matter is to be taken up with the Government.

SMOOTHLY DONE

City Estimates for Year and Assessment Bylaw Passed

At the adjourned meeting of the council last night, the estimates for the year were passed. A few explanations were asked as to certain items but, the estimates passed practically without objection.

The bylaw providing for the tax levy was also passed without much discussion. It is for twelve mills, nine for general expenditures, one of hospital purposes and two for school purposes.

SPECIAL S. A. SERVICES

Major Morris Provincial Officer Arrives and will Preach

By the Prince George this morning Major Morris, Provincial Officer of the Salvation Army in B. C., Alaska and the Yukon, arrived in the city. He will hold a special service at 8 o'clock tonight in the Citadel, and further bright services on Sunday at 11 a.m., 3 p.m. and 8 p.m. Major Morris is a popular preacher and will attract large audiences.

American View Point

Attention has been drawn more than once to the significant fact that whereas all the agricultural journals in Canada favor the reciprocity agreement, all the agricultural journals in the United States oppose it. The Orange Judd Northwest Farmstead, in its last issue, has an article on reciprocity, which should be of interest to Canadian electors. It says:

"It would seem to be a foregone conclusion that reciprocity will win in the Canadian elections by a vote of two to one. Why? Because this measure will enormously stimulate Canadian agriculture without in any way injuring Canadian manufactures. Canada has absolutely everything to gain and utterly nothing to lose by approving reciprocity. It is not too much to say that should reciprocity be endorsed at the Canadian elections, September 21, the ultimate result thereof will be to double the value of every acre of good land and timber and of every town or city lot in the Dominion.

SKEENA SALMON PACK IS LARGER THAN EVER

Over 80,000 Cases Have Been Accounted for Already and Returns are Not All In—Government Policy of Fishery Protection has Proved Effective.

Latest authoritative figures to hand regarding the Skeena River salmon pack go to show that beyond doubt the Skeena pack this season will considerably exceed that of last season. This is gratifying proof that the efforts of the Dominion Government to prevent interference with the salmon have been thoroughly effective. On the Skeena particularly the result is successful. Down the Fraser River the pack this season is light due mainly to the fact that American fishers using

bag nets and salmon traps have reduced the run of fish up river. About 80,000 cases, probably rather over that number, is the estimated total pack for the British American Packers' Association this season on the Skeena group of canneries. This figure is made up of the following estimated totals for each cannery. Balmoral 36,840, Alexandria 7,000, Dominion 17,000, Cunningham's 30,000 cases. Other canneries all report increased figures over last season's so the rumor of a reduced pack is laid.

LAURIER IS LIVE

Tremendous Reception Accorded Premier in London

(Canadian Press Despatch) London, Sept. 9.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was given a great reception by over 4,000 people last night. A new point in his address is the statement that there will be no further alterations or revisions in Canada's tariff until ample examination has been made.

May Get 57 Yet

A press despatch from Victoria printed in the News yesterday states that W. E. Burritt has been appointed registrar of the county court. Mr. Burritt is in receipt of a telegram that he has been appointed not only registrar of the county court, but also registrar of the supreme court and clerk of the peace, in addition to his present position as registrar of titles.

STILL GREATER PROSPERITY

Dominion Revenue Returns for Past Five Month Show Six Millions Increase. Million and a Half Increase in August

(Canadian Press Despatch) Ottawa, Sept. 9.—The total revenue of the Dominion for the first five months of the fiscal year was \$52,036,616 as compared with \$45,830,370 for the same period last year an increase of \$6,206,245. For August alone the revenue was \$11,727,444 an increase of \$1,552,514 over the month of August 1910. Expenditure for the five months totalled \$29,526,630 compared with \$27,546,017 last year an increase of two millions.

SETTLERS ORGANISING IN UPPER KITSUMKALUM

Beautiful District needs Post Office and Trails to Develop it and Encourage Influx of Population. Special Article by a Settler to The Daily News.

The first meeting of the settlers of the Upper Kitsumkaylum valley was held August 28th at the home of Mrs. A. Ross for the purpose of drafting petitions for a post office at the head of the lake and to ask for funds to complete the trail to that point.

Little has been said of this district, one of the most beautiful and fertile of the Skeena valleys. Three years ago there was not an acre staked above the lake, and until June 1910 there were only four pre-emptions taken. Many of the settlers have comfortable cabins built and some have raised crops this year. All this in spite of the difficulty of getting in supplies, etc.

From Kitsumkalum the trail was completed to Mud Lake last year a distance of sixteen miles. From that point supplies had to be taken by boat ten miles across Mud Lake, Red Sand Lake and the big Kitsumkalum Lake. This chain of lakes connected by narrow channels in which the swift currents make passage in small boats rather difficult. The Dominion Telegraph Company chose this valley as the shortest and easiest route for Stewart, and the line has been completed this year. This has been of immense benefit to the settlers farthest north as it gives them, at least, a pack

trail through the forest. The worst difficulty is the lake, as the shore for several miles on the west side is beaver swamp and on the east side a rocky bluff overhangs the lake for some distance.

As the lake is fed by springs the ice does not form a safe winter trail and forces the settlers to leave their claims for the winter, or be shut off from the outer world for several months. They are a hardy, hopeful lot, however, and believe that a valley with so many natural advantages cannot long be left without means of transportation.

There is no doubt that the beautiful Kitsumkalum Lake seven miles long by two and a half miles wide, stocked with the finest trout in the world and surrounded by fertile farms and farther up in the foothills with all kinds of game, will make one of the finest pleasure resorts on the Pacific Coast. There are wild geese and ducks in abundance besides plover, partridges, grouse, etc. All the available land is now staked as pre-emptions but there are thousands of acres still held as timber limits which will be converted into farms as soon as the timber is removed. This will be in the near future as the fires are destroying a great deal of it and will necessitate its manufacture or loss.

A GOOD REASON FOR SUPPORTING MR. ROSS

Daily, for several weeks this journal has shown that reciprocity is vitally necessary to build up Prince Rupert and develop Northern British Columbia. Upon those grounds it has consistently urged the electors to elect the Government candidate, Mr. Duncan Ross, to be its next member.

In addition to the long list of incontrovertible economic arguments in favor of reciprocity there are strong personal arguments, which must be considered. These, Mr. Ross by the usage of good taste would be precluded from discussing. But they rank among the most important reasons why Mr. Ross must be elected if the district is to progress.

It is conceded on every hand that the Laurier Government is going to be returned. The very best that the most sanguine Conservative forecasts give is:

On these figures Mr. Borden could not take office. Even the 20 seats given to the Conservatives in Quebec are for the most part Nationalist, and on reciprocity several of Bourassa's candidates are taking ground for the agreement and will vote for it if elected.

This very moderate claim gives Laurier a majority of 47 in the new House. It may very well be close upon 60. Many Liberals in touch with the Ontario campaign say that the two parties will divide the Province: 43 to 43. Quebec Liberals do not concede a net gain of seven to the Nationalist-Conservative combination. In Nova Scotia a total of 15 Liberals to three Conservatives would be no surprise. New Brunswick once returned a solid Liberal delegation and may do so again. Alberta and Saskatchewan are almost certain to be solidly Liberal, while in our own Province, it is quite possible that four Liberals will go in.

There is no constituency in the whole of Canada that requires more from the next Government than does Comox-Atlin. Comox-Atlin is an undeveloped territory over a thousand miles long, and two hundred miles wide. It has seven thousand miles of coast line. Its needs are very great.

Governments being composed of men are only human. What chance for special favors would Comox-Atlin have, if, when the Laurier Government is returned in triumph by a contented country, Comox-Atlin were to select a carpet-bagger like Herbert S. Clements of 535 Pender St. West, Vancouver, and send him to Ottawa as its representative.

There is no part of Comox-Atlin that will need favors from the Government so much as Prince Rupert will for the next two or three years. A week ago today, the people of Prince Rupert consented to assume most of the taxation for the Grand Trunk Pacific for the next ten years, on condition that the railway would start work on a roundhouse, an engine shop, a depot, and an hotel. (The dry dock had already been arranged for by the Dominion Government which had guaranteed a \$2,000,000 subsidy for twenty years).

A city so much in need of public works cannot afford to take chances on sending the Vancouver candidate to present its needs before the Government.

Yesterday, notice was given that the customs house and post office must be removed from the Grand Trunk reserve to make room for improvements. This makes it a timely occasion on the re-opening of Parliament to request the Dominion Government to erect a permanent stone or concrete post office and a permanent customs house, and Government Building.

In addition to the work at the Marine Depot and Quarantine Station at Digby Island, the Government is contemplating the building of a large wharf at Digby. The plans were in the city yesterday, and call for a 500 foot wharf with two approaches, one 910 feet long and the other 710 feet long. There are other works in contemplation too.

It needs no special prescience to perceive that Mr. Duncan Ross who is a Liberal and a Comox-Atlin man will be able to secure a great deal more for Prince Rupert and for Comox-Atlin from a Liberal Government than would Mr. Herbert S. Clements of 535 Pender St. West, Vancouver. Mr. Ross's election will make development certain.

the Rhine he kept a sharp lookout for the German peril, but it kept strictly to the tall timbers. A Frenchman tried to sell Fred a Reubens, but the vendor was immediately informed that Reubens were "sold" every day in this country and that Rubes were a drug on the market. In Rome he visited the big manufacturing plant where Roman candles are made, and he had a drink at Waterloo.

Taking it all in all the trip was most enjoyable and Mr. and Mrs. Stork return to British Columbia feeling that they have "done" Europe even if Europe has done them to come extent.
