# MORE TROOPS GOING TO ABYSSINIA

## KINGSFORD-SMITH HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

### Mussolini Calls Out Another Large Batch Of Men For Training

Duce Also Warns Other Nations Against Interfering In Problem Which He Says Only Italy Is In Position to Deal With

ROME, May 15:—In defiance of informal protests which have been made by several European nations at his aggressive policy in regard to Abyssinia, Premier Benito Mussolini yesterday ordered 200,000 additional troops to take up arms for service in Africa. Il Duce also warned the nations against interfering in a problem which he declared only Italy was in a position to deal with.

### PASSES AT SASEENOS

Frederick S. Clements, Former City Engineer Here, Dies Near Victoria

Frederic S. Clements, pioneer civil engineer of this city and former city engineer of Prince Rupert, died last night at Saseenos, Vancouver Island, where he had made his home since leaving here several years ago, according to advice received in the city this morning. News of his passing will be received with regret by many friends from pioneer days.

Mr. Clements first came to Prince Rupert early in 1908 from Nelson and was employed by the Surveyor General of the province to locate errors in disputed surveys. For years he was employed as a leading land surveyor until he became city engineer. After relinquishing that post he soon left for Victoria. In 1911 he built his combined office and home at the corner of Fraser and Eighth Streets. The building is now occupied by the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co.

Deceased was born in Dumfries, N.B., 61 years ago. He was a member of Tsimpssean Lodge, No. 58, A. F. & A. M., and of Kalien Chapter, No. 178, Royal Arch Masons.

### AGREEMENT FOR TRADE

Tokio Government Urged to Make New Attempt to Have Restrictions Removed by Canada

TOKIO, May 15: (CP)—The council of the Japan-Canada Society, which includes many influential business men, has passed a resolution urging the government to make another attempt to reach an agreement with Canada for the lifting of restrictions against Japanese goods in Canada and, if that is not successful, to apply Japan's trade protection law against Canadian imports.

### Barbara Hutton Is Now Countess

Heiress of "Five and Ten" Million Marries Danish Nobleman Following Divorce

RENO, Nev., May 15: (CP)—In a Presbyterian Church ceremony witnessed only by her parents and a few friends, Barbara Hutton, heiress of the Woolworth "five and ten" millions, yesterday became the bride of Count Kurt Haugwitz-Reventlow of Denmark. Barbara, who secured a divorce from Prince Alexis Mdivani on Monday, met the handsome count in Europe.

The couple proceeded at once to San Francisco where they were registered last night at a fashionable Knob Hill hotel.

### INCREASE IN TRADE

Canada's Business is Looking Up; Customs Revenue and Fish Exports Also Greater

OTTAWA, May 15: (CP)—Canada's foreign trade during April totalled \$75,000,000, an increase of \$8,000,000 over April last year. Customs and excise receipts increased by \$500,000. Fish exports increased by \$350,000 during the month.

### FREAKISH WEATHER

Seeding in Alberta Indefinitely Postponed—Deaths in States From Meteorological Vagaries

CALGARY, May 15: (CP)—As a result of the week-end rain and snowfall over Southern Alberta and in the Edmonton district, seeding of the 1935 crop has been indefinitely postponed.

KANSAS CITY, May 15:—Freakish weather conditions continue throughout the South and Middle West. Rain, sleet, snow and tornadoes were included in the meteorological vagaries as a result of which eleven deaths were reported.

### MANY ARE DROWNED

Four Hundred Chinese Coal Miners And Jap Foreman Lose Lives When Shaft Floods

TSINAN, Shantung Province, China, May 15: (CP)—Four hundred Chinese miners and a Japanese foreman were drowned after a shaft in the Szechwan coal mine, seventy miles west of here, was flooded by a subterranean river.

### Famous Flier and Two Companions Land Safe After Hectic Flight

"It's All Right. They Can't Kill Me," Cries "Smithy" Joyfully After Epic Flight Over Stormy Tasman Sea In Crippled Plane

SYDNEY, Australia, May 15:—After having earlier received word that the celebrated aviator and two companions were about to land on the rough water of the stormy Tasman Sea on account of engine trouble while flying Jubilee air mail to New Zealand, Sydney was thrilled this afternoon with the safe arrival of Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith. It had been feared that the famous flyer and his companions might have perished in a forced landing. The plane lost part of one propeller and, for a time, the second of three engines threatened to give out.

### TWO YEARS IN CHARGE

City Commissioner Alder Has Been Here That Long Today—Is Optimistic

### City Still Good

Confident of Early Industrial Development and That Depression is Ending

City Commissioner W. J. Alder was in cheerful mood this morning as he started upon his third year as head of civic affairs in Prince Rupert. It is two years ago since he assumed the post of city commissioner.

"Investors in Prince Rupert still have as good a chance here as anywhere," opined Mr. Alder in speaking of the real estate situation. "Many will yet get their money out, I am sure. As for myself I am just as hopeful as ever."

"With proper management, there seems to be no reason why we cannot hold taxes down to a reasonable level," declared the commissioner. Questioned, he modestly admitted that, whereas the city owed \$60,000 in interest on its bonded indebtedness and a like amount in current expenses when he came here, today interest and current expenditures were paid up to date and there was money in the bank. He hoped that the situation would soon be improved to such an extent that a commissioner would no longer be necessary.

Mr. Alder was especially optimistic with respect to early industrial development here. The outlook was favorable, he felt, not only for one large industry but for others.

"The worst of the depression is over for Prince Rupert, I am confident," the commissioner declared.

#### AVIATRIX IS FINED

BRIDLINGTON, Eng., May 15: (CP)—Mrs. Amy Johnson Mollison was fined ten shillings on a charge of driving an automobile without a licence. The charge arose out of an accident on April 19 when a motorcycle rider was killed. Mrs. Mollison was unable to produce her licence at the time and, when she did produce it two days later, it was found to have expired.

### DOLLAR DAY MORE ASKED

Bridge River District Miners Not Satisfied With 50c Increase—Recall of Bell Sought

GOLDBRIDGE, May 15: (CP)—A company proposal to increase pay by about fifty cents a day has been met by a counter-proposal from the Bridge River district gold miners asking for increases ranging up to \$1 a day. The central committee of the strikers has requested the recall of Adam Bell, deputy minister of labor, claiming that he acted unconstitutionally on Sunday in the matter of a secret vote taken at the Pioneer mine. A mass meeting at Pioneer endorsed the committee's action.

### WILL VOTE ON STRIKE

Ballot to be Taken by Vancouver and District Waterfront Workers' Association

VANCOUVER, May 15: (CP)—Members of the Vancouver and District Waterfront Workers' Association will ballot today on whether they favor a strike in sympathy with relief camp workers. No date has been set for a sympathetic strike, should one take place, and its duration would be indefinite.

### CUTTING DOWN EXPENSES

The Province of Ontario is planning to cut down expenses of government by eliminating the costly residence of the Lieutenant Governor and this has caused something of a furore in social circles. It is pointed out by the Toronto Star that similar action was taken in New Brunswick forty-three years ago when the official residence of the Lieutenant Governor was closed, the building being used today as headquarters for Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The Governor lives in his own home, wherever it may be, or rents a house temporarily at the capital.

Government House in any provincial capital is a social centre where the wealthy residents are invited to dinners and other social events, the general public being invited to an annual reception and members of patriotic orders to an occasional tea. It costs the provinces a great deal to keep up the building and there seems to be no corresponding advantage to the province as a whole. It is not a question of patriotism but of sound business ethics. What advantage is it to Prince Rupert to keep up the Government House in Victoria? None whatever! Mr. Fordham Johnson could carry out all the duties of his office just as well living in his home in Vancouver with an occasional sojourn at the Empress Hotel in the capital.

### MONTREAL'S DRASTIC MOVE

Many people still have the idea that it is only in the west that there is a financial stringency and that Vancouver and Prince Rupert and a few other municipalities are the only ones in financial difficulties. Canada's largest city is one of the hardest hit of all. Montreal, with an estimated deficit of eight and a half million dollars, has taken the extreme measure of imposing a sales tax on all transactions within the city on amounts over ten cents. On a fifteen cent purchase one cent extra has to be paid and on 60c a two cent tax. There is two percent on all larger amounts. It is hoped to raise five million dollars from this source during the year and an additional three and a half million from income tax. These taxes are in addition to the federal sales tax and the federal and provincial income taxes. The only exemptions from the sales tax are beer, school books, gasoline and some food supplies.

### WHIFFLETS

From the Waterfront

The Home Oil tanker Dinamac, which was here yesterday from Vancouver, is 72½ feet overall in length with 21-foot beam and loaded draft of eight feet. She is equipped with a 150 h.p. Ruston-Hornsby English diesel engine and has a speed of eight knots per hour. She has a cargo capacity of 20,000 gallons of gasoline, 5500 gallons of diesel oil and ten tons general cargo. The new vessel carries a crew of five men. W. E. Willis-croft of this city is mate, having joined the ship in Vancouver. The Dinamac will be operated largely out of Prince Rupert.

As is usual at this time of year, passenger traffic southbound from Alaska is very light. There were only twenty-three passengers on board the steamer Princess Norah which was in port yesterday afternoon bound from Skagway to Vancouver. Six disembarked from the vessel at this port while three boarded her here for Vancouver.

Bringing north a fair-sized list of passengers, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port on time at 10 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound.

The provincial police cruiser P. M. L. 8 returned to port yesterday afternoon from Humpback Bay, Porcher Island, where it went to investigate a fire there on Sunday last when five small cannery shacks were burned. The incident was inconsequential. A couple of Indians were living in the cabin. The plant will be operated this year only as a fish camp.
