The Colonel has been a fighter, whether in the House of Commons or on the fields of Flanders. A lawthrew aside his musty ability as a leader was soon recognized and he became platoon officer, adjutant, company commander, second in command and finally battalion commander. He was worknded and mentioned in despatches.

A story is told of how he compromised his position by trying to rescue his men under fire outside the barbed wire entanglements and it was a question for a little while whether he would be given the Victoria Cross or be court martialed. Instead he was given the order of Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

Three times the Colonel was defeated in provincial politics but he came up again as a minister of the crown and was acknowledged to be the chief driving force behind the last King administration.



They encountered intense fire and were mown down. In spite of their heavy casualties, the attacking Canadians succeeded in overrunning the enemy's front line trench and, in part, consolidating their success. But from all directions they were subjected to heavy bombing, and they were enfiladed from both flanks.

Bitter fighting of a most confused nature ensued and for more than four hours the remnants of the 1st Battalion continued to hold the ground they had gained. The failure, however, of the main operation to their left reacted against them, and the Canadians were forced to withdraw, late in the ight, to their original line. Nothlives were lost.
