CALGARY, August 27—In an important statement yesterday Premier-Designate William Aberhart explained how the Social Credit party intended to carry out its basic dividend plan of \$25 per month for every adult citizen of Alberta. In the first place, the evangelist-economist stated that the dividend would not be paid to any persons who

### THE SKEENA HIGHWAY

It is announced in southern newspapers that the minister of public works is to make a highway survey prior to determining what work is to be done next season on the highways of the province.

In this connection we should like to draw to the attention of the minister of public works the fact that Prince Rupert has only twelve miles of provincial highway adjoining its corporate limits.

Prince Rupert has been incorporated as a city for approximately 25 years so that the various provincial governments have constructed during the time since that event an average of less than half-a-mile a year.

We are inclined to think that no other city in the province has been as badly used as Prince Rupert in the matter of provincial highways. Certainly there is no city of its size without an outlet to the rest of the world. People of Prince George or Smithers are amazed when they come to the city and find the people here hemmed in as they are while in their respective home towns they have highways running in every direction. They find it hard to believe and are inclined to blame the people of Prince Rupert for their lethargy.

We are not blaming any government for its laxity. We are more inclined to blame the people of Prince Rupert who have been so half-hearted. Even yet we find a few people, very few, who are not yet car owners who say they see little use in building a highway out of Prince Rupert.

Now that Prince Rupert is becoming really highway conscious and that the number of cars owned in the city is steadily increasing, we suggest to the minister of public works that he look carefully over the local situation and do as much work as possible next year, having in view the fact that Prince Rupert has suffered from inaction in the past and has a big credit in the form of highway work long past due.
