WAS QUIET

Plebiscite Carried Out With Minimum of Incident-Ballots Being Counted Today

SAARBRUCKEN, Jan. 14: (CP) -The momentous plebiscite upon the question of whether the Saar Valley shall go to Germany or France or remain under League of Nations mandate as at present came to a close last night. Voting was carried out in a quiet and orderly fashion and the elaborate patrol preparations appear to have been almost unnecessary. Only two minor untoward incidents were reported throughout the day and there were no fatalities or injuries or damage of any consequence.

After the close of the polls, the thousands of ballots were collected by British armored cars. Vote counting started this morning and the results will not be made officially known until tomorrow

Anti-Nazis Defeated

The Common Front in the Saar. anti-Nazi organization, virtually admitted defeat of their cause at the end of voting in the plebiscite to determine the future status of the territory.

The Common Front claimed that the voters had been subjecopinion that the vote was dominated by Nazi pressure.

While counting of the vote will not be completed until tonight, the general opinion today is that the disputed territory will be restored to Germany. The League of Nations Saar governing committee will make the final decision. taking into consideration the results of the vote.





The christening was performed by W. H. Daly, father of Mrs. W. P. Armour, wife of the head of the company, with the time-honored custom of breaking a ribbon-bedecked bottle of champagne over the bow. There were about thirty persons present, the party adjourning to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Armour where the toast to the Daly was duly and ably proposed by Mr. Daly after whom the vessel has been re-named. Among those present and taking part in the ceremonies was W. J. Asselstine, M. L. A. for Atlin.

With thirty-five passengers on board, C. P. R. steamer Princess Norah, with Capt. Thomas Cliff in command in place of Capt. William Palmer, who is on vacation, was in port yesterday morning from 9 to 10 o'clock on her regular fortnightly voyage from Vancouver to Skagway and other Alaska points. No passengers disembarked from the vessel here, three leaving here aboard her for the north.

Prince Rupert will also be operated this summer in the Alaska service on a schedule of weekly sailings similar to that of last year, alternating on the Anyox and Stewart

According to present plans, the Prince Charles will be placed on the run between Vancouver and Prince Rupert via Queen Charlotte Islands and the Prince John will operate in a roving freight service.

Capt. H. E. Nedden will be in command of the steamer Prince Robert while other ships will have summer masters as follows: Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean; Prince George, Capt, Edward Mabbs; Prince Charles, Capt. Dan McKinnon; Prince John, Capt. William Gleeson.
