



BRITISH UNEMPLOYMENT RELIEF

The new unemployment assistance plan of the British wake up Rupert, it's time to shout government came into force near the beginning of this For some of the money that's roammonth. Under it single men get 15 shillings a week and women 14 shillings. Two shillings less is paid if they are under 18 years of age. For married persons the rate is 24 shillings for a man and wife, and for children from three to 10 shillings, while seven shillings and sixpence of this is supposed to be for rent. If the rent paid is higher, a slightly higher amount may be allowed.

Persons with savings of fifty pounds do not have to spend it but if the savings are more than fifty pounds, one shilling a week is deducted for each twenty-five pounds of savings. He is not obliged to borrow on his life insurance Fortune awaits thos or to mortgage his property. In other words, it is not necessary that he be destitute. At the same time if a person is getting help, his affairs come under scrutiny under what is known as the Means Test.

Unemployment insurance is different and no scrutiny of a person's affairs is required in order that he may receive insurance payments. They are his insurable right. Curiously enough, however, the payments a family receives under the insurance plan are in some cases less than under the relief plan and an insured man may apply for relief instead of insurance payments if he wishes, provided he is willing to submit his private affairs for inspection by the relief officer.

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


