



## House of Commons to Adjourn This Friday, Reassembling in Fall

October 28 Set as Date For Resuming Session, Thus Ruling Out Possibility of Polling Contest Being Held This Year as Many Expected

LONDON, July 30: (CP)—It was announced today that the House of Commons would adjourn on Friday of this week to reassemble on October 28. The announcement indicates that no plans are being made by the National government for a general election before next spring. It had been thought for some time that an election might have been possible this fall but this no wappears to be definitely ruled out.

## BIG TOW HANDLED

Four Davis Rafts Containing 6,500,000 Feet of Logs Being Handled at One Time

What is believed to be the largest single tow of logs ever handled on the Pacific Coast is now on its way from the J. R. Morgan Logging Co.'s camp at Sedgewick Bay, Queen Charlotte Islands, to Powell River and Vancouver behind the tug J. R. Morgan, formerly the well known coastal steamer Prince Albert. The vessel was in port last night for fuel, having left the tow at Captain's Cove while she ran in here. Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Morgan reached the city on the J. R. Morgan and will be here until Saturday night when they will return to the Islands on the


